

St Bees News

When I was a child my mum would organise brilliant birthday parties for me and my sister. She liked to plan them around a theme and then set to work creating elaborate invites, decorations, food, entertainment and party bags. Mostly these parties were a great success and our friends were impressed. However, one "rainbow themed year" she dyed the egg mayonnaise in the sandwiches green. Even the most hungry guests weren't brave enough to try these!

I imagine that the celebrations we gather for this month in the parish will feature less risky sandwich fillings but will be creative and significant in their own ways. At 10.30am on Sunday 18th May we will be celebrating the 80th anniversary of Christian Aid with a special Holy Communion service followed by fair-trade drinks and biscuits. On the 8th May the parish will remember 80 years since VE Day; candles will be lit in homes across the Mission Community at 9.30pm and prayers for peace said; scattered geographically, but gathered in spirit.

On 11th May at 10.30am at the Priory Annual Parish Committee Meeting we will give thanks for all the ways God has blessed us in the last twelve months and share our hope and dreams for the years ahead. And on the 31st May we will join with the wider parish at St Bees Bash; giving thanks for the commitment of volunteers that makes this kind of event possible.

This year throughout May the church throughout the world celebrates Eastertide. This season lasts for fifty days from Easter Day until Pentecost. Fifty is a significant number in the Old Testament; God's people were encouraged to "reset" their lives and communities every fifty years with a "year of Jubilee". This is one the Bible's most radical ideas. A complete socio-economic refresh in Israel.

Jesus later claims to enact a jubilee when he announces his ministry. "...The Lord has sent me to proclaim freedom for the prisoners and recovery of sight for the blind, to set the oppressed free, to proclaim the year of the Lord's favour." (Luke chapter 4) Many leaders have aspired to this mission, including Pope Francis. In his frailty, he has called the Catholic church throughout the world in 2025 to action; to respond to God's call for a reset, a renewal of faith and a recommitment to a just world.

I will be celebrating a big birthday this May and am looking forward to spending some special time with my nearest and dearest. I don't mind getting older, you're only as old as you feel after all, and although I don't think I'll ever dare to eat a green mayonnaise sandwich, I am ready for new adventures. Some of you will have heard that Phil, Josh, Benji and I are off to pastures new this year. Parish Council News

Valley Link cycle track- the Parish Council is continuing to work to progress the proposal for an off-road cycle track link between St Bees and Whitehaven. The cost of the scheme will be well beyond the resources of a parish council but we are working with the local MP, various local agencies and companies to get the scheme to a point where it could be implemented quickly if funding becomes available.

Station car park- the Parish Council has arranged for a contractor to fill a number of potholes which have developed in the existing car park over the winter. Plans to create additional car parking spaces in the adjoining field have moved a step closer with negotiations at an advanced stage to secure a 50 year lease on the land from Cumberland Council. Network Rail is also in the process of agreeing a 50 year lease of the existing car park to the PC to allow access to the adjoining land.

Coast to Coast Passport Project – the project has been officially launched and those starting the Coast to Coast Walk can purchase a passport to record their progress along the route. Passports can be bought from B&B owners and businesses in the village where walkers can have their passport stamped. If anyone would like more information about the project, please contact the Clerk.

Seagull proof refuse sacks –Cumberland Council has a supply of bird proof sacks which can be made available to those who do not have waste bins and rely on refuse bags. The sacks will protect the plastic bags from being damaged by birds/animals. The sacks will be available for collection from the Market Hall in Whitehaven from April. Cumberland Council can also supply additional garden waste bins which will be emptied fortnightly at a cost of £40 per bin.

Anti-social behaviour – There have recently been several reports of antisocial behaviour, particularly around the beach area and beach toilets. If anyone sees unacceptable behaviour, please report it to the police so that they have a full picture of what is happening.

Annual Parish Meeting – Each year a parish meeting is held which all electors in the parish are invited to attend. The PC Chairman will present his annual report and explain some of the work being undertaken by the Parish Council. There will also be an opportunity for residents to ask questions or suggest issues which they would like the PC to follow up. This year the meeting will be on Monday 19 May at 6pm in the Village Hall immediately before the PC meeting. Why not come along to hear about the work of the Parish Council and ongoing projects? All residents are welcome!

At the end of January 2025, while taking Henry for a walk on the beach, I fell on the beach. Nobody else was there other than a confused dog wondering what I was doing lying in a pool of very cold water and not on my feet throwing his ball. Realising I'd actually broken my arm (the crunch of a broken bone is quite unmistakable), I shouted hopefully for help and my guardian angels came down the beach to help me. Please forgive me - I can't remember your names, but I'll never forget your kindness and help, and that your children played ball with Henry until my husband came to pick him up. Other people also came and helped bringing shelter too. My next guardian angels were the Coastguard and the Lifeboat men, as although the ambulance had been phoned, they would take 2- 3 hours to respond. They rescued me, got me off the beach and then after a short stay in the lifeboat station managed to get me up to the hospital and on my way to recovery too. I just want to say THANK YOU to all of you. You were wonderful!

As a postscript my shoulder was found to be in 4 pieces and I have had to have a reverse shoulder replacement. Another fracture of the same arm had to be pinned and plated. So please be careful - a simple slip on the stones at the bottom of the Lifeboat slipway can be a bit painful!

Priory Paddock

The annual "pond dipping" will take place 2 till 4pm on 4 May, the Sunday of May Day Bank Holiday weekend. It's a great chance for children to see the pond wildlife: there's sure to be plenty of fresh water shrimps, water beetles and water snails, and with luck also newts and tadpoles. Kids love it and there will be people looking over them to make sure they don't get too wet.

May is probably the best time of the year in Priory Paddock, where the spring flowers are bursting through. On the sunny side beside the path there's alkanet, white comfrey and garlic mustard (Jack-by-the-hedge). Under the trees there are lots of bright yellow celandines and wild arum lily, and around the pond there's kingcup and yellow flag iris. It's a riot of colour!

There's plenty of wildlife too. The small song birds are nesting. You might see a field mouse or a slow worm if you look carefully, though they are very shy. And there are often bumblebees and butterflies: you'll see something if you keep quiet and watch.

Do you think you might not recognise what you are seeing? Don't worry; there's an audio guide to help. Just scan the QR code on the gate with your mobile phone and the guide will pop up: a friendly voice telling you what to look out for and a photo of what he's talking about. There's a new one each month, so it's always up to date.

So do come along to Priory Paddock. You'll be sure to see something nice.


Now, Aurelia's helping her community by teaching them what she's learned about farming. She wants everyone's lives to be filled with hope.
