Whether you are a painter, seamstress, designer, musician, or something else, we all have some level of creativity since we are all made in the image of God. Your gifts and abilities are unique to you, and they reflect a God just as extraordinary." It might be that you don't think you are creative but me, Billy Graham and dare I say, even God, disagree. You may not be artistic, or tuneful, or articulate but you have the potential to imagine, to design, to build and to dream.

Parish Council News

Consultation on changes to parking restrictions: The Parish Council has submitted its comments on proposals from CCC for changes to parking restrictions in three areas of the village. The Parish Council has supported the proposal for a 'no parking restriction' across the Main St/Sea Mill Lane junction to ensure that the junction is not obstructed by parked vehicles. However, the Parish Council has opposed the proposal to change the time limited parking in Main Street to a disc zone. The Parish Council believes that this would offer no advantages to the village and instead has proposed that the time limited restriction should be removed altogether with the school entrance remaining as a 'no parking' area. The Parish Council has also opposed any additional parking restrictions in Finkle Street which would only exacerbate parking issues on the Crofts and other areas and has suggested that there should instead be better enforcement of the existing restrictions. This is a preliminary consultation and we hope that the views of the Parish Council and residents who responded individually will be taken into account before any decisions are made.

Beach Toilets - the ladies & gents toilets have been deep-cleaned and volunteers from the Parish Council have repainted the doors and gates in readiness for the start of the summer season. Expenditure has also been approved to refurbish the disabled toilet so that the facilities will be in as good a state as possible for the coming season.

Cumberland Council elections – the elections for the new Cumberland Council will take place on Thursday 5 May. This is one of the two new unitary authorities in Cumbria which will replace the existing County Council and the six district councils. Cumberland Council will cover the areas of Copeland Borough Council, Allerdale Borough Council and Carlisle City Council, with Westmorland and Furness Council covering the south and east of the county. Cumberland Council will have 46 councillors in total and St Bees falls within the Egremont North/St Bees ward. For the first year the new council will exist in shadow form to allow it to appoint staff, plan its budget and set out its policies before it takes over provision of services on 1 April 2023. Until that date services will continue to be delivered by the County Council and Copeland Borough Council. The new shadow authority has its own web-site www.cumberland.gov.uk where you can find information on the elections and the candidates.

Annual Parish Meeting – The annual Parish Meeting is a meeting of electors of the parish which takes place between 1 March & 1 June each year. It provides an opportunity for local residents to hear about the Parish Council's plans and to raise any issues of concern. The meeting this year will take place on Monday 16 May 2022 at 6.30pm in the Village Hall and all are welcome to attend. The Parish Council meeting will follow immediately afterwards.

As the Summer Term begins, Mr Silk reflects back on some of the exciting and amazing events, fundraisers and activities that have taken place over the term.

"It has been a long term, but as we near its end I am very confident in heralding its success.

It has not been without its challenges and despite, perhaps because of, the reduction of government regulations, COVID-19 has been more challenging for a number of reasons, not least because we have had far more COVID-related absence than at any other time during the pandemic. This has made life tough for students and teachers alike and I would like to commend them all on keeping their calm and doing their very best to carry on as normal; with the stresses of exam preparation and all the other pressures young people face this has not been easy, but they have persevered all the same.

There have been many highlights this term, not least having our first team sport fixtures since the school reopened and in all 3 cases with St Bees securing victories. We have enjoyed a number of Inter-House events, including in football, swimming and, most spectacularly, in singing. The next musical performance, with COVID being less prohibitive, will be in front of parents. We have also seen a number of Primary schools visit, often with our students entertaining them in some way or other, including in the recently held Science and Book Fairs. Our students have shown real leadership, confidence and character in helping out with these events.

Wainwright hikes have also taken place, although somewhat curtailed by unfortunate weather in the second half of term. I am glad to report that we have some great walks planned for next term. Trips to Old Trafford for the football, kayaking and go-karting are just some of the activities enjoyed by boarders and they have an excellent list of weekend events to look forward to next term.

There have been a number of charitable initiatives launched by the students this term as well. The two principal ones were the Red Nose Day, which had its denouement with the Dunk the Teacher event, and the Ukraine Appeal.

For me the fundraising for Ukraine was the highlight of the term. It was the School Council's idea, so therefore student led. It involved all our community getting behind 3 of our students and supporting them and their country in their time of need and it was uplifting to see our school come together as one family for the benefit of those less fortunate than us. We collected about 40 cubic metres of donations in kind (bandages and medicaments, sanitary items and toiletries, food, bedding, clothing and baby products) and raised over £1,000 to donate to the Ukraine.

