#### St Bees News

#### June 2023

A few weeks ago I went with Phil and friends on a Retreat to the Island of Iona, off the Scottish coast. During our stay we walked, swam and worshipped. The days followed a monastic rhythm and we had jobs to do, chopping vegetables, laying the tables and cleaning the bathrooms. Our spiritual leader for the week was John Bell, hymn writer, worship leader and teacher of Celtic spirituality. In his series of talks he reminded us that spirituality and later Christianity arrived in the Scottish isles, as it did in Cumbria, many years before the Benedictines and the founding of Abbeys like the one on Iona and Priories like ours. There is evidence of Celtic Christianity both on Iona and in the grounds of St Bees Priory and of course our local legend tells of St Bega arriving three hundred years before the first stone of the Priory was laid.

In one of his talks, John Bell reminded us of the importance of "threes" in early spirituality and Celtic Christianity. The Triskele or Triple Spiral is said to be the oldest symbol of spirituality. Its name comes from the Greek words "Tri" and "Skelos" which means "three legs". Made up of three joining spirals, this ancient symbol has been said to symbolise the celestial, physical, and spiritual worlds, birth, death, and rebirth as well as the unity of mental, physical, and spiritual self. For the Celtic Christians, the symbol is used to represent the Holy Trinity. In May, Christians of all denominations gave thanks for the coming of the Holy Spirit at Pentecost. June begins with Trinity Sunday, a day when church ministers all over the world try to explain the unexplainable, how God can be one and three at the same time. Father, Son and Holy Spirit. I'm tempted to say that it's just like Man City winning the treble; Champions League, Premier League and FA Cup but I suspect that this might irritate both football fans and the heresy police!

Joking aside, the triple spiral is said to symbolize the whole process of always moving toward a state of profound enlightenment and understanding; a spiritual process aided often in the past by the use of a labyrinth; an ancient symbol that represents a journey to our own spiritual centre. In June a special labyrinth will be taking up residence in the Priory. Made from interlocking tiles decorated by children in schools across our Diocese, the Carlisle Cathedral Labyrinth will be in St Bees and open to schools and visitors from the 10th-24th June. There is no single meaning of either triple spiral or labyrinth and both are interpreted in a variety of ways by the Celts themselves. For me, the triple spiral and the Holy Trinity feel cyclical rather than linear, each point or person looking toward the next, revering and honouring each other. Even the labyrinth isn't truly linear, for although we make a journey to the centre, to enlightenment or even revelation, there is another journey to come, unless you want to sit in the middle of a labyrinth forever!

May your past be a pleasant memory, your future filled with delight and mystery, Your now a glorious moment, that fills your life with deep contentment. (A Celtic Blessing) With love from Becky

**Coronation Seat** -The Parish Council has agreed to buy a new seat to commemorate the King's coronation. The new seat will be sited in Priory Paddock and will have a suitable inscription.

Annual Parish Council Meeting – the meeting on 15 May was the first meeting since the recent elections. Doug Sim was re-elected as Chairman and Eric Taylor as Vice Chairman for the coming year. 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#### News from the Village School

We are continuing to develop our grounds around school and the children have all taken part in the planting of trees, together with the Woodland Trust who have been to help us with Phase 2 of our outdoor project. We have started planting our range of hedging plants and trees on the school grounds which include hawthorn, blackberry, hazelnut, elderberry and elderflower etc. We are very excited about this project and the benefits it will bring to our children and our curriculum.

West Cumbria Rivers Trust (WCRT) is part of the national network of river trusts which have played an ever increasing role in delivering the environmental improvements throughout the country. Year 5 were visited by WCRT to talk about the features of a river, a rivers journey and why rivers are important to us. This was followed up by a visit to Braithwaite where they identified the features of the river in reality, explored river wildlife and features of erosion.

Y6 have started their Bright Stars project this term. Bright Stars is an exciting eightweek programme designed to introduce children in primary schools across Cumbria to leadership, entrepreneurship and the world of business whilst raising money for charity, winning funds for their school and having fun along the way. This year, our campaign is focused on Healthy bodies/Healthy minds' and bringing fun into school.

We had a lovely day celebrating the Coronation of King Charles III in school. We started the day with a special Philosophy for Children (P4C) assembly based around a children's book and the theme continued in class during the morning. We had a picnic lunch on the field followed by an afternoon of fun and games. The children were dressed in red, white and blue or regally dressed as kings and queens. To mark this auspicious occasion, we are planning to purchase a commemorative bench for children to use in our outdoor area. We feel this would reflect the ethos of the learning environment which King Charles so passionately embraces.

St Bees Bash is going ahead again this year and will be held on St Bees School grounds on Saturday 1<sup>st</sup> July. As part of the day there will be a fancy-dress parade and all children and parents are invited to take part if they wish. School staff and the VSA will be organising and manning stalls at the event which will also have a variety of family-oriented activities and events on offer. **During Great Big Green Week**, St Bees Green Future are sharing easy steps to help you save energy and money. Have you tried the following? Approximate annual savings are shown in brackets and are from the Energy Saving Trust.

Don't use standby for your devices (£65)

Turn lights off when you leave a room (£25)

Wash your clothes at 30 degrees (£17 – compared to 40 degrees)

Avoid using your tumble dryer where possible (£70)

Take a 4-minute shower (£95 - compared to the average of a 7.5 minute shower)

Swap one bath a week for a shower (£20)

Don't overfill your kettle (£13)

Use your dishwasher once a week less (£17)

Save money when cooking by using your microwave, slow cooker or airfryer instead of your oven. Use lids with pans, steam and cook multiple items in the same pan.

