

St Bees RNLI seeks new recruits

St Bees RNLI is looking for volunteers to join the existing team in the roles of either Inshore Lifeboat Crew or Deputy Launch Authority (DLA).

AS CREW - help us save lives at sea by ensuring that our lifeboats are in a state of permanent readiness and crewing the lifeboat on service and exercise, under the command of the Helm.

What you will be doing - Undertake training and maintain competence under the Competency Framework as necessary to fulfil the role of crew member; be on call for lifeboat 'shouts'; attend exercises & contribute to the overall upkeep of the station, lifeboats and equipment.

What you need for this role - Team player; good communicator; general fitness; ability to learn new skills; live or work within close proximity of the station and be between 17 and 55 years of age.

AS DLA - carrying out the day to day management of the lifeboat station to ensure a permanent state of readiness for service.

What you will be doing - Authorise launch of the lifeboats; provide leadership in the absence of the Lifeboat Operations Manager or as delegated; ensure that all operational activities are carried out to maintain the lifeboats and all associated equipment in a constant state of readiness for launching on service.

What you need for this role - Team player; good communicator; leadership skills; local maritime knowledge; IT literate (desirable); knowledge of the RNLI (desirable)

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Village School News

We've had a great start to the Spring term, welcoming all our children back to school in the new year. They have settled in very quickly and are working hard in what will be a very busy term with exciting visits and events coming up over the next few months.

We are thrilled that our VSA is starting up again with their first meeting having already taken place. Every parent is automatically a member and it would be wonderful if as many parents as possible could support the new team and see how you can help enhance the children's experiences through the work of the VSA.

We have started the new term with a bang, having an outdoor education expert advisor visit school to support us in developing our extensive outdoor areas. Our aim is to enhance children's experiences at school by increasing opportunities for learning outdoors as well as developing their skills and knowledge about nature, wildlife, our environment, how we can nurture these and look after them for ourselves and future generations. Our plans include three phases:

- Develop a natural boundary of hedging and small fruit/nut bearing trees around school that will attract wildlife;
- Develop a small orchard and vegetable patch on an unused part of our field for school and community use and
- Establish planted seating areas around school for the community use.

In addition, we are creating a wilding area on our bottom fenced field which will also house a memorial garden for the village school and village community to place items in memory of loved ones as well as a sensory area by the wooden gazebo. We are going to develop this to support our Early Years outdoor provision, curriculum provision throughout school and provide children with a space to develop and shape themselves. We will keep you up to date with our progress as we move forward with our plans and would be hugely grateful of any help and support throughout the project.

Following our achievement of the Philosophy for Children (P4C) Bronze award last year, we have embarked on the Silver Award this term. We are delighted to continue to be part of the programme and are looking forward to continuing to develop and strengthen children's critical, collaborative, creative & caring thinking skills throughout the project.

Our application to join Changing Lives Learning Trust (formerly West Lakes Multi-Academy Trust) is underway and we are hoping to hear from the DfE as to whether or not we have been successful by the end of this half term.

We are currently accepting applications to our Nursery class which are filling up fast, with a waiting list for the following academic year already started. We look forward to meeting all our new starters when the time comes. If you know anyone who is looking for a place please ask them to call the main office for a pack as the closing date is fast approaching and spaces are very limited.

Duke of Edinburgh Bronze Award (volunteering section)

Over the last three months I have been involved in a project called 'The Big Seaweed Search' for the 'Natural History Museum and Marine Conservation Society'.

I wanted to volunteer for an environmental project that was going to provide a national benefit and I wanted to share with you my experience of being part of such an important environmental input.

The purpose of the project was to provide data to help monitor the effects of the environmental change on Britain's sea life by exploring the seashore and recording the living seaweeds that I have found.

The recording of seaweeds is very important to support the research on three key environmental issues: rising sea temperature, the arrival and spread of non-native species of seaweeds, ocean acidification - the sea becoming more acidic because of absorbing carbon dioxide from the air

So what did I do?

