

St Bees News

February 2025

By the time you read this the Vicarage Christmas tree will have been stripped of it's decorations and be sadly lying, ready for disposal, in the vicarage community walled garden. But today, as I write this, on the 19th January the Christmas tree still stands resplendent, fully lit and gloriously decked, needles miraculously hanging on for dear life. The tree and I are defiantly facing January, the freezing mornings and the damp days, pretending it's still Christmas. Well not quite pretending, according to church tradition, the season of Christmas and Epiphany lasts from the 24th December right through until the 2nd February. So don't worry if like me your decs are still up, whether it's because you need a bit of Christmas joy right now, or simply that you haven't got around to taking them down yet, the Vicar says it's OK!

To join in with me following the tradition the decorations will have to come down by the 2nd February because that's when a new season in the Church begins, on Candlemas, the day the church remembers the presentation of the infant Jesus in the temple. (You can read more about this in the centre page of this magazine) The story of the Presentation can be e found in Luke chapter two...moved by the Spirit, the Prophet Simeon enters the temple and after receiving the infant Jesus in his arms says...

"My eyes have seen your salvation, which you have prepared in the sight of all nations: a light for revelation to the Gentiles, and the glory of your people Israel."

When Simeon spoke these words two thousand years ago his world was being torn apart by violence and oppression, for many people the world was a dark and dangerous place. Sadly, the days we live in are in some ways similar. I think that's why I want to hang on to my Christmas tree for just a bit longer, it re minds me of the joy and hope that we celebrated just a couple of weeks ago, it's a brightly lit bridge to take me through to the day when we remember again "a light for revelation to all nations".

The 2nd February is also "Groundhog day"; a tradition observed regionally in the United States and Canada on 2nd February every year. It comes from the Pennsylvania Dutch superstition that if a groundhog emerges from its burrow on this day and sees its shadow, it will retreat to its den and winter will go on for six more weeks; if it does not see its shadow, spring will arrive early. Right now I've had enough of winter and if I were superstitious I'd be willing the groundhog to fix his gaze firmly in the non-shadow direction. Instead, I will turn off the Christmas lights, pack away the decorations and take down the tree. I will remind myself that I, like Simeon, believe in the salvation that God gave to the nations, I believe that Jesus is that light and salvation, and that His light still shines for us today, even in the darkest places of our world.

Today, in the Vicarage, it's still Christmas, by the time you read this, a new season will have begun. Whether spring comes early or winter drags on, may we know the light of love in our lives and strengthened by that light, share it with all we meet this February.

Parish Council News

Application for holiday pods on Nethertown Road —we are aware that there has been much interest in this planning application. The application was due to be considered by Cumberland Council's Planning Committee on 8 January with Committee members visiting the site on 6 January. However, the icy weather prevented the site meeting taking place and, when the application came before the Committee on 8 January, it was decided to defer a decision until a site visit could be arranged. Unfortunately, this meant that Parish Council representatives and a member of the public had a wasted day in travelling to Carlisle but the Parish Council will be presenting its case when the application comes before the Planning Committee in February.

Precept 2025/26 – the Parish Council approved its budget for 2025/26 at its meeting in December. The precept was set at £64,000 which reflects the increased costs of maintaining the beach toilets and increase in National Insurance whilst still enabling the Parish Council to continue to undertake various community projects and support local groups.

Groynes & Shoreline Management –the Parish Council has requested a copy of the full specialist report commissioned by CBC in 2022 and has invited an officer of Cumberland Council to come to the February PC meeting for a discussion.

Solar Panels – the Parish Council has taken a policy decision to support the use of solar panels in all new housing developments. The council will lobby our MP to support the case for including solar panels in the Future Homes Standard to be published shortly and will press Cumberland Council to include solar panels in their local planning policies.

Bega Flats – We understand that work is almost complete to convert the four small units into two larger homes (one two bedroomed & one three bedroomed). Both properties will be rented out by Eden Housing Association. As the properties are no longer flats, we understand that they will be renamed Blackthorn Cottage & Juniper Cottage.

Station Sign – the large traditional St Bees sign which has been mounted on the wall at the station has had to be removed and is now in safe keeping at the railway museum. It is hoped to renovate the sign in due course with a view to finding a new location for it close to the station.

Litter bin – it has been decided to replace the wall mounted litter bin on the Post Office wall after the old bin was damaged by a vehicle. It will be placed in a slightly different position to avoid causing inconvenience to neighbours.

Christmas tree- we would like to thank everyone who helped with putting up and taking down the Christmas tree and also the local resident who allowed us to connect the lights to his supply. A donation is being made to a local charity of his choice.

Next meeting-. The next meeting will be on Monday 17 February at 6.30pm in the Village Hall.

The Adams Recreation Ground, just off Beach Road, is owned and operated by a charitable trust. All the trustees are volunteers. The purposes of the trust are to provide sporting and recreational opportunities for the local community. The grounds and pavilion currently provide the base for St Bees FC, St Bees Triers, the Little Learners Nursery Beach School and Meditation and Healing events run by Jenny Prince. We are always looking to broaden our range of users so if you think we can help, please get in touch.

There have been several developments in recent years which include refurbishment of the main hall, extensive native species tree planting, development of a wildflower meadow and the installation of a disability access path from the pavilion down to pitch level. Grant funding for these and other projects have been provided by Cumbria Wildlife Trust, Cumbria Community Forest, Copeland Community Development and Cumbria County Council. Additionally, there is now the option during the day for "honesty box" car parking near the beach. Overnight parking is with permission only and is subject to an annual fee. Please support us as all funds are ploughed back into improving the facilities for us all to enjoy.

There are also projects underway, including the installation of two EV charging points, outdoor gym equipment, flora and fauna information boards and a bike repair station. Just before Christmas, a few hardy souls planted a 50m length of mixed native species hedgerow, funded by the Lake District Foundation. There's a 550m distance marked route around part of the site which takes you past lots of the areas that have been planted, so if you want to burn off some of the holiday calories, or just spend some time in a lovely corner of the village, we hope to see you down there.





What is Candlemas?

'Forty days after Jesus' birth, Mary and Joseph went to the Temple in Jerusalem for a ritual presentation of their baby to God, as required by Jewish Law. We read about this in Luke 2:22-40. They met a man named Simeon, who described Jesus as a 'light' for all the people of the world. The also met an elderly prophet, Anna, who thanked God for Jesus. Anna recognised Jesus as key to God's plan of salvation for all people. The Christian festival celebrating these events – formally known as 'The Presentation of Christ' – is also called 'Candlemas' because on this day, in the times long before electricity, people would bring candles to church to be blessed in recognition of Jesus the 'light of the world'. On Candlemas night, many people place lit candles in their win-




