

St Bees News

November 2021

From 1939-1945 St Bees village was home to the "Mill Hill Boys"; two hundred and fifty evacuee students from London. They came with their teachers and school staff and made their home here, some even stayed on after their evacuation ended. St Bees must have seemed a world away from London for them, the open fields, fells and coastline so different from the busyness of a big city. Whilst their school in Mill Hill was used as a Military Hospital, the boarding houses of St Bees provided a place of refuge to youngsters and staff. Many of the Mill Hill boys have fond memories of their time in St Bees, a memorial to two of them, the founders of the "Old Millhillians Association" can be found in the Priory Paddock.

Over a thousand years before those boys arrived by train on an early autumn evening, another traveller seeking refuge arrived on our shores. According to legend, Bega, an Irish princess fleeing from a forced marriage, sailed alone to our coast across stormy seas seeking sanctuary. The village and Priory Church was named in her honour and each year we give thanks for her courage and her faith in a service of prayer on the eve of St Bega's Day, 7th November.

St Bees has a long and varied history of welcoming refugees. This welcome is no less needed today. In recent months the plight of those escaping the Taliban in Afghanistan has been in our headlines and on our hearts. St Bees Priory Church Council has taken a first step in responding to this desperate need by joining the "Welcome Churches Network"- a group of churches that have offered to be welcoming communities for refugees seeking to build a life here in the UK. As part of this network the Priory will be signposted to any refugees given accommodation in our locality. We look forward to welcoming them.

The Welcome Churches network website says that "Christians are called to love and welcome the stranger". This is simple to say but not so simple to do. To truly welcome someone who is different to myself sometimes involves an internal wrestling match between my faith and my prejudice. Faith wins the fight when I ask myself "What would Jesus do?" It's then that I'm reminded that if a church isn't welcoming then it isn't really a church at all.

This November the Priory extends a welcome to all, those with faith and those with none at all, to remember all those who have suffered as a result of war and to give thanks for those we have loved and lost.

Thanks to the website of Mill Hill School for the reminder of these words from John Wesley to close.

A Rule for Life

Do all the good you can, by all the means you can, in all the ways you can, in all the places you can, at all the times you can, to all the people you can,

as long as ever you can.

Parking – There have been times recently when bin collections and deliveries have been missed because vehicles parking along Seacroft Drive and in the entrance to Outrigg Close have made it impossible for large vehicles to reach properties. We would ask drivers to park considerately and leave room around the roads and junctions within the estate to ensure large vehicles can access properties.

The limited amount of off street parking in the village is a concern to everyone. Parish Council is continuing to progress the project to create additional off-street parking on land next to the existing station car park. Outline designs and ecological appraisal are being commissioned to provide the detail necessary for an outline planning application.

Litter bins- It has become apparent that litter bins in the village are being used for household rubbish which should instead be put out for the usual refuse collections. It would be helpful if those renting out property in the village could make sure that blue bags are available together with information on the timing of refuse collections.

Local Plan – The Parish Council has submitted its response to the proposed changes to the draft Local Plan. The Parish Council has welcomed the decision to remove the Scalebarrow site as a possible site for housing development and has objected to the proposed inclusion of a new site south of Fairladies. The Parish Council's view is that the elevated position of the site would mean that new development would have an unacceptable visual impact and the village infrastructure (roads, drains & services) are not able to cope with further expansion of the village.

CPR Training – Would you know what to do in the case of a cardiac arrest and how to use one of the three defibrillators available in the village? Our local First Responders have offered to provide a free training session for anyone interested. The session will take place on the evening of Monday 22 November in New College Hall. If you would like to book a place, please contact Amy Linton email amylinton1983@gmail.com If there is sufficient demand, further sessions will be organised.

GDF – The Copeland GDF Working Group has recommended that two areas within Copeland should be considered as possible sites for a geological disposal facility, one in mid-Copeland (Beckermet, Gosforth, Seascale area), the other in the south (Millom and Haverigg). If Copeland Borough Council accepts the recommendations, community partnerships will be established in each of the areas to involve the local communities as part of the next stage in the process. Although St Bees is not within the proposed mid-Copeland area, the Parish Council will continue to maintain an interest in the process.

Next Meeting – The next Parish Council meeting is scheduled to take place on Monday 15 November at 6.30pm in the Village Hall. Members of the public are always welcome to attend meetings.

As part of our 900 + years celebrations, we are planning a Christmas Tree Festival to be held in the Priory from Sunday 12 December 2021- Sunday 2 January 2022. 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Fifty Years Ago - Trevor Park

I was instituted to the living of St Bees in July 1971 by Bishop Cyril Bulley, and took on a second (unpaid) role as Chaplain and Head of RE at St Bees School. I came as a relatively inexperienced parish priest but found I had four church wardens who were more skilled in the ways of church life than I was, and they supported and guided me throughout my time as Vicar. These were John Kennedy and John Warbrick (newcomers to St Bees) and Billy Cottam and William Temple who were representative of the old farming and village community. The PCC was a highly professional body which included in its membership Sellafield scientists, staff from the School (Philip Barrett and Chris Robson), and two lawyers (Graham McKay who was Treasurer and John Todd who later became a Reader). No young priest coming to his first living could have been more blessed, not least because there was already a strong, all-age congregation with many young families and a good Sunday School led by Ann Irving. There was an impressive musical tradition thanks to Ted Robertson, the Priory organist, and to Brian Howard at the School, each of whom had trained a large choir to a high standard.

