

Remembering Neville Denson

A service of thanksgiving for the life of Neville Denson was held at the Priory on 11th March attended by his family and many friends and neighbours. He was a distinguished and delightful gentleman, truly a 'gentle-man' of brilliant wit and sharp intellect. As Chief Executive of Copeland Council from 1973 – 1990, Neville was well-known and held in great respect by the people he served with total dedication and integrity. His abiding memories of serving the new council were – setting up Copeland Borough Council as first officer; representing that Council at the Windscale inquiry into Sellafield's expansion; arranging general elections; organising many royal visits; meeting and presenting the Council's case to Government ministers on different issues.

In his leisure he loved fellwalking and completed all 214 Wainwright peaks; and daily jogged up and down Tomlin suffering 'wonky knees' for his efforts! He was a keen cricketer amongst other sports and played for the North-Western League. In retirement Neville was a passionate writer of numerous letters and articles to newspapers, magazines and books – even cricketing verses published in the MCC Anthology. His wit and wisdom came to the fore in impromptu conversations with friends, online in his comical anecdotes, and in all his writings. Many villagers share happy memories of his exploits at village events and fetes, especially the renowned Raft Race, paddling their Jubilee raft on Pow Beck with his dear friend Alan Hawkins.

In his later years he served as Chairman of Age Concern NW Cumbria; and vicechairman of Howgill Family Centre. He was also involved with local and regional radio and TV – serving on the Advisory Committees of BBC Radio Cumbria, and of BBC Northern & North-Western Regions. Neville had a remarkable talent and flair for communication, in political debate or across the airwaves or face-to-face in animated conversation!

Neville followed many diverse interests and pastimes in his life: loving music – classical, folk and jazz; the language of poetry and song - of the Great American Songbook; travelling especially in USA visiting nearly every state; putting the world to rights with his friends Alan Hawkins and John Warbrick every week over a few pints! He dearly loved spending time with his beloved family - thinking of Gweneth, Mandi, Janet and Matthew and their family. Neville will be sadly missed and lovingly remembered. Our thoughts and prayers are with all his family.

For freedom Christ has set us free. Galatians 5:1

I am writing this letter to you on Thursday 17th March, the day Nazanin Zaghari-Ratcliffe arrived back in the UK, after spending almost six years as a prisoner in Iran. After months of dark and depressing news stories of death and destruction, due to Covid and, now, the war in Ukraine, Nazanin's release is very welcome hopeful and happy news. After six long years, she is free, the return to a future "normal" life may not be easy but now she has a choice about how she lives it.

We have not known anything like the kind of loss of freedom Nazanin faced but, during the last two years, like her, our choices have been restricted or at least directed. We have been told to stay at home, wear a mask, not travel or visit family, isolate from others and stay safe to keep others safe. This month, many of us have our long awaited freedom back, and this too is good news; thanks, of course, to all the health professionals who got us to this point and the people who helped us along the way.

Many of us are now looking to the future, making plans to celebrate missed birthdays or attending delayed weddings and baptisms. There is much going on in the world to concern us but there is hope too, and opportunities for good times and good news stories.

It was encouraging to see the initial response to the crisis in the Ukraine and the donations of goods and money flowing in to go out to those in need. As I write several people from our local community are travelling to Poland to deliver some of these supplies. In opposition to the evil invasion of our neighbours, we rose up in defiant kindness and generosity. Inspired by the courage of the people of Ukraine and the hospitality of some of their neighbours we have chosen to act.

In his letter to the Galatians Paul wrote "For freedom Christ has set us free". Christians believe that Jesus died on the cross and rose from the dead that all creation might be freed from sin and death. On Easter day we celebrate God's gift to us in our Saviour, Jesus Christ and give thanks that in him, we are free. In a world where freedom is a gift that not all enjoy, how we choose to use it, may be more important then ever. *...For you were called to freedom, brothers and sisters; only do not use your freedom as*

an opportunity for self-indulgence, but through love become slaves to one another. For the whole law is summed up in a single commandment, "You shall love your neighbour as yourself." Galatians 5:13-14

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Thanks

"THOMAS TYSON begs to return his sincere and grateful Thanks to the Inhabitants of St. Bees for their able and devoted Assistance in extinguishing the Fire at the NEW HOTEL, in that village, on Tuesday evening last; and particularly to Lloyd James Esq.,who gave the first Alarm, and to Mr. Atkinson, Railway Contractor, and Mr. Isaac Dickinson who were the first to enter the Building, regardless of Danger, and laudably exerted themselves to



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extinguish the Flames, by which Exertions the House, though greatly Injured, was ultimately saved from utter Destruction".

Last month's History page told how, as the workmen were finishing the building we now know as "Grindal", an attempt was made to burn it down. In fact, there were two attempts, just evenings apart, but the first was not recognised as arson at the time.

Thomas Tyson's notice, above, appeared in the "Cumberland Pacquet and Ware's Whitehaven Advertiser" four days after the second attempt. The same issue announced a Reward: £50 would be given by Mr. Tyson, and £100 by his Insurer, for information leading to the arsonists' conviction. These were handsome sums indeed – totalling over £12,000 in today's values. But as far as I can discover, no one was convicted of the crime, and no rewards were paid. (If anyone reading this knows differently, I would be grateful to hear).

