

Six years ago in my first "Vicar's letter" in this magazine I wrote about my love of growing things. Since 2017 I have been pleased to meet and work alongside many of you who are not only passionate gardeners but skilled too. From raising roses to cultivating cabbages this village has it all!

St Bees vicarage has a large garden with lots of lawn and several flowerbeds. Thanks to generous volunteers who look after the vicarage grass (as well as the church grounds) our lawns get a regular trim. Friends and family help me with the flowerbeds when they come to stay.

We also have a huge walled garden, which has the potential to be a really special community space. Since 2018 I have felt blessed to work with parishioners with a love of all things horticultural clearing the "jungle" to make room for a space for everyone. Thanks to our efforts it's been transformed and we now have raised beds, a shed, a wildflower walkway and even a bench for resting visitors and workers! Do stop by and see us for a rest and a chat one Saturday morning. It's such a special place and there's a space on the bench just for you.

The idea of gardens as sacred spaces isn't a new one. The Bible tells us that God was with Adam and Eve and they "heard the sound of the LORD God walking in the garden at the time of the evening breeze" (Genesis 3:8) Jesus prayed in the garden of Gesthemene the night he was betrayed (Matthew 26:36) and Mary mistook the risen Jesus for a gardener when she met him on Easter day (John 20:15)

When I wrote to you in April 2019 I was looking forward to our 900th anniversary celebrations in June 2020. I wrote that "throughout human history, God's presence is experienced as much outside church buildings as it is in them. This sense of God's presence both within the Priory, amongst the village and in the wider world will be obvious, we hope, in all the 900 years events".

Sadly, almost all the 900 years events were cancelled due to Covid but that didn't stop God being present both inside and outside the church. And it didn't stop the Priory embroiderers, who, after four years of planning and skilful craftmanship, have produced a beautiful homage to 900 years of worship and witness. We look forward to a special service to bless this new addition to the Priory furnishings sometime later this spring.

In the meantime, this April there's plenty to get involved with, both inside and outside the Priory. Maybe join in with the next stage of the community garden project on Saturday mornings throughout April, or come along to one of our Holy week services? Our Easter Day service on April 9th starts inside the Priory and ends with a chocolate egg hunt in the church grounds. A chance to enjoy the Priory, both inside and out.

Just for this once

Much too long, mostly... and much too confined to St. Bees. This double grumble comes from someone new to our village history articles. Well, I'm sorry about the length, but pages set aside specifically for *local* history are never going to take us far afield.

Still, for this one month only, let us make an exception. Could we turn our attention instead towards London? That is what the Revd. Canon Richard Parkinson did in 1851. Our Vicar and Theological College Principal was already a leading figure in his own right. But nevertheless he seems to have been awed by eminence in others, cultivating friendships with such figures as the Wordsworths and Lord Lonsdale, with George Hudson ''The Railway King'', and Sir Robert Peel, the ex-Premier.



!851 was the year of London's great Crystal Palace Exhibition. Properly it was entitled The Great Scientific Exhibition of the Industrial Works of All Nations. As a modernminded and forward-looking person the Canon had attended the Exhibition's Introductory lectures in Whitehaven, and he must surely have been ready to marvel at much that he would see at the Exhibition itself. Yet his letters home say barely a word of it.

What we hear more about is another encounter with eminence. In the Canon's own words:

"... as we walked in the Park, we met the Duke of Wellington, whom I saw for the first time. He looked like Wordsworth. He kindly touched his cap to us, and turned about so that we might see him better, at the evident hint of the Marchioness of Down who was with him. Then the whole tide of horse-omnibuses stopped so that he might cross the road to us. No other earthly power could have stopped them ..."

St Bees School win big at popular Lego League event for the sixth time.

A team of four girls, along with three members of staff, made the journey to Lakes College last week to compete in the FIRST LEGO League Challenge where they walked away with one of the top prizes, the Robot Performance Award.

FIRST LEGO League Challenge sees teams from all over the county design and code their own robot which then has to compete in multiple games with the aim of scoring the highest points to be in with the chance of winning one of the top prizes, including a ticket to the National Final.

Students learn all sorts of core skills and also have to complete an 'Innovation Project' that solves a problem that they may face in their school or in life in general.