I had been advised to give myself six months to get the measure of the Parish and the School before making any changes, but I suggested the first one at Harvest: have the traditional Harvest Supper in the Priory straight after Evensong. Not everyone was happy at the idea of eating a meal in church or of re-arranging the pews to be able to do so, but it went ahead and was a great success thanks to Mary Cottam and Sally Kennedy and their team of co-workers. They produced a two course, top-notch meal to the standard of a good restaurant: white table linen, silver candlesticks, fine crockery and cutlery (borrowed from the Seacote Hotel), followed by half an hour's communal hymn singing. A tradition was born that evening which lasted for decades.

From later changes and new initiatives, all supported by the PCC, I recall three in particular. An eight day evangelistic parish mission led by Michael Green, Principal of St John's Theological College, aided by an excellent team of his students. Michael was a brilliant communicator and probably the best Evangelist in the C of E at that time. And later we had a mission in the School, led by a friend from my student days, John Gladwyn who was a Tutor at Durham University and a future bishop – he too came with a small band of students. Both those initiatives resulted in many changed lives; newly converted Christians and lifelong faithful followers of Christ who were strengthened in their faith. All that was then built on by Tom Smail, Director of the Fountain Trust, who led a memorable teaching weekend on the Person and work of the Holy Spirit.

Another lasting fruit of the 70s in the Parish and School (Philip Bryan succeeded me in 1977) was the number of young people who went on to be ordained: Malcolm MacNaughton who is now Bishop of Repton, Paul Maybury now a Residentiary Canon of Bradford Cathedral, Steve Mansfield now an Incumbent and Hon Canon in Chester Diocese, Canon Andrew Todd now a Director of Studies in the Church in Wales, Dr Tarjei Park now retired in London, and Canon Alison Kennedy now Precentor at Chelmsford Cathedral. Many more went on to find their Christian vocation as teachers, medics, scientists, engineers and much else.

For me, those years were a golden generation in the history of this parish, and that is thanks very largely to the witness, service and example of so many men and women who lived their faith and thereby inspired younger members of the community to do the same. And that same mission and ministry continues today thanks to the present generation of Christians in this place. Trevor Park

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An Old Village Character

Someone from our past whom I wish I could have known is Joseph William Rothery. Senior readers may remember him, for he lived here till 1954, notably hale and hearty till his death at eighty-nine.

Joe had been born at Allenby Hall Farm in Aspatria. Exactly when he came to St. Bees I do not know, but he lived first at Peckmill, then at Dale Cottage, and then for a long while at Marsh House at the bottom of Seamill Lane. He seems to have been one of those people who were known to, and liked by, everyone.

Over the years Joe had several labouring jobs, all within the village. Finally he was groundsman/caretaker at the golf course. In the summer he



and his wife Mary made extra money by selling refreshments from a hut at the Seacote end of the beach. While Mary served from the hut, Joe gave penny rides to children on his donkey – or on his pony, according to some. Quite possibly there were both, at different times. At the end of the day they would split the takings, Joe carrying the silver home by way of the clifftop, Mary taking the copper along the beach. Or the other way round, sometimes. It seems there could be muggers around, even then.

Joe and Mary brought ten children into the world – five boys and five girls. All but one reached adulthood. Sadly one girl - I think it was Sarah Ann, aged sixteen – died after being kicked by a horse. The eldest son Allen survived the Boer War unscathed, but was badly wounded in World War One. Two others also served in that war, Tom the fourth son being killed at Ypres. He was just nineteen – the T.D. Rothery on our war memorial.

We hear a little of the Rotheries in "St. Bees 1906–1919 - A Recollection". Fred Chinner had talked to Jackie Walker about his chilhood in the village, and she carefully recorded what he said. About Joe Rothery::

"....he was everything in the village ... and he had such a big family, you see. I forget how many there was but there was quite a number of boys and girls and they were characters in their day. Because they were so far away they hadn't time to go home for lunch or anything when they were at school. You see they used to nip over the wall into Mawson's garden and pinch turnips and rhubarb and that and eat them raw because there were no school dinners or anything in those days ..."

The lack of visitors since the Covid pandemic began has undoubtedly diminished the very essence of the school and schooling more generally and we are glad to have you all back.

I am also delighted to see new facilities being brought to bear. Not only are we now using the new drama studio, but we have our first students inducted into and using our gym again. For that we can thank all those who donated old equipment. It is also good to see boarders using our newly refurbished pool and snooker tables. We are a small school, but we will continue to do everything we can to upgrade the facilities and expand the range of options for our young people.

We can now look forward to the second half of term with confidence, and that is even with the diminishing daylight on our long afternoons. There will be plenty to keep the interest and not least more inter-house events, our Bonfire Night celebration on 5 November, to which you are all cordially invited, and the joys of the Advent season, the highlight of which will be our Christmas Dinner and Carol Service on Thursday 9 December. I hope everyone enjoys being together for Half Term and we look forward to welcoming you back, bright and early, on Monday 1 November, beginning the month and second half of term with energy and positivity.