I hardly like to think what the punishment would have been had an arsonist been caught. In those days the Courts awarded sentences which seem to us now quite savage. In this same year an elderly pauper who found and kept a pocket watch went to Hard Labour for two years, and a youth of sixteen years who stole six bottles of wine from a Whitehaven warehouse was transported to a Penal Colony for eighteen. Did folk in St. Bees have any suspicions about who was responsible for the Hotel fire? James Brindle, farmer and proprietor of the Seacote Hotel, would hardly have welcomed the competition – could he be in any way involved? It seems very unlikely, but the truth is that we just don't know.

There was nothing in existence in those days like today's Police Force with its detective arm, and Law and Order were very much the affair of the Parish Constables. Two were appointed each year by the village's Ratepayers from amongst their own number, to serve unpaid for that year only. Quite often in St. Bees they were from the village's shopkeepers; they might have had excellent local knowledge, but probably poor expertise as detectives.

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Young people's questionnaire

St Bees Parish Council devised a questionnaire to find out about the facilities and activities young people would like to see in St Bees. The questionnaire asked young people to choose their preferred three facilities and activities from a list of nine, as well as providing the opportunity to suggest their own ideas. 76 questionnaires were completed by 10 - 16-year-olds, which is estimated to be 50% of that age group in St Bees.

Analysis of preference ranked the nine listed facilities and activities as follows, starting with the most popular:

Facilities for skateboards/BMX/scooters
Basketball hoop
Ball wall
Volleyball on the beach
Opportunities for voluntary work

Teen café Outdoor gym equipment Teen shelter Outdoor table tennis

Of the 60 young people that gave ideas for other facilities and activities, 23% suggested various sporting activities, 18% an Astroturf pitch, 17% a youth club, 12% cycle paths and 12% non-sporting activities such as film showings, drama, art and music.

St Bees Parish Council is now looking into the feasibility of the various facilities and activities, while taking into account young people's preferences, to help determine the next step for this project.

Thank you to everyone that helped to distribute the questionnaire to young people.

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


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Parish Council News

Consultation on changes to parking restrictions – Some residents will have received a letter from Cumbria County Council about proposed changes to parking restrictions. The proposals include making the time limited parking on Main Street a disc zone, extending the double yellow lines on Finkle Street and putting double yellow lines across the junction of Main Street and Sea Mill Lane to keep the junction clear of parked vehicles. The Parish Council had no prior information on what was proposed and will be considering its response to the consultation at its meeting on 21 March. At this stage it is just a preliminary consultation and CCC is seeking comments by 11 April.

Beach Toilets and Play Area - the Parish Council is arranging for the ladies and gents toilets to be deep-cleaned and some doors etc repainted in readiness for the start of the summer season. Work will also be carried out to refurbish the disabled toilet. There are a number of repairs outstanding at the play area but the Parish Council has authorised the expenditure and hopes to have most of the repairs completed by the start of the summer season. We would remind everyone that dogs are not allowed in the play area and that the equipment is intended for those aged 14 and under and should not be used by adults.

Izaro Anchor – the anchor from the SS Izaro is now back in place on the Wainwright wall. The Parish Council is very grateful to the lifeboat crew who have kept the anchor in safe keeping for some months after it became loose and have now fitted it back into position – not an easy task as it is extremely heavy!

Beach clean - Thank you to the 16 volunteers that attended the litter pick at St Bees Beach in March. The next organised beach clean, which is part of the Great British Spring Clean, is on Saturday 9 April, meeting at 10 a.m. at St Bees Lifeboat Station. Litter pickers and bags are provided, but please bring your own gloves. Thank you for your help to keep St Bees Beach clean.

Footpath from Beach Rd to Beach estate – the light on the pedestrian footpath has been out of action for some weeks but the Parish Council has been working with the officer responsible for footway lighting at CBC and we hope to see it back in operation soon.

Faulty street lights and highways problems – Cumbria Highways has introduced a new reporting system which they hope will make it easier for residents to report problems such as faulty lights, pot holes etc. The County Council web-site (www.cumbria.gov.uk) has an online form which can be used or faults can be reported by telephone (0300 303 2992). Those reporting problems will receive a reference number and a confirmation email when action has been taken. If the problem isn't resolved, please contact the Clerk who will follow up the issue.

Beach car park lights – Copeland Borough Council has arranged for new LED lighting units to be fitted to the lights in the beach car park and for the damaged columns to be replaced. It is hoped that the lights will be back in operation shortly. CBC also has plans to repaint the lighting columns.

RNLI

Just before 2:40 p.m. on Thursday 10 March the volunteers at St Bees RNLI were requested by Belfast Coastguard to assist two windsurfers reported to be in difficulties about five miles south of the lifeboat station. St Bees volunteers launched their lifeboat Joy Morris MBE on Thursday afternoon after a member of the public had reported seeing what looked like two windsurfers struggling just off the beach near Nethertown. The lifeboat crew made their way to where the two had last been seen and began a search of the area. The two windsurfers were found making their way up the coast. As soon as the lifeboat crew had confirmed they were both OK and not in need of assistance, they left them to enjoy the rest of their day and returned to the station.

Dick Beddows, St Bees RNLI Lifeboat Operations Manager said 'This was a false alarm with good intent. We would like to thank the member of the public who did the right thing by dialling 999 and asking for the Coastguard'.

A celebration and a request for forgiveness


