# November 2022

In 1982 inspired by my hero, "Wonder Woman", I became the defender of the weak on the Primary playground. Taller and stronger than most of the other children I took on the bullies, often returning home with bruised skinny shins but buoyant. Sadly, in 1983 the bullies began to get bigger and I lost my first fight. I hung up my magic golden lasso!

These days I resist the urge I've carried since childhood to punch aggressors on the nose. In part because they are still bigger than me. But mostly because I now know that violence rarely brings the peace I'm searching for.

The world is rarely as black and white, evil versus good, as a comic book. There is right and wrong in all of us. Peace comes close to me when I choose to see the image of God in my foe and in myself.

Sometimes, though, the magic lasso is still needed. Not fisty cuffs in the playground but actions and words that stand against evil. Standing tall and encouraging others to do the same in the face of exploitation and abuse.

The Church of England has a poor past record when it comes to supporting victims of abuse. A recently published review into past cases in Carlisle Diocese made it clear that although improvements have been made there is still work to do. Listening to and caring for survivors of abuse must be our priority.

One of the ways the parish does this is by supporting the Global day of activism against gender-Based Violence. This year we will be gathering on Saturday 26<sup>th</sup> November from 12 midday in the Priory to hear from victims, learn, reflect and respond. All are welcome. See page 2 of this magazine to find out more.

The journey toward peace both within ourselves and with the wider world is by no means a smooth one. In Luke's Gospel, Jesus tells his disciples to out into the world, visiting homes, and saying "Peace to this house...The kingdom of God has come near to you." I, like many of you, long for this peaceful kingdom to come to my home, to this country, to our world.

I am grateful to those who have fought, and continue to fight, racism, exploitation, abuse and oppression. On Friday 11th and Sunday 13th November we will pause to remember across the parish all those died giving their lives for freedom in two world wars. And we will pray for our world as we continue to learn from the mistakes of the past.

This November let us honour those who have given so much in the pursuit of peace and freedom by committing our lives to the care of survivors and the defence of the weak.

Seeking a non-violent solution, our shins may not be bruised, but we will fight on.

# **Parish Council**

Anti-social behaviour – The problems of antisocial behaviour were highlighted at the meeting of the Parish Council on 27 September when a number of residents in different areas of the village reported their experiences of antisocial behaviour incidents. The police were contacted the next day and there has been a constructive dialogue with the Neighbourhood Policing Team who are now aware of the situation. There has been an increase in uniformed patrols in the area and two officers held a drop-in session in the Village Hall on 17 October to give local residents the opportunity to report issues and meet the team. This was well attended and police hope to organise another session in the coming weeks. The message continues to be that it is vital to report all incidents, however trivial they may seem, so that the police have a full picture of what is going on. Reports can be made online (www.cumbria.police.uk) or by phone to 101 and the police will give you a log number to record your report.

**Remembrance Sunday** – There will be the usual parade and wreath laying ceremony on Sunday 13 November to mark Remembrance Sunday. The wreaths from the local organisations will be on display in the window of 22 Main Street in the days leading up to Remembrance Sunday.

Santa Parade- the Parish Council is planning to organise a Santa Parade again this year with Santa's sleigh visiting as many areas of the Village as possible before Santa switches on the lights on the Christmas tree on Cross Hill. Santa's elves will accompany him on bicycles and we hope to have the usual collection for RNLI funds. Further details of date and time will be published on the web-site and Facebook page. Donations to local groups - The Parish Council sets aside a small pot of money each year to enable it to give donations to local groups. Requests should be received by 14 November to enable grants to be approved at the next Parish Council meeting.

Highways- following recent heavy rain there have been problems with flooding on the Outrigg to Egremont Road and drains in the village becoming blocked, leaving mud and debris on the roads. The immediate problems have been addressed by Highways but the Parish Council has asked Highways to look at clearing the culverts between the gullies rather than simply emptying the gullies. Cumbria Highways has also said that patching work is planned in various areas of the village including Sea Mill Lane, Station Rd and Beach Rd during this financial year.

