

October 2023

I write to you this month from the "Assisi" room in Egremont Parish Hall; my new part-time office. The room is named after St Francis of Assisi, Patron Saint of Ecology. Francis was born in 1181 and died on 3rd October 1226, his Feast Day is 4th October. Some churches mark his Feast Day by inviting parishioners to come to a service of blessing for their pets. This tradition began because Francis is said to have had a particular affinity with animals, he addressed them as "brother" and "sister" and story goes that he once tamed a wolf. St Bees Priory has recently begun welcoming well behaved dogs on leads to church services, not exactly wolf taming, but it's a start!

In his "Canticle of Creation" Francis wrote;

Be praised, my Lord, for Sister Earth, our Mother, who nourishes us and sustains us, bringing forth fruits and vegetables of many kinds and flowers of many colours.

In October we appreciate the beauty and variety of the food we eat and we give thanks, as Francis did, for God who provides, and farmers, who work the land. Harvest services and assemblies across our schools and in our churches give us an opportunity to give thanks and celebrate God's goodness. This year in the Priory we are marking Harvest with three services in eight days, on the 1st October we will learn about this year's Bishops Harvest Appeal and consider our response, on the 2nd October St Bees Village School will explore what Harvest means to them in a special service and on the 8th October the village orchestra will join us for a Traditional All Age Harvest Celebration with the presentation of gifts and a collection for both the Food Bank and the Bishops Harvest Appeal.

As October progresses we will move from a season of giving thanks for food and farming to a season of care for all God's people. After the success of last year's "Wednesday Winter Warmers" and inspired by Whitehaven's fortnightly Memory Cafe St Bees are looking to run something similar, starting on Tuesday 7th November in New College Hall. Later on in the month, the Priory will be a focus for healing and wholeness, as we meet on Thursday 19th October, for a special service for St Lukes tide. All are welcome to come to this service for yourself, or for someone else, and rest in God's healing and restorative presence.

After the half term holiday and as the seasons change we begin the journey from "Treading Gently" to "Caring Deeply". From the end of October until the start of Advent churches in St Bees and Egremont will host the five week "Difference" course, exploring how we may be people of reconciliation in our communities. To find out how to join the course both online and in person please see the centre pages of this magazine.

There's lots going on in our communities this October to help us connect, as St Francis did, with all our fellow creatures. Read on to find out more!

Harvest Gifts of fruit & flowers, veg & groceries, may be brought to church on Saturday 7th October for decorating windowsills, or on Sunday to present at the service. Everyone including children is welcome to bring gifts to the Sunday service, to be distributed on Monday to those in hospital or care homes, and to the sick and housebound in the parish. Many thanks for your kindness.

Foodbank Collection – Please bring items for the Foodbank as usual – tins, jars, large packets and non-perishable foods, to be left in the Baptistry near the back of church. These will be collected later by the North Lakes Foodbank.

Bishop's Harvest Appeal – The Carlisle Diocese is supporting two projects:- the Christian Aid project in Israel & the Occupied Palestinian Territories working for human rights and protection; and the Mothers' Union Literacy & Agriculture Scheme in the Democratic Republic of the Congo, helping women and girls to become self-reliant and escape poverty and gender-based violence. Do pick up the leaflets in church and use the gift-Aid envelopes if possible – thank you!

Beach Clean- All are welcome to join in the October beach clean at St Bees on Friday 20th October, meeting at St Bees Lifeboat Station at 10am. Litter pickers and gloves are available to borrow. Thank you for your help to keep St Bees beach clean.

Beach Play Area – The play area has been heavily used over the summer period and the equipment is showing signs of wear and tear with several items of equipment in need of repairs. Safety is the paramount concern so it is sometimes necessary to take equipment out of service pending repair. The Parish Council is working hard to organise repairs and bring the equipment back into use as soon as possible.

Seats – The new seat to commemorate the coronation of King Charles has been installed in Priory Paddock so visitors have somewhere to sit and enjoy the garden. The seat at the top of Scalebarrow is to be removed as it is in poor condition and beyond repair. The Parish Council will shortly be considering the replacement of both this seat and the one by the pumping station on Nethertown Rd which was damaged last year.

Station car park- the Parish Council is pressing ahead with its long term ambition to provide additional off street car parking on land adjacent to the existing car park to relieve congestion in the centre of the village. In recent months there have been constructive discussions with both Network Rail and Cumberland Council. We will provide more information as discussions progress.

Information boards – The new interpretation board has been installed at Priory Paddock and another will be in place shortly at the Priory.

Remembrance Sunday – the usual wreath laying ceremony will take place in the village on Remembrance Sunday. More details in next months magazine.

