# July - August 2024

When I was three years old my dad taught me to say "The Workers!" when he asked "Who owns the rights to the means of production?" Once Clause 4 of the Labour Party Constitution, but not since Blair's government, this was a key feature of my dad's socialist beliefs. Unfortunately, it was in direct opposition to my maternal grandparents more conservative views. I remember heated debates around the table at meals with my grandparents, this was during the Thatcher era, my grandparents worshipped the ground she walked on, my dad was not a fan.

These days debates around the dining table continue and across the generations our politics differ. Sometimes still heated but they are always respectful. I have spent all my life in the company of people who I disagree with, sometimes passionately; in my home and in my work places. I have learnt that difference of opinion is healthy and honest. We are made more whole when we listen with love even when we don't like what we hear. Often it makes us more certain of our beliefs, occasionally we change our minds. By the time you read this the General Election will either be very close or will have taken place. The Church of England produced a useful little booklet with prayers for the twenty one days before election day. It reminded us that to vote is to have a say in the future but in 2019 1 in 3 of those eligible did not vote. The author goes on to say "Across the political spectrum, we believe that those who offer themselves for public office need and deserve our support and our prayer." 1 Timothy 2 v 1-4 "urges us to pray for those who make difficult decisions on our behalf, who shoulder great burdens and, who we pray will carry out their duty with integrity and compassion".

Jeremiah calls us to pray for the "shalom" of our land. (Ch 29v 4-7) "Shalom means peace, stability, prosperity and rest. Shalom will depend on wise leadership so we pray for all candidates who are standing. We must all accept differences and try to understand them so we are asked to pray "for all party leaders that they may speak and act in ways that build up rather than undermine".

"We are creatures of curiosity and education feeds our deep desire to learn, to explore, to create and to discover. We pray for wisdom and compassion to those who teach, strength for those who lead our schools and guidance to those who set policy so that everyone can flourish and everyone belong."

"Our government is led by real people with their own joys and struggles who offer their gifts in public service. Let us pray for then and care for them. We pray for both the government and the opposition in the coming days...Grant to the nation unity, peace and concord." Christian Aid has also put together some useful resources with which you can challenge your new MP in relation to Putting Peace first as well as achieving Debt and Climate justice. Whatever the outcome of this General Election may we know kindness in

disappointment, patience in disagreement, curiosity in ignorance and love in difference. In Jesus' name. Amen.

**Sellafield heritage discovery** is on display in St Bees Railway Museum thanks to Sellafield Ltd.

Peter Rooke, retired civil engineer, has displayed the name plate of a former British Rail loco known as "Calder Hall Power Station" at the museum. It was donated by Sellafield Ltd, having been unearthed by the Heritage Team

British Rail began ferrying coal to power stations, then switched to taking spent nuclear fuel flasks to Sellafield. Peter says "Cumbria's industrial history is an interesting part of the history of the local railway network..

# Parish Council News

**Outrigg Flooding** -The Area Highways Manager has confirmed that work to resolve the flooding problem is going according to plan. Work is currently taking place on private land so may not be immediately obvious but the work is scheduled to be completed before the end of July. It will be necessary for the road to be closed for a few days in mid-July to allow the final stage of the work to be completed but this should provide a long term solution to the flooding problems.

**Highways Issues** – the Parish Council is continuing to work with Highways officers on the issues of pedestrian safety on Abbey Road where there are sections with no pavements. Concerns have also been raised about traffic safety on the B5345 near the entrance to Abbey Vale. Traffic speeds up as it leaves the village and vehicles are often exceeding 30mph as they enter the village from the Whitehaven direction. The junction is not easily seen and visibility is poor for drivers exiting Abbey Vale. The Parish Council will be working with Highways and the local police to find ways to improve safety in this area. The Parish Council would like to see the 30mph limit in the village replaced with a 20mph limit and will be pressing Highways to consider the re-introduction of a 20mph limit.

**Rewilding of Beach Rd Verge** – plans to create an area of wildflowers along a section of the verge to attract pollinating insects is continuing. The project is supported by Cumbria Wildlife Trust's Planting for Pollinators Project. The work to install fibre optic cables did result in some damage to the verge but, with help from Viberoptix, more plants will be put in once the area is cut back later in the summer.

