Happy Easter everyone. Funny word Easter? Well yes, it is. Although, it is intimately linked with the Christian Celebration of the Resurrection its origin lies with the pagan Anglo – Saxon world view and is derived from the goddess of fertility and Springtime – "Eostre" of course there are many ways of celebrating Easter. Of course Easter is also a season so in theory you could eat Simnel cake for weeks. However, you celebrate Easter may it be a time of happiness and rejoicing "Christos Anesti – Anastithike alithina"

Parish Council News

Tom Milburn – the Parish Council was saddened to hear of the death of Tom Milburn and sends its condolences to his family. Tom looked after the beach toilets on behalf of the Parish Council for more than 10 years, stepping into the breach when the Parish Council took over the running of the toilets at very short notice after CBC decided to close them. He continued to clean and maintain the toilets daily until just a few months ago. Tom was always supportive of other initiatives of the Parish Council and he will be much missed.

Planning Application for holiday pods – the application for holiday pods on a site on Nethertown Rd was approved by Cumberland Council's Planning Committee on 19 February. The consultant engaged by the Parish Council spoke against the application but members decided to follow officer's advice and approve the application with a number of conditions.

Devolution- The government is proposing to create a joint mayoral authority to cover the areas of Cumberland Council and Westmorland & Furness Council and is inviting comments from residents. If the proposal goes ahead, the joint authority would have powers delegated by central government in areas such as transport but most services would continue to be provided by the two unitary authorities. The consultation runs until 13 April and the consultation document can be found on the gov.uk website - https://consult.communities.gov.uk/lggc/cumbria-devolution-consultation


Station car park- the Parish Council is arranging for a contractor to fill a number of potholes which have developed in the car park over the winter. We understand that the damaged wall is to be repaired by Northern Rail.

Dogs on the beach-Current regulations do allow dogs to be off a lead on the beach itself but they must be on a lead on the grassed areas and dogs are not allowed at all on the play area. There have been reports of children being frightened by dogs running loose on the beach so we would ask owners to ensure that their dogs are under close control, particularly when there are children playing.

Noticeboard at Rottington- the Parish Council has agreed to provide a new noticeboard at Rottington after the old noticeboard was damaged beyond repair during recent storms.

Seagull proof refuse sacks —Cumberland Council has a supply of bird proof sacks which can be made available to those who do not have waste bins and rely on refuse bags. The sacks will protect the plastic bags from being damaged by birds/animals. The sacks will be available for collection from the Market Hall in Whitehaven from April.

Anti-social behaviour — There have recently been several reports of antisocial behaviour and minor damage around the village. If anyone sees unacceptable behaviour, please report it to the police so that they have a full picture of what is happening.

St Bees Priory has had an AED for sometime but it is now officially registered on "the Circuit", so that anyone and, importantly, the Ambulance service can guide people to access it in an emergency. The circuit tells folk when the AED is available (8.30-6pm) and whereabouts in the Priory it can be found. The circuit also reminds us when to change the pads and batteries!

The AED is in a well marker cupboard, on your right, as you come into the Priory. There is also a folder with clear instructions as to how to use the AED and resuscitate a child or adult in extremis. NWAS have also offered to come to Pop in to show folk how to use an AED that might save the life of you or a friend!

Results of Parish Council Bus Survey

Thank you to everyone who completed our recent bus survey. This was developed after our environmental project questionnaire showed significant interest in a bus route through the parish so that we could understand more about why residents want to travel by bus and about these possible journeys.101 surveys were completed.

The two most common reasons given for wanting to travel by bus were to travel to destinations not served by the train and the unreliability of the trains. Other popular responses for wanting the option of bus travel were to avoid driving, convenience, being a non-driver and to save money.

Just under a quarter of respondents had used the most recent bus service through St Bees that was run by Hobans (November 2021 & March 2023. The most common reasons given for not using this bus were unsuitable timetable/timings, they didn't live in St Bees then, they didn't know about the bus service, the destination was unsuitable, the pick-up location was unsuitable or they didn't have information about bus timings and stops.

When asked where they would like to travel to by bus, over 60% of respondents mentioned Whitehaven and over 40% of respondents mentioned Egremont. 29 further destinations in Cumbria were mentioned, including Workington, Cockermouth, Keswick, Cleator Moor, Gosforth, the hospital and Seascale.

Although respondents undertake most journeys by car or train to the preferred destinations they gave for bus travel, using a taxi or car share was also commonly mentioned, with some of these journeys also taken by bike or on foot.

Although over half of respondents had access to a car the whole time, around a fifth had access to a car only some of the time and a further fifth didn't have access to a car at all.

The train station, St Bees Seafront and Main Street were the most popular choices for where respondents would like to get on and off a bus, though Fairladies junction, Abbey Vale and Rottington were chosen by a smaller number of residents.

Although the most popular times given for possible bus travel were 9-11am and 3-5pm on weekdays, the responses indicated a demand throughout the day and week for bus travel, not just on certain weekdays.

When asked how often they might use a bus through the parish, 2 or 3 times a week was the most popular choice and around three-quarters of respondents indicated they would use a bus at least once a week if it were available.

When asked for further comments these broadly either favoured the suggestion of a bus, reinforced previous reasons given for why a bus through the parish would be beneficial or highlighted that a bus would need to be frequent, reliable and stop multiple places in St Bees and beyond to be well-used. One response also suggested a service similar to the Muncaster Microbus.

Around one-third of respondents who completed the survey had a concessionary bus pass. The results of our bus survey have been sent to Cumberland Council for consideration alongside their own bus consultation.

St Bees Green Future

Update on pen and dental item recycling:

The pen recycling scheme, sponsored by Rymans, has now ended, so we have removed the recycling tub from St Bees Post Office.

The dental item recycling scheme, sponsored by Philips, has also ended, so the recycling tub from outside 61 Main Street has also been removed. You can still recycle toothpaste tubes and electric toothbrush heads via the collection point at Boots in Whitehaven.