# Just one thing after another

It is one of the joys of Local History that one thing newly discovered so often leads on to another. It was something of that sort that prompted the recent article featuring Mr. Gosse's shop in Finkle Street.

At the beginning I knew next to nothing about the shop. All I had were some notes, yearsold, made after talking to someone who had worked there long before. But these took me back to a recording from an earlier date – a taped conversation with a then-elderly gentleman who had lived higher in Finkle Street. Had I heard, he had asked, of someone once known around the village as 'Old Mother Millpole?'

Sent one morning on an errand to the shop he had found he could not get in. Blocking the doorway were two very substantial bodies, that of Mr. Gosse himself, and a very irate Mother Millpole. She was gripping a rather small grandson by the neck, and shaking him and cuffing him around the ears for good measure, while all the while swearing at him in language which my informant said 'would have disgraced any soldier of the line'. The more the grandson howled, the more Mother Millpole hit and cursed, and Mr. Gosse's pleas for calm had not the slightest effect on either of them.

It so happened that at that moment a pony and trap came out of Cross Hill. It carried one of the two Miss Hodgetts, well-to-do St. Bees benefactors, and people most certainly not to be trifled with. On hearing the commotion Miss Hodgett had her coachman get down from the trap. She told him to secure the still-howling boy and keep him in the trap until he could be deposited at the school. Clearly this did not suit Mother Millpole who in no way liked interference, and off she set on foot behind trap, keeping up the swearing and cursing at the top of her voice all the way to School Lane.

I expect I shall be told that nothing in this story makes it worth preserving. Yet I can imagine that as word of it spread around the village, a good many St. Bees tongues would have been set wagging. If Local History is concerned with what past people thought and did, and with what they took for granted as part of daily life, maybe sad people like Mother Millpole are part of the overall picture.

Finally, there is a sequel. Long after I had filed everything away I happened to be working on some old logbooks from our Village School. An unexpected entry caught my eye, recording the visit of a Mrs. Millfull. *(sic)*. She was wielding a cricket bat for the purpose, the Head said, of doing him bodily harm. She persisted in using 'dreadfully bad language' in front of the children, and left only after the policeman had been summoned.

I suspect that the logbook's Mrs. Millfull and the Mother Millpole described above were really the same. The two names are similar, and I have found no mention of a Millpole family anywhere in village records. I wish we could know the truth of the matter, and as always I would be glad to hear from anyone who happens to know what it is.

**Please pray** for world leaders as COP 27 takes place from 6-18<sup>th</sup> November. We have had 27 attempts to reverse climate change and still have a long way to go. Many of the agreements from COP 26

have yet to be enacted, while populations suffer the ravages of drought, floods, hurricanes and fires. Climate change is a global emergency that goes beyond national borders. The focus of COP is on 4 areas:

**Mitigation: Reducing emissions:** All countries must stick to their agreements to ensure that global warming does not increase beyond 1.5°C. However after COP 26 the then president stated, "*We can now say with credibility that we have kept the 1.5°C alive, but its pulse is weak and it will only survive if we keep to our promises.*".

Please pray that we can keep this target alive.

Adaptation: Helping all those currently impacted by climate change: We need to tackle damaging activities such as deforestation and support Indigenous people to protect their local habitats. A good example is financial support from France to Senegal to expand their solar capacity, so that trees do not need to be cut down for fuel. Developed countries should be prepared to pay for damage and loss caused to developing **nations** by our actions.

**Please pray** that communities will see opportunities to adapt and that the rich nations will provide the necessary financial support to enable this to happen.

**Finance: Enabling countries to deliver on their goals:** Countries need to realign their financial goals to achieve net zero. The UN has said that at least \$100bn dollars is required each year. This has never been achieved. However, countries spent more than 4 times that amount subsidising fossil fuels. Developed countries must support developing countries to achieve their net zero.

Please pray that leaders will use their finances wisely and fairly

**Collaboration: Working together to deliver even greater action:** Governments, business and civil society need to work together to deliver climate goals quicker and more effectively. The "Paris Rulebook" was agreed at COP26, to ensure common standards for international carbon markets and common timetables for emission reduction

targets.

**Please pray** that leaders will work to these common targets and support one another to achieve them.
