

"All good gifts around us Are sent from heav'n above; Then thank the Lord, O thank the Lord For all his love."

You may recognise these lyrics from a hymn that we usually sing at Harvest Festival - "We plough the fields and scatter". After a year of festivals without congregational singing we are really looking forward to raising our voices in the words of this joyful hymn in our Harvest service on the 17<sup>th</sup> October. Each year this special service gives us all the opportunity to thank God for his gifts of food and farming in our rural communities, to share these gifts with those who have less and to pray for those who suffer because of failing harvests in the wider world.

Christians believe that all good gifts are sent from our loving God. The season of harvest is a helpful reminder to be grateful for all his love and to share what we have received with those in need.

This year you might be grateful for the food on your table, the farmers who grew it or the delivery driver who brought it to your door. These are the usual things to give thanks for at harvest time. I wonder this year, if we might think a little wider; to consider all the good gifts we receive, especially the gift of love.

The Church of England recently published a document entitled "Living in Love and Faith". This book, and accompanying study guide, is part of the discernment process for the Anglican Church; seeking the way forward when it comes to matters relating to identity, sexuality, relationships and marriage. It acknowledges that we will need to listen to one another and to God as we share strongly held views on both sides of the debate.

Issues of gender and sexuality are intrinsic to our experience; our sense of identity; our lives and the loving relationships that shape and sustain them. These are some of the "good gifts" in our lives.

The "Living in Love and Faith" resources explore these intrinsic experiences by studying what the Bible, theology, history and the social and biological sciences have to say, and by telling the real-life stories of followers of Christ with diverse experiences and convictions. From the middle of November\* for five weeks St Bees parish will be joining with others; engaging, reflecting and praying through this material. We believe that the Holy Spirit will be active among us as we pray, study and deliberate together to discover Christ's call to the Church today. We do this with a deep sense of hopefulness for a future in which Christians can follow Christ together joyfully, fruitfully and with integrity.

This autumn and Advent let us explore together what it means to be human and to care deeply for our sisters and brothers.

### Parish Council News

**Outrigg Pavement** -Work is due to start in November to extend the length of the pavement -alongside Outrigg. There has been concern for some time about the safety of pedestrians in this area and it is hoped that an extension of the pavement will improve the situation, particularly for children and parents walking to /from the Village School. The work will be funded by CCC with a contribution from St Bees Parish Council.

Litter- With more people taking holidays at home, St Bees seafront saw an increased number of visitors over the summer, placing increased pressure on the litter bins. At the same time Copeland Borough Council experienced staffing difficulties due to Covid. Volunteers from the Parish Council and St Bees Litter Champions helped to minimise litter at the seafront over the summer. They helped by picking up loose items and emptying litter bins as needed to create space for extra rubbish to be disposed of responsibly. Discussions are still taking place with CBC about ways to deal with the volume of litter at the main beach. The Parish Council would like to see more effective seagull-proof litter bins for the seafront to cope with increased volumes of rubbish.

Local Plan – CBC is consulting on proposed changes to the draft Local Plan which was published a few months ago. This is an important document which, when approved, will guide development in the area for the coming years. The main change for St Bees is that the site at Scalebarrow which was previously designated as a site for housing development has been removed, as it is now deemed unsuitable on highways grounds. A new proposed site for housing development has been included to the south of Fairladies. Details of the proposed changes to the Plan can be found in the Local Plan section of the CBC web-site. The consultation runs until 17 October and everyone is welcome to take part.

Bag It, Bin It campaign- The Parish Council has purchased five dispensers for dog bags, enabling dog owners to still pick up after their dog if they have run out of bags. The dispensers are located by the galleon in the seafront play area, entrance to the Dandy Walk, near the bottom of Outrigg and top of Sea Mill Lane, and Sea Mill car park. You can still pick up a free dog bag from St Bees Post Office and Hartley's Beach Café. Used dog bags can then be placed in any litter bin.

Alongside the dog bag dispensers, St Bees Parish Council has set up Dutiful Dog Walkers. If you would like to display a poster in your window to show other dog owners that you always pick up after your dog and exercise your dog responsibly, please contact Amy Linton for further details -amylinton1983@gmail.com.

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
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### Grassroots

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### Mr Chad and the Squnaderbug

Many readers may not have come across the images referred to in last month's History article - Mr Chad and the Squanderbug. They somehow failed to make an appearance then, so are printed here now.

The article was about a recent Decluttering exercise at our Village school, and told of an old desk which went to the skip with the rubbish. A wartime pupil had left his mark on it by way of skilfully carved pictures under the lid.

The trouble was ... images were needed to illustrate his work. Only readers who had lived through the war could have pictured Mr. Chad, or Hitler's friend the Squanderbug. Both were commemorated on that desk by whoever had sat at it, but without illustration my words made little sense.

Mr. Chad was not an official caricature. Apparently he had his beginning in a Professor Chadwick's lecture to some airmen, one of whom made a kwirky picture from a circuit diagram left on the blackboard. However that may be, Mr. Chad quickly caught on, and with his "WOT NO ...?" slogan was soon seen all over the country. Chalked up wherever there were shortages, his presence caused people to smile rather than grumble. I recall that in my home village, where Billie Arnold kept the tiny corner shop, Mr. Chad often spread across its frontage. I wonder: does anyone remember him here?

The Squanderbug, unlike Chad, was a totally official figure. He was a product of the National Savings Committee. An ugly, swastika-covered creature, his supposed purpose in life was to encourage wasteful or frivolous purchasing; "Hitler's friend, he makes you spend" was the slogan that went with him. He appeared a-thousand-fold in poster form, and frequently in Press advertising. Shopkeepers, needless to say,! had mixed feelings about him!
