

#### St Bees News

February 2024

I was twelve years old when Rick Astley's chart topping hit "Never gonna give you up" spent five weeks at number one. Thirty something years later I was thrilled to receive tickets for his Arena gig in Newcastle at the end of the month. Rick's decades of success are, in part, down to the popularity (and, let's be honest, ridicule) of his 1987 hit. You may not be a fan of Rick Astley, you may have never been "rickrolled" but you have probably heard the lyrics...Never gonna give you up, Never gonna let you down, Never gonna run around and desert you, Never gonna make you cry, Never gonna say goodbye, Never gonna tell a lie and hurt you.

February in the vicarage this year will feature (amongst other things) a public consultation on vicarage viability, Valentines Day (maybe!) Ash Wednesday, the first weeks of a Lent course, prayers of living in love and faith and Rick! Quite a disparate list on first glance...but it occurs to me that Lent and Rick might have more in common than is immediately obvious and here's why...

Our Lent course this year is "Loving my Neighbour", six sessions, meeting both online and in person, to discuss the answers to questions about loving those who are vulnerable, suffering or different to us. We will also explore what it means to love in truth, love oneself, love the world around us and love to the end - never giving up on love. Valentines Day and Ash Wednesday coincide this year so it makes perfect sense to make love our focus this Lent. Eros or romantic love and agape or self-giving love. (See centre pages for more details of the Lent course)

Love is very much on the agenda of the PCC and congregation of St Bees this month, specifically the Church of England's "Prayers for Living in Love and Faith". On 12th December, the House of Bishops commended these prayers to be used in regular public worship services when praying with and for a same-sex couple who love one another and who wish to give thanks for and mark that love in faith before God. In January the PCC met and agreed to actively listen to the views of the congregation on the possible introduction of these prayers to public worship in the Priory. The PCC will meet in February to share what they have heard and prayerfully discern our next steps.

Loving the world around us has environmental implications. As you may be aware the Church of England is aiming for zero carbon emissions by 2030. One of the biggest stumbling blocks to this is the energy efficiency of their buildings. Some buildings are trickier to future proof than others, St Bees vicarage poses some challenges in this area. The Diocese are keen to engage with the parish in conversations about future clergy housing in St Bees. Is it possible to make changes to St Bees vicarage so that it is more energy efficient or is it necessary to start looking for a new house for the vicar? There will be a public consultation on the future of the vicarage to which all are welcome on Wednesday 7th February at 7pm in the Priory followed by refreshments and informal discussion at 8pm.

I began this letter with a pop song from 1980s and I'll leave you with a slightly adapted prayer from the 1550s...love be in our heads and in our understanding; love be in our eyes, and in our looking; love be in our mouths, and in our speaking; love be in our hearts, and in our thinking; love be at our end, and at our departing. Amen. (Sarum Primer, 1558) With love from Reverend Becky

# Parish Council News

**Budget & Precept 2024/5** – At the meeting on 15 January the Parish Council approved its three year budget and set the parish precept for 2024/25. This is the small amount included in everyone's council tax bill to help fund the work of the Parsh Council. The precept was set at £57000 which equates to an increase of approx. 8p per week for a Band D property. The Parish Council will continue to provide services and facilities such as the beach toilets, allotments, play areas in the village etc and will progress projects to provide additional off road parking and improvements to the Outrigg play area.

**Station Improvements** – We have been informed by contractors acting for Network Rail that work is due to start in February to raise the height of both platforms to improve disabled access. The train service will be unaffected but the upper part of Station car park will be required as a storage compound and to provide access for the contractors and a number of parking spaces will be unavailable from 12 February to 19 April.

**Nethertown Rd Litter Bin** – The litter bin which was mounted on a sign post on Nethertown Rd has been removed by Cumberland Council for safekeeping after the post rusted through and collapsed. Highways have been asked to replace the post and the litter bin will then be reinstated. In the meantime it would be appreciated if dog walkers would take dog waste bags home or use another bin for disposal and not leave bags on the road-side.

**Flooding-** there continue to be serious problems with flooding on the Outrigg to Egremont Road. Cumberland Council has now decided to instal a new drain to link into the existing drains by the Loughrigg junction. The first stage will be to design the new drain but once the construction works begin on site, we are told that the road should be open within 6 weeks.

**Christmas tree** – Thank you to all those who helped put up and take down the Christmas tree. The Parish Council would particularly like to thank the local resident who provided the electricity for the tree lights and those who disposed of the tree. A donation to charity is being made in lieu of payment for the electricity.

**Next Parish Council Meeting** – The next Parish Council meeting will be on Monday 19 February at 6.30pm in the Village Hall

After Christmas we packed my yellow bag and went to the caravan. Mammy needs to go on a weather course. She's had her finger on the rain button far too long. One day I sensibly sheltered under a hedge. That did not last long as mammy did not fit under the hedge and she thought we should both get wet together! Whenever we went out there were new rivers and lakes – I know it is the lake district, but there are limits. The other trouble is the mud. I can't seem to avoid it unless we go on a beach. Mud means washing of the 'feet'. Roll on some spring weather.

