

"Our mother, who art in heaven..." I wonder what you think of when you imagine God?

Maybe your religion cautions you about bringing such an image to mind? Or maybe you don't believe God exists so there's nothing to imagine? If you're a Christian it may be that you think of Jesus, or a king upon a heavenly throne or an old guy on a cloud with a beard. In his book "Wonder, love and praise" the methodist Neil Dixon wrote "what we say to, and about, the God we worship must reflect and express our theological understanding." In other words, the language we use matters. It's my belief that centuries of theological misunderstanding have led Christians to say and believe that God is male. It's easy to see how we got to this place. God is described as "Father", and Jesus, God incarnate, was male so it makes sense to use "he" here. But often Christians refer to the Holy Spirit or the Creator, neither of which are gendered, using the male pronoun.

Now you might say to me "Becky, this is all just woke nonsense" but I encourage you to not dismiss this out of hand, let's put to one side the sensationalist newspaper headlines, at least for the month of March.

On Sunday 19th we will be celebrating Mothering Sunday in the Priory alongside the international charity the "Mothers Union". This charity aims to strengthen communities by enabling women and caregivers to flourish. On Mothering Sunday we focus on the more feminine or motherly aspects of God and the words of the prophet Isaiah may be read that day "*As a mother comforts her child, so I will comfort you; you shall be comforted in Jerusalem.*" For some, these words are deeply reassuring. Most of us have gratefully received or generously given comfort to another, if not from a mother then from a mother figure.

Gendered language goes some way toward expressing the fullness of God's nature but it is imperfect and incomplete. Off the top of my head I can think of so many other ways that the scripture writers understood God; rock, fortress, mother hen, eagle, cloud, fire, sword, light, counsellor, friend, breath...to name just a few.

In God, we find maleness and femaleness, mother and father, parent and child, cloud and light, speech and silence. Ultimately, we find in God all that we see in ourselves and in the great variety of humanity that populates our globe. Could it be that to deny the motherhood of God, is to reject part of God and God's creation?

Acceptable forms of identification are a passport, driving licence, Blue Badge, an identity card with a PASS mark, certain concessionary travel cards, a biometric immigration document, a defence identity card and a national identity card.



Village History - Annie Walker, Haberdasher

I had meant last year's history articles to be the last about Finkle Street and its shops. But I am being asked again whether anything is known of a long-vanished drapery store in that area

This would be the little shop run in her later years by Miss Annie Walker. She was one of the daughters of the Walker family of St. Bees, which by the end of Victorian times was widely known for its range of Preserves, Pickles and Flours. Annie, however, had little to do with that side of the business.

Her shop operated entirely separately from 6 Finkle Street, shown on the extreme left of this photograph. By the date it was taken (1920s?) number 6 was serving as Brownrigg's Cab office. Before that, under Annie Walker's care, it had long been the source in St. Bees for general haberdashery, as well as for the uniform required by the Free Grammar School. Both Irene Patterson and her brother had assisted with the shop, and Irene



has left us an account of Annie's occasional "Shilling Bundle" Sales. Apparently they were popular, despite being something of a gamble – for customers could discover what their chosen bundles contained only after parting with their shillings.

Haberdashery apart, the shop sold a range of household or ornamental goods. I have some china bowls delicately hand-painted in the shop by Annie herself. They bear her signature and the date 1909. At the rear of the shop she kept a small lending library – the charge being one penny per book, per week. Probably the least borrowed books ended inside Shilling Bundles!

The Church's magazine makes it clear that Annie was active in Priory matters. Her shop was used often as a collecting and distributing point, and it is easy to imagine it becoming a favoured meeting place for similarly-minded ladies with time on their hands

As a child Annie is said to have had masses of strikingly blonde or auburn hair. Seemingly her portrait by local artist J.D. Kenworthy hung in our Post Office well beyond the1920s. It is known that Kenworthy did commonly paint village children; if Annie Walker really was his model for this picture, it would be good to know what has happened to it since. I wonder whether anyone might know?


