

Parish Council News

Platinum Jubilee Celebrations - the Parish Council is meeting groups & individuals in St Bees to progress plans to mark the Queen's Jubilee. If you or your group has ideas or would like to volunteer to help organise events, please contact Hayley Monaghan (hjmonaghan3@aol.com) or Jane Donaldson(pc_clerk@stbees.org.uk) or contact us via our Parish Council Facebook page.

Signage – there are a number of signs around the village which are now redundant, including one by the station. The Parish Council is working on a plan to identify/remove redundant signs and make signage more relevant. More details to follow!

Defibrillator – we are having problems with someone repeatedly using tape to cover the light on the defibrillator cabinet at the beach toilets. It is very important that the light is visible to show that the equipment is functioning and available for use in an emergency. This is a device which could save a life – if someone has an issue with the light, we would like to hear from them so we can discuss the problem.

Valley Link Cycle Track – the County Council has recently held a further consultation on its cycling and walking infrastructure plan which includes the proposal for a cycle track between St Bees & Whitehaven. There was a very impressive response from local residents to the previous consultation and this has certainly raised the profile of the project. The Parish Council will continue to do everything it can to press for the project to be included in the County Council's plans.

Litter bins – the bin by Stonehouse garden is finally back in place and able to be used for litter and dog waste bags. Litter bins are **not** intended to be used for household waste which should be put into blue bags or wheelie bins for collection by CBC.

Draft Local Plan – the draft Copeland Local Plan is in its final stage of consultation before it is submitted to the Secretary of State. The consultation period has been extended until 18 March. Two sites in St Bees continue to be identified for residential development (land to the south of Fairladies & land behind Abbots Court) despite objections from the Parish Council to the inclusion of the land adjacent to Fairladies.

Parking – There continue to be problems with parked vehicles obstructing pavements and preventing large vehicles getting to properties in various parts of the village. Please park considerately so pedestrians with pushchairs etc can use the pavements and do not have to walk into the road. Bin lorries and larger vehicles need room to manoeuvre so please do not obstruct junctions or narrow roads.

Next Meeting – The next Parish Council meeting is scheduled to take place on Monday 21 March 2022 at 6.30pm in the Village Hall. Local residents are always welcome to attend.

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"Diabolical Incendiaries" in St. Bees

Last month's History page told of the beginnings of "Grindal", the large building opposite the Station which began life as "The Royal" (or sometimes "The Railway") Hotel. That was in 1847, but thanks to some persons who clearly didn't want it there, It very nearly didn't begin at all.



The local paper told the story:

"We are really grieved to hear that an attempt has within the past week been made by some diabolical incendiaries to destroy by fire the new Railway Hotel at St. Bees. So early as nine o'clock in the evening the villains had commenced operations by forcing out the masonry of an outer doorway in order to gain admission, and this work accomplished they had afterwards forced their way into a room in which there were some oil, turpentine and other articles belonging to the painters who were engaged in painting the interior of the building, the whole of which they set on fire, after having laid some trains of gunpowder which they had no doubt calculated would materially aid in the destruction of the premises. Luckily the fire was discovered about eleven o'clock, by John Jones Esq. who resides in Lonsdale Terrace, and an alarm having been immediately given large bodies of the inhabitants rushed to the scene of conflagration, and by great exertions, having an ample supply of water to hand, the flames were got under, but not until considerable damage had been sustained by the interior woodwork of the building. It will be seen from our advertising columns that a reward of £150 has been offered for the discovery and conviction of the offenders - £100 by the Phoenix Fire Office Company, by whom the property is insured, and £50 by Mr. Tyson, the owner of the building. We are glad to hear that there is every probability of the diabolical scoundrels being brought to justice, and never certainly were men more richly deserving

'The water level is increasing day by day,' says Lamuchi, a fishman from Bangladesh. 'Floods

are happening very often. When I was a boy, I can remember that floods did not even occur once within five years. But now, floods take place here three to four times every year.'

Speak Boldly Amen

"A Still Small Voice"

1Kings19 v 11 -19

¹¹ And he said, "Go forth, and stand upon the mount before the Lord." And behold, the Lord passed by, and a great and strong wind rent the mountains, and broke in pieces the rocks before the Lord, but the Lord was not in the wind; and after the wind an earthquake, but the Lord was not in the earthquake; ¹² and after the earthquake a fire, but the Lord was not in the fire; and after the fire a still small voice. ¹³ And when Elijah heard it, he wrapped his face in his mantle and went out and stood at the entrance of the cave.

"Speaking Boldly" is often called for in our lives. In family life we will often have to speak out in the middle of breakfast confusion and schoolwork or preparation for someone to own up as to where they left the car keys. No one is listening, they are all set on their own course. They are not being rude of selfish they are simply focussed on their immediate problems or challenges. Speaking boldly has little to do in this context with what you are trying to say you are in fact simply trying to be noticed. Volume is probably more important that nuanced content!

Of course you cannot be a visitor to many homes before you hear the comment that a husband/ grandad (usually male) is hard of hearing – so when you caringly approach the individual and speak loudly/boldly the immediate response is....."there's no need to shout – I'm not deaf"! This is usually followed by a non-attributable remark that he hears when he wants to!

Naturally, bold speaking is called for in the giving of orders in a disaster situation or an instant note of alarm when an approaching hazard is noticed, and people have to be warned.

I was really embarrassed to note recently in a broadcast that I was singing "a little too boldly" in a church service.....in certain contexts bold exclamation needs to be tempered by careful listening?

Bold speaking of course does not only focus upon volume, but it also refers to difficult content and sometimes the harsh truth of what we have to say can crush, disable, or totally collapse the morale and welfare of the listener. The truth can be so harsh that it alienates the recipient to the extent that they are disabled from reacting.

If the loud, the brash the bold attracts our attention and in terms of powerful influences we think that it is perhaps the most effective means of communicating.



Certainly Elijah and whoever wrote the narrative we now read, did initially think the Divine voice or message was found in the loudest, strongest natural noises that he could experience – just until of course, God actually spoke in "a still small voice".

That moment of revelation, insight came boldly into his heart/soul, but it was gentle upon his ear and entered his soul with a power and beauty that transcended all other sounds.

So its is perhaps with the Church and its message. Yes there is the place for the bold word of truth, justice, righteousness in the face if human sin, wickedness and all the associated evils you can imagine. But the revelation of God is shared with the soul in gentle compassion and peace and it is that which turns us around and causes us to walk to the entrance of the cave in which we like Elijah have hidden to be shown the world as the Lord sees it.

So yes, we are called to campaign, to speak up in the face of injustice, cruelty, prejudice, or corruption. Speaking boldly, but not always loudly and being mindful as to why we speak – it is not to condemn, to hurt, to take revenge – but to heal, to bring salvation to the soul, new hope to broken lives and so this bold speaking can be delivered in almost total silence – simply by presence, prayer and faithful companionship which can be trusted, leaned upon and found to be within easy reach. This may be by way of abiding friendship through thick and thin, a smile in a time of tears, a hand taken and held or a shoulder to be cried upon on. I was once told the most helpful thing I did was to turn up and – shut up!

So let's perhaps just promise to turn up during for others this Lent and listen to that still small voice?
