St Bees News

December - January 2022

I'm a huge fan of tradition at Christmas...the Nine Lessons and Carols, Christmas stockings, chocolate for breakfast, dad unwrapping his annual gift of underwear and then wearing them on his head until dinnertime (The last one may not be a universally recognised yuletide tradition) The repetition of the familiar is a comfort to many of us at this time of year, serious or silly, these anticipated annual actions are part of what Christmas is all about.

My dad's antics with his pants got me thinking...what other strange habits do people indulge in this season? A quick search of the internet threw up some fascinating answers. In the week leading up to Christmas, Venezuelans attend a daily church service called Misa de Aguinaldo (Early Morning Mass). In the capital, Caracas, it is customary to travel to the church service on roller skates. This practise is so widespread that many roads in the capital are closed until 8am to provide Christmas worshippers with a safe passage. This sounds like fun but if you choose to follow their example, and attend the Priory Midnight service on roller skates this year, just remember that it will be uphill going home.

Three years ago we started a new tradition in the vicarage...Christmas dinner on Boxing Day. Last Christmas I was excited to pick up this tradition again. I got up very early to prep the turkey and vegetables. The turkey was huge, about 17lbs, but I manged to stuff it, wrestle into the last of the foil and get it in the oven before the sun came up. Later in the morning I walked with Benji to the beach and watched the Tractor Trundle. Back at the vicarage the rest of the family started the day with a coffee impressed and somewhat surprised by my efficiency in the kitchen.

Several hours later we were ready to eat. Phil commenced his family tradition—Chief Turkey Carver. Shortly after wielding his giant pointy fork he turned to me a little puzzled and said "There's something wrong with this turkey, nothing's where it should be?" It quickly became obvious that, despite a turkey clearly having two distinct sides, a front and a back, I had managed to stuff and cook it upside down. It tasted fine, which was a relief, but on reflection I think it did make it harder to stuff, and definitely more challenging to carve, so I don't think we'll be starting an "upside down turkey cooking" tradition. If you think that cooking a turkey upside down makes me rather eccentric, just remember that I grew up with a dad who regularly wore his pants on his head.

There are some traditions that I will miss this December. The passing of life and time mean that not everything can last forever. The monarch's Christmas day address to the nation will be different this year and I will miss the ever so familiar sound of our late Queen's message. Our King will struggle with this transition more than any of us I'm sure. Like him, we may miss the familiar and comforting presence of a family member this year. We may long for traditions that keep us feeling comforted and safe.


Defibrillators –All three of the Parish Council's defibrillators have been subject to a product recall and have required a software update. All are now back in operation, should they be required in an emergency.

Our Friends newsletter will appear in the New Year.



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That Finkle Street Shop

Several times lately these history pages have mentioned the grocery store in Finkle Street run by a Mr. Goss. There has now been a suggestion that no such shop ever existed, and that I am confusing our Finkle Street with another of the same name elsewhere. But although I think there is ample evidence of the shop's



having been here, I wonder whether any reader can add anything to confirm or refute it.

To begin with, there is the account of the late Mrs. Irene Patterson. She had lived almost opposite, and she told me that as a girl she had helped Mr. Goss in his shop. Her excellent book about her childhood - "Half A Stone of Flour' – says :

'Mr. Goss's shop was much bigger than ours and stocked with more interesting things. The heavy mahogany counter stretched across the shop, with the bacon machine sitting on one end, and the biscuit tins with glass tops standing on the floor in front. The aroma of coffee and spices mingled with the smell of ripe cheese as you went into the shop'.

Elsewhere she had written of Mr. Goss's unfailing courtesy, and I recall her telling me of his kindness to her when as a very little girl she delighted in searching his shop for things he had lost. Only later did she realise that he commonly mislaid them deliberately, to give her the excitement of finding them again for him. Her reward was usually a long-lasting sweet – a bull's-eye or even better, an aniseed ball.

This photograph from around the 1890s shows what I take to be the shop's frontage. At that time it was still being run by the Edward Walker family, who in the 1880s had diversified into the manufacture around Finkle Street of pickles, preserves and a range of flours. This was soon the major part of a large and growing business, which may explain why in 1925 ithe little retail shop became available for Joseph Goss.

If any reader is still sceptical about this version of the lower end of Finkle Street, I suggest reference to Donald Brownrigg's book 'Old St. Bees'. There his additional information, and some more excellent photographs, bear witness to the Walker enterprise's success.

A compulsory census, in a crowded town, meant that Jesus was born in extremely basic, temporary accommodation. In the first years of his life he was visited by outcasts and hunted by a despotic King. Wise men from foreign lands brought him gifts fit for royalty and gifts to anoint him for burial. Traditionally the more frightening parts of Jesus' birth and childhood don't feature in Nativity plays, for good reason, but it's important to remember them.

It's important because without them we can be lulled into a sense that if Christmas isn't delivering all that it promises then there's something wrong with us or the season. When in fact Christmas is both pain and promise. Emmanuel. God with us. In both life and death. When everything is familiar and when our world is turned upside down.

This Christmas if you'd like to find out more about God's gift of his Son Jesus to the world, why not come along to a service in the Priory or if you fancy something a bit less traditional, wander around the church and enjoy the Christmas tree festival.

And while you're there, if you spot me, I'd love to hear about your Christmas traditions. Although be warned, if your stories make me laugh, or feature unusual headgear, they might feature anonymously in a sermon or a Christmas letter in the years to come.