# Main Street, mainly

Last month's magazine mentioned Jonathan Herd. One of his contemporaries had written of Jonathan's belief that a wandering, headless ghost haunted one end of our village. Doubtless, in Victorian times, it was easier for such an idea to persist than in our "better educated" age.

Since the December article, several of our readers have noticed the nameplate marked '1840' above the door of 83 Main Street. This is where Jonathan and his wife lived, with two adult daughters, who were dressmakers. Soon the Herds began to take in students from the growing College, often two or three at a time. With their comings and goings, and the dressmakers' customers arriving for advice and fittings, Jonathan must have found it a busy place from which to run his own business. When required to state his occupation, he styled himself "property owner".

If the '1840' on the nameplate above the door is house's building date, it had seen almost the start of Main Street's transformation. From early Victorian times, there was much to be done. I must thank the Revd. Canon Park for this extract from a newly-arrived student's letter. Arriving through "a bare and ugly valley, thinly populated", he found:

"....a long, straggling place above an ancient Abbey, this is St. Bees. A primitive village, small stone houses, a dirty unpaved road, then a smart new terrace of lodging houses, next a quantity of straw and farm litter, then a row of dirty cabins: repeat this about three or four times, till you are about a mile up the hill....and there you have it, St. Bees".

Of course, at this time, there was no mains sewerage, each house or group of houses having its own cess-pit. Water was carried up to the houses from springs or wells (there is still a Well Field off Seamill Lane), and there were 'dipping holes' along the beck. Main Street was virtually un-drained, and was repaired in bad spots with shillies from the beach or ashes from domestic fireplaces. And there were a good many tumbledown cottages with rotting or worn-out thatch; the first of these to go being a row of six, close to what has now become the entrance to Seacroft Drive. Improvements came as the years went by; with better built houses, some quite spacious, and others on a scale to suit students from the Theological College.

When, at the end of the century, the village needed to advertise itself, it would boast of being "that favourite resort of gentlefolk and invalids from all parts of the realm". What a far cry from the time of Jonathan Herd, and his fellow believers in our own St. Bees ghost.





This month's "Tread Gently" is from the Carlisle Diocesan News

Work has been completed on the Diocese of Carlisle's first Net Carbon Zero vicarage. Five months ago, the Diocese purchased a property in Natland, just south of Kendal, as a replacement for the village's existing Victorian vicarage. Work has since been undertaken to install a new air source heat pump, pressurised water heating system, solar panels on the roof and battery storage to improve efficiency and provide two thirds of the electricity supply, increased insulation in the roof space and new external doors. It means the Rev Canon Angela Whittaker - Helm Mission Community Leader - and her husband, Andrew, can now move into the property soon. Nick Paxman, the Diocesan Property Manager who project managed the work, said: "We are delighted with what has been achieved. The old Victorian vicarage in the village, though charming to look at, was very expensive for us to maintain and more importantly impossibly expensive for our Vicar to heat. "We needed an answer and one which is in line with our Net Carbon challenge. So, here we've focused on removing the traditional central heating boiler – in this case fuelled by gas – and replaced it with an air source heat pump."


The monthly costs of heating the 22-year-old property will be slashed with further potential to sell on to energy providers any surplus electricity generated by the solar panels. The costs of the purchase of the newer property and the associated Net Carbon works and further renovations will be offset by the sale of the Victorian vicarage, with the Diocese investing the residue in support of future mission and ministry across the county.

It follows last October's Diocesan Synod – the local general assembly made up of bishops, archdeacons and elected clergy and laity – at which members formally endorsed the Diocesan Net Zero Action Plan, Anna Newlove, Diocesan Pastoral and Net Zero Officer, liaised with the property team as work was completed on the Net Carbon Zero vicarage. Anna said: "It is exciting to see the work that has been completed on the property and the difference that has already made to the building's energy performance. The Diocese has budgeted £250,000 a year for the next five years towards a programme of Net Carbon Zero works on various properties. The new Net Carbon Zero Natland vicarage is one of three to be developed initially. Work has also just started on Net Carbon Zero improvements at a recently purchased vicarage in Grasmere with further work scheduled on third property in Wigton at Easter.

The Bishop of Penrith, the Rt Rev Rob Saner-Haigh, said: "In line with many other dioceses in England, there are inherent challenges as we work towards the Church of England's Net Carbon Zero target date of 2030. "However, as we embrace the need to 'tread gently' - one of the key themes of our ecumenical county's God for All vision and strategy - we remain committed to doing all we can to cherish and protect God's creation. The improvement to this eco vicarage and our future schedule of works reflects this ongoing commitment."