With many more community events, fundraising activities, on top of our public examinations coming up, we look forward to a busy and successful Summer Term when our campus really is at its best.

JAMES BRINDLE BEGS most respectfully to Inform the Inhabitants of West Cumberland generally, that he has recently taken and entered upon the above named HOTEL, which he has Furnished and provided with every Accommodation, and also stocked his Cellars with a choice Assortment of WINES, SPIRITS, ALES. PORTER &c. &c. All sorts of Conveyances ready at all times, and Saddle Horses, Ponies &c.

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The ST. BEES ROYAL HOTEL is situated opposite to the Railway Station at St. Bees, thereby giving it superior Advantage and Convenience for Trade.

*** The CELLAR OPENING will take place on Friday the 27th. INSTANT, A DINNER will be provided, when Mr. B will be glad to see as many of his Friends present as can conveniently attend. Tickets at the Bar of the St. Bees Hotel.

The notice above appeared in the "Cumberland Pacquet" in April 1849. Nearly sixteen months had passed since the attempt to destroy by fire and gunpowder the building which we now call "Grindal". As explained in last month's magazine, it had been built to be the "St. Bees Royal Hotel".

The James Brindle who was opening it already owned the Seacote Hotel, and farmed some 65 acres nearby. He would move into the Royal himself, with his wife and six children. There seems to have been a living-in staff of four, one of whom was the gardener. Some twenty bedrooms for guests were on two floors, and there were four coffee or drawing-rooms, a spacious dining room, and a saloon measuring thirty-five feet by seventeen. Staff rooms were in the attic.

These years after the coming of the Railway were good ones for St. Bees. The holiday trade was growing; prosperous families were coming to live here from less salubrious places; the Grammar School was expanding, rebuilding, and doing well. The Royal Hotel's future looked assured.

But then 1888 brought change. I hope to say something about this next month. Bob Jopling, Village History Group

St Bees Priory Jubilee Celebration & Exhibition.

Unstable Gravestones identified at the Priory churchyard:

An initial survey of memorial gravestones was done in December 2021 and followed up by the director of Cumbria Headstones who effected remedial work several years ago on other stones. He recommended 22 gravestones needing attention. Cautionary notices have been posted in the churchyard, warning that the stones may be unstable. Hazard tape was also placed on several larger stones. Arrangements are in place to prepare a list of living relatives of the deceased to be contacted via a letter from the vicar. In most cases it's proving difficult to identify any relatives of the deceased. Remedial works are necessary to ensure the safety of the gravestones and the church may be obliged to bear the costs. A list of graves and names recorded of the deceased will be displayed on the noticeboard in church, to assist with research via possible local knowledge. Please contact the graveyard officer Ian McAndrew or the vicar Rev Becky Gibbs if you can help provide any information.

Friends of the Priory - Trevor Park talk

Get a free complimentary copy of a new book when you support Friends of the Priory on May 8th. The renewed violence last year in the Gaza region and reports of increased numbers of Islamophobic and Anti-Semitic attacks in the UK provoked me into updating and publishing a small book I first drafted when I was on study leave in the Holy Land in 1995. I was staying at an Ecumenical Research Centre on the edge of Jerusalem and Bethlehem where we had lectures from Jewish Rabbis and Muslim scholars as well as from Christian ones, biblical archaeologists and people involved in the very thorny issues of peace and justice in Israel/Palestine.

I had set myself the task of researching a short book about the basic beliefs and practices of the three great monotheistic Faiths: Judaism, Christianity and Islam, and to do it in as fair, even-handed and accessible a way as I could. Just before leaving for Jerusalem, one of the teenagers in my parish's Young Christians Group had asked me about this very matter following an RE lesson at school on Islam which he had found challenging and confusing. He was one potential reader I had in mind as I wrote.

The Book is called CHILDREN OF ABRAHAM: how Jews, Christians and Muslims respond to God. It is richly illustrated – mostly pictures taken in the Holy Land – and each unit of the book ends with a page of topical discussion material which can be used either in a study group or by the individual reader.

I will be giving a talk about it in aid of Friends of the Priory in New College Hall on Sunday at 4 pm May 8th, and will have 40 copies of the book with me to give away. Do come and support the Friends.