Draught proof around your doors and windows, as well as open chimneys when not in use (£125) - Cumbria Action for Sustainability offers free advice and help with draught proofing via their Cold to Cosy Homes scheme, with a wide range of criteria for health problems, vulnerabilities and income criteria.

Insulate your hot water cylinder (£70)

Turn down your thermostat by one degree, which can save up to 10% on your heating bills. You could wear an extra layer if you turn your thermostat down.

Many of these stitches and techniques are not easy. Fortunately Dorothy was a patient teacher, always looking for the opportunity to pass on her skills. This patience often extended to secretly unpicking and re-working less than perfect work between sessions.

After Pam Argyle joined the group, her design background brought a new dimension to the projects undertaken, and her leadership became invaluable after Dorothy became ill and unable to be as actively involved as she wanted.

In 2019, work began on our latest and final project, an embroidered panel to celebrate 900 years of worship at the Priory. It has taken dedicated work by several people over the last four years, and it is wonderful to see it displayed so beautifully in the Priory....and a relief!

This group has been a source of pleasure and friendship, of the sharing of skills and expertise, and more than a few surprises. (Who knew that preparing our careful stitching for display might involve painting it with wallpaper paste and the judicious use of a hammer, casually produced from Dorothy's handbag?)

Members of the group have come and gone; as we put the final stitches in this panel, there was a huge sense of satisfaction, but we will miss our Friday afternoons in New College Hall. Will the Priory Embroiderers have a new life, to carry on for another twenty years? It would be lovely to think so!

#### Perhaps not Real History

Now and again when I look through old forgotten records, something crops up which I'd like to see saved for all time. But to others it may seem too trivial to bother with – or not the sort of thing 'Real History' should be about.

That St. Bees once had eight 'Special Constables' is certain historical fact. They were appointed at the very outset of World War Two – five from the village, the rest from the Public School.

After a week of evening trainings in Whitehaven, each Constable was issued with a helmet of some sort, and a cape, and a truncheon. So equipped, he was to assist the village policeman, I think P.C. Brogan at this point, – taking a turn in patrolling the village after dark. How effective the Constables were is not clear, but the initial scheme seems not to have lasted long.

In another but perhaps more important way, our Special Constables did serve a useful purpose. At the beginning of the War there was a very real fear that spies, saboteurs and other 'fifth columnists' were entering the country unseen. So our Constables were required to keep watch on our beach from first light each day to eliminate any early morning infiltrator who might try to arrive from the sea. The arrangement reached was that three Constables would spend each night together in the Station Waiting Room, one staying awake to rouse the other two at four o'clock. All three, armed with their truncheons, would then head for the beach.

It is hard to know how seriously people regarded the Constables. Obviously few imagined that with three truncheons they could thwart any mass invasion. But World War One veteran Jack Middleton, soon to become Home Guard sergeant, decided one morning on a prank to test that night's Constables. Creeping into the Waiting Room at four o'clock, Jack found all three Constables sound asleep. He left them to slumber on, while quietly making off with their truncheons. Then he took up their watch on the beach, waiting there until the dis-armed and shamefaced Constables arrived long after their proper time.

It says much for Jack's discretion that the story was kept quiet at the time. It is remembered to this day, however, in the Middletons' family history. If anyone reading of it now is thinking "not really the stuff of history" — well maybe so. But we will hope to have something more substantial for next month's history page.

#### Priory Embroidery Group

After the Millennium Hanging was completed in 2000, Dorothy Smith and Irene Palmer gathered together a group of enthusiastic stitchers who wanted to carry on sewing. The Priory Embroidery Group was reformed in 2001, with the aim of preserving some of the Church furnishings and vestments, and carrying out future projects supported by the Furnishing Fund.



Over the next 22 years, the Embroiderers worked on a succession of lovely furnishings, each one an original design, taking inspiration from the Priory itself, its structure and colour, and referencing images from the windows, the floor tiles and even the metalwork on the door. After Irene moved away, the group continued under Dorothy's leadership.

Projects included;

Between 2001 to 2004 refurbishment of the

seven High altar kneelers, a cushion for the Bishop's chair, cushion and kneeler for the Prayer chair, and wall seat cushions to be placed beneath the chancel south windows.

In 2006, the group were working on projects for the Lady Chapel, including two new long kneelers for the communion rail, and replacement cover for the altar. The embroidered frontispiece on the new altar cover was Dorothy's work.

2009/10 saw the replacement of the various seasonal altar covers with a new, single High Altar cover and Superfrontal. The beautiful superfrontal design and embroidery were solely worked by Dorothy herself. 2009 also saw the start of new cushions for what became the Diamond Jubilee bench seat.

Various other projects were undertaken, including four new offertory bags, eleven embroidered seat pads of different designs for chairs placed around the Priory and cushion for the bench at the back of the church. A new seat cushion was made for the piano stool, along with replacement pulpit falls and burses for the liturgical seasons. Two new Bible bookmarks were stitched, and repairs made to the Mothers Union banner.

In 2018, cushions for the two Vicars seat in the chancel were commissioned by Canon Trevor Park, in memory of his wife Olaug.

All these pieces were designed to have impact from a distance. Closer inspection, though, shows Dorothy's *Continued on page 18*







