Becky will be on sick leave for the month of June, returning to her duties in July. We also send best wishes to those who have been in hospital - Ken Richardson and Julie Banks – and remember them in our prayers.

**Priory Donations to the Ukraine Appeal** – Grateful thanks to all who donated, many with gift-aid, to the Christian Aid Emergency Appeal for Ukraine in March/April raising a wonderful total of £475.05. Special thanks to Frank Bowler whose Holy Week organ recital raised £95.05 included in that total. Also Tom Kelly reports that eleven vanloads of goods from St Bees (Independent School and Priory) and Cleator Moor were sent out to Szczecin in Poland with essential healthcare aid - thanks to local packers and drivers, and generous donors of baby food, medical packs and toiletries and much more.

#### Parish Council News

Cumberland Council elections – the elections for the new Cumberland Council took place on Thursday 5 May. Graham Minshaw was elected to represent Egremont North/St Bees. The new Cumberland Council will exist in shadow form until 1 April 2023 and councillors will spend the first year setting a budget, appointing officers and planning for delivery of services. Until 1 April 2023 (known as Vesting Day) all services will continue to be provided by the existing Copeland Borough Council and Cumbria County Council and our existing ward councillors, Jeff Hailes (CBC) and Chris Whiteside (CCC) will remain the points of contact for queries/questions.

Changes to recycling collections – from October this year CBC will begin to introduce a new system for kerbside recycling. The existing recycling boxes and cardboard recycling bag will be replaced by two wheeled bins. The bin with a red lid will be for metal, plastic and glass with the blue lidded bin being used for paper and carboard. This will reduce the sorting which householders need to do and the bins will be more weatherproof. CBC is aware that some properties may not have room to store the bins and will contact householders affected to find alternatives. CBC is holding a series of roadshows around the area to explain the new system and staff will be on hand to answer questions. If you missed the event in St Bees Village Hall on 25 May, there will also be events in Egremont Market Hall on 29 June (4-7pm), Mirehouse Community Centre on 14 July (4-7pm) and Whitehaven Market Place on 9 July (10am -3pm). An information leaflet with Questions & Answers can be found on the CBC website.

**Bank Holiday Refuse Collections** – CBC has announced that refuse collections will take place as usual over the bank holidays in June and August.

Heritage Trail – the Parish Council has designed a new interpretation board highlighting points of interest in the village. The new board is now in place at Stonehouse Garden. It is planned to have similar boards at the beach and by the Priory to encourage visitors to explore the area. A new sign has also been designed to replace the outdated tourist sign by the level crossing which it is hoped CCC will install.

**Beach Toilets** – the refurbishment of the disabled toilet at the beach has been completed in readiness for the summer season. The donation boxes which were recently installed have already contributed over £100 to help with the costs of maintaining the toilets.

**Parish Council Meeting** –. The June Parish Council meeting will take place on MONDAY 20 JUNE at 6.30pm in the Village Hall.

#### St Bees Hotel

This magazine's History pages have been telling the story of "The St. Bees Royal Hotel" – the building opposite the Station now known to us as "Grindal". Last month we reached 1849, when James Brindle took on the tenancy. He already owned the "Seacote", but had to delay opening the "Royal" for several months after persons unknown had tried to burn it down.

James Brindle kept the "Royal" (or sometimes the "Railway") Hotel for only a few years. By 1857 the Richardson family had the tenancy, and with the sport of hound-trailing then so popular in Cumberland, the hotel became an acknowledged starting point for it. Later two maiden ladies had the Hotel, but I think it was becoming less successful by their time.

However that may be, the Grammar School next door was thriving. It had more boys than ever before, and new buildings and alterations to the old had not solved their space problem. Some boys were being lodged with families in the village, and others were having to go to the Royal for their meals. So perhaps it was natural that when the hotel came on the market the School should buy it.

This they did in 1888, with the Rev. William Hey Alderson appointed Housemaster of Grindal House. His sister served as Matron. Mr. Alderson, we are told, "was a greathearted man: a friend who could never be replaced". It is clear from the accounts of many Old Boys that they, and many Villagers too, had cause to be grateful to him. His study, always untidy and smelling of tobacco, was on Grindal's second floor, overlooking the Crease and the playing field. Generations of schoolboys attested to the welcome to be found there through all "Sambo's" thirty-four years as Housemaster. (Why "Sambo"? Nobody remembered. But the nickname was as much a part of Mr. Alderson as his monocle and his succession of ancient, battered hats).

Then in 1909 came another fire. It started after midnight in a store-room. The forty-odd boys all escaped, though without most of their possessions. Miss Alderson's piano in her first floor room crashed through to the day-room below; much of the building was gutted. Accounts vary in detail, but agree about Mr. Alderson, who realised that two of the smallest boys were stranded on the top floor. One was persuaded to jump, and was safely caught by Mr. Alderson; when the other dared not follow Mr. Alderson climbed the burning staircase to get to him. His arms and face were burned in the process and he spent the next six weeks in the Sanatorium.

Once again the building was repaired, and by 1910 it was back in service as Grindal House. Very different, perhaps, from the Luxury Hotel envisaged in 1847 by its builder Thomas Tyson, but fulfilling a purpose (which I understand is to continue) as a place for the care of the young.
