

Pentecost/Whitsunday 12 June

Older people will remember Whitsuntide was marked by a public holiday on the Monday and in many a northern town and city there were great Whit Monday processions of faith. Not so any longer. That has contributed to Whit's downgrading in the wider public's consciousness. It remains, nonetheless, one of the three major festivals in the Church's calendar.

At Christmas we celebrate the Incarnation, that is God's coming to be with us and so reveal His nature in the divinely human life of Jesus. At Easter we rejoice in Jesus' victory over death and the assurance we have been given that we shall share in His eternal life. At Pentecost we celebrate the festival of God the Holy Spirit and life in the Spirit, that is God in us. No longer are we simply observers of what God did and revealed long ago in the life, death and resurrection of Jesus, through His Spirit we can now be participants in what He is doing in the world. He is at work in us and through us.

It is the Holy Spirit who (with our active co-operation) shapes and forms us into that divinely human likeness which we see in Jesus. It is the Spirit within us who motivates us and constantly calls us back, when we falter or stray, into living in unity and harmony with one another – and that in a world marked and scarred by so many divisions and by so much violence.

It is the Spirit who takes us with all our human weaknesses and limited talents, and makes us instruments of His transforming power of love and truth which brings freedom and healing. It is the Spirit who knits us together. People from so many different cultures and nationalities, speaking so many different languages and with all our other differences in personality and upbringing are brought together into one communion and fellowship and worship. I saw this every week in my last job before retirement. The members of our congregation in Oslo came from every continent (bar the Antarctic!) and from cultural and ecclesial backgrounds as different as Armenian and Russian Orthodox through to African Independent Charismatic Evangelical Churches. We witnessed and rejoiced in the diversity and unity of the Fellowship of the Holy Spirit.

It is the life-giving Spirit who pours His love into our hearts as individuals and so enables us to become the persons we were meant to be. He is the One who makes possible the miracle of change in us humans, not just for the better but for the best, and consequently uses us as His instruments of change to bring about peace and justice in the world. In the words of St Paul we become and "We are fellow-workers with God". It is a phrase that takes us straight back to a sermon Jesus preached in the synagogue in Nazareth. He read some verses from Isaiah chapter 61 and applied them to Himself and to His ministry:

The Spirit of the Lord is upon me because He has anointed me to preach good news to the poor. He has sent me to proclaim release to the captives and recovery of sight to the blind, to set at liberty those who are oppressed . . .' Jesus made those prophetic words his personal manifesto. As His co-workers, it is ours too. To aim for it and to achieve something of it, we need the indwelling presence and power of the Holy Spirit – just as Jesus did. That's what enables us to be God's fellow-workers in restoring wholeness to broken lives and to a broken world.



Letter from Michelle Proctor

Dear Friends.

Hello from Mukinge where with the start of May came cold season and I found myself wondering where it was I left my work cardigan last year? I love this time of year when it is cooler and dry but the trees are still green from the recent rains.

I said in my last letter that I was to be taking on the role of Manager of Nursing. Since then that has been on and off a couple of times but now it has actually happened and this week Mr Mulenga, my boss, went on leave before starting his course in July. So as of 4 days ago and for the next 3 years I am manager of Nursing care. I know it will be a big challenge and I am still a little bit daunted by it.

There is lots of building work going on around the hospital: Male ward is being extended to include a private room for staff, Out Patients is getting an extension and TB ward is in the process of a complete renovation.

The closure of TB ward meant the patients from there moved to the malnutrition ward and the children form that ward came to lodge on my ward. It has been a little bit squashed at times with more children than beds and mattresses all over the floor last week we had 47 patients on our 32 bedded ward!

One of the children on the ward is Albert who has been with us for the last 3 weeks. This is his story:

Albert was looking for rats one day (to eat) and he stuck his hand down a rat hole hoping to catch one. Something in the hole bit him so thinking it was a rat and hoping for rat for his supper he stuck his hand down the hole again only to be bitten again. His hand was now hurting and starting to swell so he went to tell his mum who took a hoe and went out to dig over the hole and catch the rat inside. When she dug over the hole there was indeed something in there but not a rat – a snake!!

The swelling and tissue damage caused by the snake bite to Albert's hand resulted in a contracture meaning his hand was not functional. Dr. Jovic a visiting plastic surgeon was able to release the contracture and take a flap of skin from his abdomen to the hand to repair it so now Albert will have a hand he can use and hopefully he will not put it down any more holes!

This year so far has been one in which we have been short of doctors. Dr. Mutimushi was promoted to be the local District Medical Officer but does still help us out with TB ward and some on calls but soon will be leaving us completely. This means that Dr. Friend our surgeon is our only full time doctor. An answer to our prayers came in the form of Rachel a doctor from the UK who was meant to go to Jos in Nigeria for 3 months but could not because of the unrest there, so instead came to us! This has been a big help she will be here until July when Ogenna a paediatrician from America arrives for a year. Dr. Friend is hoping to take a trip back to New Zealand in November so please pray that we can find a surgeon to cover this time so he can go.