**Donations** – The Parish Council has recently given a donation of £300 to Cumbria North Girl Guiding to help with costs of a visit to Canada over the summer, which several young people from our area will be attending. The Parish Council has a small budget to make donations to local groups. This is normally distributed in November so if your organisation/group is interested in applying, we would love to hear from you in the autumn.

**Annual Accounts** – the Parish Council's annual accounts for 2023/24 are now with the external auditor. A copy can be found on the website (<u>www.stbees.org.uk</u>) together with details of the right to view the accounts.

**Next meeting-**. The next meeting will be on Monday 15 July at 6.30pm in the Village Hall. The Parish Council does not meet during August, although business will be continuing in the background. The September meeting will take place on Monday 16 September. The Parish Council is always keen to hear the views of residents and there is a slot on every agenda for members of the public to raise items which they would like the Parish Council to consider, so why not come along?

Please do *"just one thing*" this summer. Choose to swap to a Fair trade product, whether it's the above, or coffee, bananas, cosmetics or olive oil, it will enable producers to have secure and sustainable livelihoods and help them protect the planet through biodiversity, less use of pesticides, tree planting and water sustainability. 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# **Bob's Jottings**

#### Harry Nankivel again.

If you have been following Harry's story through the most recent magazines, please be assured its end is coming soon.

We last saw Harry as a returning soldier, back in St Bees after nearly nine years away. Two years had gone to opposing the Boers in South Africa; before that had been long postings to Tibet and then India, where the Empire still had major interests to protect. During his absence from St Bees much had been happening here: the returning Harry would have noticed the beginnings of a new optimism and confidence about the future. Modern and superior houses were replacing some that had been tumbledown or derelict, and thanks to the new Parish Council the worst parts of Main Street were being resurfaced, and its lighting and footpaths improved.

Another change significant to the village had followed the closure of the Theological College. Households, which had formerly provided lodgings for students, now needed fresh sources of income. One such household was at what we now number as 44 Main Street. The husband there had gone abroad in the distant past, leaving his wife totally abandoned. Harry may have known this lady through the Priory Choir, which then had a ladies' section, and having nowhere of his own in the village he was pleased to take her spare room as lodger. This arrangement served the needs of both of them, and looked like lasting happily for years.

Then its ending was unfortunate. When word spread around the village that a baby was coming to number 44, there were doubtless many ready to assume it to be Harry's. Whatever the truth of the matter, Harry's reputation in the village mattered to him, and he could see only problems ahead. He conferred with his father and his two brothers (all three now Church of England clergymen) and each gave him the same counsel. He must leave St Bees and everything it held for him, and start his life afresh in some place totally different.

By the month's end he had boarded ship for Australia.

The garden party brought together around 2,500 long-serving RNLI volunteers, staff and their families and featured an Atlantic 85 inshore lifeboat in the palace grounds. Among those attending were lifeboat crew, lifeguards, water safety volunteers, fundraisers and recent recipients of meritorious service awards and honours in the King's Birthday and New Year Honours Lists.

Alastair Graham and Ian Wrigley (40 years' service) and Chris Evans (20 years' service) travelled to Buckingham Palace to represent St Bees RNLI. Ian and Alastair are currently volunteer Helms and Chris has had various roles at St Bees including Helm and launch vehicle driver. Chris Evans said "It was a great honour and a surprise to get invited to Buckingham Palace. It was a great opportunity to meet other volunteers from around the UK and Ireland including our colleagues at Workington RNLI, and a wonderful experience for Ian, Alastair and me".

# Chairman's Report for the year to 1<sup>st</sup> April 2024

# **Cumberland Council**

Cumberland Council became fully operative on 1<sup>st</sup> April 2023. Since then Cllr Graham Minshaw has attended PC meetings as our ward councillor to gather information about village issues and brief us on activities of the new council. Cumberland Council is the only tier of government now between the Parish and Westminster, and we are starting to see the benefits of consolidating the former Copeland and Cumbria Councils' activities in Cumberland Council.

# Traffic calming and safety

The volume and speed of post-Covid peak traffic through the village has remained at tolerable levels due to Sellafield dramatically reducing the amount of private car traffic to their site during Covid; though there has been a slight increase towards the end of the year as more people were required to attend their main site. The speed-watch camera group has operated through the summer months; many thanks to those volunteers who perform this worthwhile duty.