Flooding – the heavy rain in recent days has seen a recurrence of the flooding on the Outrigg to Egremont road. This has been a problem for months now and Cllr Minshaw, our Cumberland Councillor, is contacting Highways officers to press for a solution to be found.

Litter bin - the wall-mounted litter bin outside the Post Office was damaged recently when a vehicle apparently mounted the pavement. This bin was always well used and the Parish Council has agreed to purchase a replacement.

Dog fouling — As you walk around the village, you may notice that Cumberland Council have repainted stencils on pavements to reinforce the message that dog owners should clean up after their dogs. There has been a report of particular problems from Nethertown Rd to the public footpath which leads back to Sea Mill Lane. If you use that route regularly to walk your dog, please take a bag with you and clean up after your dog.

Next Parish Council Meeting – The next Parish Council meeting will be on Monday 16 October at 6.30pm in the Village Hall. Council meetings are open to the public and all are welcome to attend. Why not come along and see the PC in action? We still have vacancies for three parish councillors!

Boxes of Hope, Cumbria, ceases to operate

With great sadness and regret the charity is ending its annual campaign to send shoeboxes to Romanian children, after becoming financially unviable due to Brexit and unsustainable costs. Since the UK left the European Union the cost implication of paying VAT on the value of 10,000 shoeboxes could be up to £40,000 at £20 per box. The scheme is now totally unviable.

Trips to Romania by volunteers are cost-prohibitive. Holland will continue to send shoeboxes being in the E.U. but the charity is unable to undertake shipments without incurring VAT. Boxes of Hope wishes to thank every volunteer and supporter in churches and schools in Cumbria, North Lancashire and North Yorkshire, for their tireless help over the last 10 years.



Rub-a-Dub Dub, Three Men

For two centuries or more, St. Bees children may have known that old rhyme about three men going to sea in a tub. Two of the men – the butcher and the baker - would have seemed familiar to them, for at that time there was enough demand in the village to support two of each. But I very much doubt that we could ever have found work for the candlestick-maker, who according to the rhyme was the tub's third occupant. We might once have claimed to come close to it, though, for when the Kenworthy family moved here from Whitehaven, it was supposed that their affluence came from their candlemaking factory there.

We do know a little about some actual village bakers. The recollections of some of our older residents were once recorded and I am grateful that the late Dr. John Todd, with some others, ensured the preservation of some interesting accounts. This example is from a Mrs. S:

"There were two bakeries in the village, both of which seem to bring back to people immediate thoughts and smells. One bakery was run by Edie Dickinson on Outrigg on the site of Craig Moffatt's cottage. Mrs Dickinson earned the name of the "Bisky Queen". She would push a handcart up the Main Street, green with two wheels and a lid, selling teacakes which were locally know as 'biskies', hence her nickname'.

Again according to Mrs. S, the other bakery was at 121 Main Street, about opposite the Chemist. 'It was run by Mrs. Smith and the boys from the School were allowed up to to this point.' I recall Annie Ashburner working there for sixpence an hour. They sold teacakes, sold hot to the boys, with a piece of chocolate inside. The bread was delivered to the School on a flat bogey'.'

Another villager continued: "Evelyn Smith was one of the bake-house daughters. Her mother was a tiny woman, nearly as broad as she was tall. Rosy cheeks, and her hair done up in a bun on top. I remember it as if it was yesterday. She ran the bakery and they had coke ovens and when she was taking the bread out, all baked fresh, the smell was gorgeous in there. Oh yes. It was lovely bread, and she used to make halfpenny buns, round and big and all brown on top with sugar on the top". Someone else — I think perhaps Fred Chinner, who had come to the village in 1906 - added "Get a bottle of lemonade and a halfpenny bun, and you had a good feed". And Mrs. S again: "She made excellent bread, she did, and gingerbread, and very good apricot jam".

Perhaps next month we will be able to say some more about this not-too-distant time.

By becoming literate and learning basic governance through the Mothers' Union projects, women can work cooperatively to maximise the benefit of their farming activities. Membership is based on prayer as well as action. At midday, a wave or prayer travels around the world and pray for every diocese through the course of the year. In Cumbria we support our local refuges, schools, hospitals in various ways. We provide books for those being baptised and offer free holidays in a caravan at ST Bees, for those who need a break, but cannot afford one.

If its called the Mothers' Union, why can men join? The Mothers' Union was started in 1876 in days when women were considered as less than men. The founder, Mary Sumner, wanted Mothers to help other mothers in the bringing up of their children. "Mothering" continues to be a key aim of the Mothers' Union but the membership of men and women who are not mothers enables the International and UK Mothers' Union work to take place, supporting mothers and families.