Donations are taken to the Ukrainian Association in Szczecin and local refugee camps in the Trzebiez area. The Association is staffed by a mixture of Poles and Ukrainians and is led by Jan Syrnyk, who has been providing medical and humanitarian aid to the Ukrainian frontline since the Crimean invasion in 2014. It currently

supports many refugees, with several cars bearing refugees turning up while our vans were there. The staff are seasoned experts in getting supplies to the needy in Ukraine and avoiding detection by the Russians when doing so. When our vans turned up the staff immediately and efficiently unpacked it and prepared it for onward transhipment to the Ukraine and within four days it was being distributed in Mariupol.

The remainder of the supplies are provided to the Mayor of <u>Trzebiez</u> for refugees in her locality. She took the van drivers to one of the camps to meet a Professor from Kyiv University and who left her husband behind in the fighting. The anguish in her eyes was heart-breaking and she explained that the refugees do not want to leave Poland but want to stay close to their homeland, so as to return home as soon as humanly possible.

The demonstration of a deep care and support in our local area, across Europe, the world, the UK and especially by the Polish people is humbling, they have opened their homes to the refugees and are treating them and their children like their own. Our community in West Cumbria has provided amazing support and people with little have given what they can.

While we have been told that many of the refugees want to stay in Poland, our community is getting ready to accept them if, as seems likely, this war drags on and Poland and the surrounding countries become overwhelmed by the numbers of people fleeing the Russians.

Did you know that the fashion industry is responsible for 10% of all carbon emissions? Textile processing consumes 20% of global wastewater. It pollutes rivers, streams and ground water with high levels of pesticides and harsh chemicals, many of which are carcinogenic. 60% of all clothing is made of polyester and contains microplastics. Washing garments made of polyester and other synthetics accounts for 35% of the ocean's microplastics. Oh dear! That does not sound as though we are treading gently on God's wonderful world. Even worse some of the cheap UK clothing is made in factories with very poor working conditions for those making our garments, and even employing child labour.

Fortunately, there are a few things you can do:

- 1: "Who made my clothes", a project started after the collapse of a building in which 1,138 clothes makers in Bangladesh died and 2,500 were injured. You can find out more at https://www.fashionrevolution.org/about/
- 2: Check the items credentials before you buy, is it organic, has it been produced sustainably or fairly? Some firms are making clothes from bamboo and even seaweed!

 3: Recycle old clothes in charity shops

"Planting for Pollinators" in the Vicarage Community Walled Garden

Building on the success of Get Cumbria Buzzing!, the Planting for Pollinators project will see Cumbria Wildlife Trust and Cumbria County Council working on over 50 sites across north and west Cumbria to create and improve a mosaic of habitats. The work will help pollinators such as bees, butterflies, wasps and other insects to thrive by connecting habits and providing food, shelter and nesting sites.

The Vicarage Community Walled Garden has been granted a small amount of funding for this project and last month Sophie and Tanya from the team visited and shared their expertise with us. Together we planning a maintained wild area in the garden alongside fruit, vegetables and cut flowers for church displays.

Care Deeply

Last month St Bees Church Warden, Tom Kelly, delivered a van load of donations to a refugee centre in Poland. Since writing the article below he has travelled there a second time.

Nina Albertelli, Nikki Wyatt and Bart Mikolajczyk are fronting a group of people, based in Cleator Moor, to collect and distribute supplies donated by the people of West Cumbria for the Ukrainian people. Bart's expertise and contacts in his Polish homeland are ensuring that all donations are reaching the right people at the right time.



So far four vanloads have been sent to Poland, 456 boxes of supplies (including nine thousand packs of Baby wipes, eleven thousand meals and snacks) plus more than three hundred sleeping bags and twenty three thousand nappies with an overall total value of approximately £33,350. Three more van loads will depart before Easter and these vans are picking up sixty boxes in Durham enroute! Connections have been made with groups in Carlisle, Blackpool, London and all over the UK in a demonstration on humanitarian care and generosity on a national and international scale.

This generosity has included large donations from St Bees, from many individuals and from institutions such as the Priory and St Bees School. Money donated has helped pay for transport and is also very welcome for services such as Trauma care and specialist drugs. St Bees has also provided manpower to help sort and drive the donations the twenty hours across six countries to Poland to deliver them to the Ukrainian people in Poland and the Ukraine.



On March 17th the first van left Cleator Moor and it just so happened that our diocesan Bishop, James, and the Archbishop of York, Stephen were in the area. After jogging for a few metres with Gary McKee (another story!) they asked for God's blessing on the vans and their contents before they set off.