# Cycle track link to Whitehaven and C2C cycleway

This project concept has huge support locally and would enable a level-access walking and cycle route along the valley bottom to Whitehaven and the national cycle network. Little progress has been made in the year, as there are still route uncertainties influenced by the proposed coal mine rail-loading facility.

# Station travel hub

Our station car park extension plan, which would yield about 25 new parking spaces in the centre of the village, plus land for public off-street electric car charging, is making progress with stakeholders. These include Cumberland Council, Sellafield Ltd, and Network Rail. As we now have the offer of a 50-year lease for the existing car park, and agreement on the use of the adjacent land from Cumberland Council, work is proceeding to the design and costing stage.

# **Community projects**

The parish council once again organised the Christmas tree on Cross Hill and the Santa parade followed by switching on of the tree lights. The village was toured by Santa with an escort peloton of cycling elves, and a large number of villagers turned out to watch. Money was collected for the RNLI.

# The "Light District" and Village profile

The audio-visual light show in the Priory "Space: God, The Universe And Everything" attracted nearly 2,000 people over the two nights it was shown. It was good to see something of this quality coming to the west. It was facilitated by Cumbria Tourism partnering with the Parish Council and the Priory and managed by Cumberland Council. The idea sprang out of contacts made at our meetings with Network Rail and the Community Rail Partnership, and is part of our policy of raising the profile of the village.

# **Tree planting and Priory Paddock**

We have been planting trees since 1973 - 'Plant a tree in seventy-three' and we are still planting and maintaining trees around the parish on marginal area and land we manage. Work is also continuing on maintaining and improving the Priory Paddock wildlife area, which now has an information board and signing from the main road.

#### **Interpretation boards**

Following the installation of boards at Stonehouse garden and the beach, an additional board is now sited at the entrance to the Priory. Future sites for 2024-25 include one adjacent to the notice board on the Main Street, and the Dandy Walk.

# Beach litter and dog fouling

We are working with Cumberland Council to implement more bird-proof litter bins at the beach, and we have continued the dog dispenser system. We continue to supply dog bags via the five dispensers around the village and have requested Cumberland Council to respray the "pick up after your dog" stencils on pavements and at the seafront.

## Outrigg play area

We have been planning a significant upgrade and refurbishment of the Outrigg play area. The equipment has been owned and maintained by the Parish Council since the 1960s, but land ownership by Cumbria CC has made grant funding difficult. We are hopeful that with land ownership changes due to the Changing Lives Multi-Academy Trust taking over the Village School, this situation will improve.

## Planning

The parish council is a statutory consultee for planning consent, and we have been monitoring the Planning Inspectorate scrutiny of the Copeland local plan prior to adoption, which should be in June 2024. Part of this involves proposed development areas in St Bees. We have made representations about the unsuitability of village roads for larger scale developments and the need to stay with the village development boundaries to prevent ribbon development along highways. We continue to exercise due diligence on reviewing all plans submitted within the parish.

# **Footpaths and Seats**

We have continued to inspect footpaths in introduce improvements where necessary. A number of walks have been organised, and new walk guides have been published on the web site continue to be popular. It is hoped to improve the kissing gate from the business centre car park to accommodate push-chairs along the track. Initial work is being done on improving the Dandy walk to give it a better surface so that push-chairs can easily be used on it.

## Green initiatives and Climate Change

We continue to organise monthly beach cleans, which are well attended. A Climate Change Working Group has been formed, with parish councillors and representatives from the community working together to explore how as a parish we can take further action on climate change.

In September 2023 we held an event with Cumbria Wildlife Trust to plant wildflowers behind the wall on Beach Road, which will provide a habitat for pollinators. The wildflowers were planted by community volunteers and pupils from St Bees Village School.

The Parish Council's Climate Change Working Group has started a project to map the wildlife in the parish. The Climate Change Working Group has also developed a questionnaire to determine interest in possible environmental projects to take forward, which will be shared with residents shortly.

## Volunteers and New Councillors

The council attracts a number of volunteers and groups for help with specific tasks such as; play inspections, the web site, tree-planting, defibrillators, footpaths, public area maintenance, Village in Bloom, special events, speed-watch and beach cleaning. We would like to thank all those who have helped; the council is a bigger thing than just monthly meetings.

However, we are running with three vacancies on the council – really the first protracted vacancies since 1895. This is a hands-on council, and whilst we are supported by many volunteers,