I attended St Bees beach weekly at low tide times

Selected an area where seaweed was present on hard structures such as rocks, sea walls Surveyed the area - identified and took photographs of the different types of seaweed Recorded the information and photographs gained on the survey website

The most common seaweed I have found was knotted wrack and bladder wrack on St Bees beach.

The results of the seaweed search will help to map the seaweed distribution on the British shores which is vital information to help provide an understanding of the impact of climate change, ocean acidification and non-native seaweed on our shores. It will take time to pick up change but this information is helping to gain invaluable baseline information.

Christmas Past

Far too often, the Editor's deadline for this page catches up with me before I've anything to say. That's not so this month, however, for several kind folk have asked me to repeat here something from the Priory's Christmas Tree Festival.

It is not always remembered that during the War Years Christmas trees were rather frowned upon. They did nothing for the War Effort, and no labour or transport could be spared for something so merely frivolous. Worse, some people even supposed a German connection, for the idea of



bringing decorated trees indoors had begun with Victoria's husband Prince Albert. Locally-sourced holly and ivy might be a different matter.

Late in 1941 two middle-aged ladies were directed to war-work in a Chivers jam factory near Cambridge. They talked together as they graded the fruit. One said how much her little great-niece Thelma would be missing by never having a tree to decorate at the centre of her Christmas.

Next morning the other arrived at work with a little artificial tree in her bicycle basket. At less than a foot high, It was shabby and bare in places, and clearly the coming Christmas would be far from the first it had known. But, the lady said, she would like little Thelma to have the tree to care for until the day of Victory finally arrived, and real trees indoors could be part of Christmas again.

And that is what happened. On every one of over eighty more Christmas mornings that shabby little tree has had a place of honour in Thelma's home. A poor heirloom, some will think, and quite without value, but while its story is remembered I believe it will go on appearing as an annual reminder of one kind wartime act.

Parish Council News

Beach Cleans- The next organised beach clean is on Thursday 16th February, 1 till 2.30pm, meeting at the Lifeboat Station. Litter pickers and gloves are available to borrow. Thank you for your help to keep St Bees beach clean.

Flooding & Drainage – Several areas in the parish were badly affected by flooding and drainage problems during the heavy rain on New Year's Eve. There was a lengthy discussion of the issues at the January Parish Council meeting and our County Councillor is working with officers from Cumbria County Council to try to find solutions to prevent a recurrence. Highways officers believe that the problems are not simply due to the drains being unable to cope with the volume of surface water falling on the road but that in many areas the problems are caused wholly or partly by run-off from the adjacent land. Landowners are under a legal obligation to take steps to prevent soil running off on to the highway and Cumbria Highways are talking to landowners about their responsibilities. This is unlikely to bring an immediate solution and the Parish Council will continue to press for improvements to the aged infrastructure to avoid future problems.

Budget & Precept- The Parish Council approved its budget for 2023/24 at its December meeting. As household budgets are under pressure at the moment, the Parish Council has tried to keep its precept increase as low as possible, raising it by £2000 to £54000. It is likely that this will increase the charge on a Band D property by around 5p per week.

Roads & Potholes – There are a large number of deep potholes on the village roads which have been made worse by recent heavy rain. Cumbria Highways are aware of the problems and the Parish Council hopes that these will be repaired as soon as possible. We have been told that Highways will be carrying out patching on Beach Rd in early March and will create an opening in the wall alongside the road to make it easier for pedestrians crossing to/from the path to the Beach estate.

Signage – New signage is to be put in place at the top of Sea Mill Lane to warn drivers that it is a narrow cul de sac with a low bridge.

Parish Council Meeting –. The next Parish Council meeting will take place on MONDAY 20 FEBRUARY at 6.30 pm in the Village Hall. All council meetings are open to the public and all are welcome to attend.
