

A couple of weeks ago we were treated to an incredible sight when the aurora borealis, more commonly known as the Northern Lights, lit up the skies. Excited onlookers shared pictures of the lights on social media, I was away that night and missed the whole thing, and was amazed to see all the incredible images on St Bees News and Views Facebook page when I returned home. The dazzling lights are caused by charged particles from the sun colliding with the Earth's atmosphere. Scientists tell us that the conditions leading to this event may well return again so maybe I'll get to see them another time?

Unusual and awe inspiring events such as the Northern Lights mean different things to different people. For some, it's an opportunity to study a scientific phenomenon, for others it's the chance to take a stunning photo or create a work of art, some may experience a moment of wonder and sense that they've glimpsed something majestic and divine. When I was teaching we called this a "Learning Style", we appreciated that children (and adults) learn and engage with the world in various ways and we tried to design lessons that created opportunities for everyone to engage, whether it be visually, aurally, analytically or kinaesthetically.

In May the church celebrated the day when the early church first received the gift of the Holy Spirit at Pentecost. Scripture tells us that the sky was alight with flames that didn't burn when they rested on the heads of those who were present and despite being of many nations, they could understand what each other were saying. Amongst all the signs and wonders they were amazed and perplexed, and they asked one another, "What does this mean?" (Acts 2:12)

In the following verses from Acts chapter two the apostle Peter explained the events in the light of the scriptures and his own relationship with Jesus. Peter's explanation is helpful but it is just one response, formed by his personality and learning style. How wonderful would it be to have a breadth of responses from the people that day...artists, poets, musicians and magicians (the scientists of their day)?

This month all are welcome, whatever their learning style, to visit the Priory and explore the "Rest under the Stars" installation on tour from Carlisle Cathedral. We will be hosting this collaborative project between the Cathedral and Prism Arts from Monday 17th to Tuesday 25th June. Local schools will be taking part in Geography and RE workshops exploring themes of Travel, our Locality and Rest. There will be activities for children and families after school too (see our website and Facebook page for more details) All ages are invited to relax on specially designed deckchairs, whilst listening on headphones to a bespoke soundscape and gazing up at canopies created by participants at Prism Arts workshops across the diocese.

This month of June I invite you to be struck by the wonder of this world, it's beauty and it's diversity. May you know the restorative presence of the divine in your mind, body, heart and soul. And, especially if you missed them last time, may you glimpse the beauty of the Northern lights! With love from Reverend Becky

Parish Council News

Election of Chairman – the May meeting is the time when the Parish Council elects its Chairman and Vice-Chairman for the coming year. At the meeting on 20 May Doug Sim was re-elected as Chairman and Eric Taylor as Vice-Chairman for 2024/25.

Outrigg Flooding- Martyn Taylor, the Area Highways Manager, attended the May Parish Council meeting to explain progress with plans for resolving the ongoing flooding problems on the Outrigg road. The road had been reopened recently as the owner of the adjacent land had allowed the water to be drained onto his land. Work on the permanent solution to the drainage problem was now expected to begin on 3 June and it was hoped to be finished by late July. The road would need to be closed again for a few days to complete the work.

Potholes – A number of potholes have been filled in over the last month. However, it is important to continue to report potholes using the Highways online reporting system (cumberland.gov.uk) which allows photographs to be uploaded and, if reported whilst at the pothole, allows the exact location to be logged. The more reports, the greater attention is likely to be paid!

Public Space Protection Order – Cumberland Council's consultation on a new Public Space Protection Order has ended. The play areas at the beach and on Outrigg will be designated as areas where dogs are not allowed with some other areas such as the grassed area at the main beach being designated as areas where dogs must be kept on leads.

Beach Clean – The next beach clean will be on Sat 8 June from 6.30-7.30pm. Meet up by the beach clean station to pick up equipment.

Environmental Questionnaire – The Parish Council's Climate Change Working Group has devised a questionnaire to seek residents' views on possible projects. Whatever's made Harry join the Army?

That question would have been in many St. Bees minds at the end of the 1890s. There seemed no obvious answer, for Harry Nankivel had grown up in the village contentedly enough, and now had work on Fairladies Farm as secure as anyone in those days. Also he was much involved with the Priory's quite renowned Choir, where he was the senior tenor, and where too he had nominal charge of the younger boys.

And now at eighteen years old Harry was serving Queen and Country. This was the time of the Boer War, and soon Harry would be in South Africa, with the Royal Lancashires, then engaged in the battle for the Tugela Heights. The Relief of Ladysmith followed soon after. In St. Bees, incidentally, we might mark such successes by celebrations of our



own perhaps with a procession through flag-bedecked Main Street, with banners and streamers and some form of marching band at the front.

We next hear of Harry on garrison duty in Malta. Next came Tibet. Then there was a two-year attachment to the British Tibetan Mission, a body set up to counteract Russian influence in the East (does this sound familiar?)'. It was protected largely by British and Indian troops. Perhaps that is why Harry was sent to Calcutta for his last years of service.

Many years later, In letters received by a long-retired Vicar of St. Bees, I came across:

"I have known Private Nankivel for the last two years, during which I have been Chaplain here at Fort William. He is a member of my Choir, and I know him well. I have much pleasure, on his departure for England, in giving him this letter, in which I desire to testify to his honesty and uprightness; he is hard-working and thoroughly trustworthy"

Experience was not Harry's only gain from his army years. They gave him the opportunity to improve his education. On transfer to the Reserve he held a Second Class Certificate of Education – of the four classes only a First would have been higher.

.So, back in St. Bees Harry returns to Fairladies, and takes up again his Choir responsibilities. Before long, as had been the case before...his help was sought whenever some form of popular entertainment was planned.

And now, for Harry, life would take another drastic, unexpected – and I fear, unwelcome - turn. For anyone who has persevered thus far, I hope to have the chance to explain in a later issue of this magazine.



Letter from Michelle

Excerpt of letter from Michelle, who is sponsored by the Priory. She is a local nurse who has been working been working in the Mukinge Hospital, Zambia for many years Dear Friends,

Since my last letter I have had a change of role, I am taking a break from anaesthesia as we have plenty of help at the moment and I am back working on the children's ward. I am really enjoying working with children again and also not having to do on call at night.

The ward has been busy recently with lots of admissions in particular we have had a lot of children with malnutrition. When a child has reached their target weight, they are given a new outfit. This is to try and encourage families to stay on the ward for the often long time it takes to help with malnutrition.



We are anticipating that the number of malnutrition cases will only increase in the coming year as the rains, which should just be finishing, have been very poor. They started well so people who planted crops early have something to harvest but for those who planted later their maize has not grown. This is a country wide problem.

When I go out for a bike ride, I cycle past fields of stunted and failed maize crops. It is like we are already well in to the dry season, with dusty dirt roads and paths that are so sandy I have to get off and push.

It was a pleasure to welcome some members of Wasdale Mountain Rescue Team to our May meeting. For those of you who haven't yet watched their Channel 5 series then it really is worth a watch. A mixture of fell walking and emergency care, both humans and animals where necessary.

Chad, aided by Lee and Baza gave a very informative presentation starting with the history of mountain rescue in the area and how it has evolved into its present day format. The teamwork was evident even on the night as Chad was supported in giving his first presentation by Lee and Baza chipping in where necessary.

Prospective mountain rescue volunteers are interviewed then spend a year as a probationer before becoming a fully qualified member. The casualty carers receive specialised training in reducing fractures to maintain blood supply to limbs and are also qualified to give strong analgesia normally only administered by doctors, nurses and paramedics. Despite one casualty having had a heart attack on top of the fell, Lee told the story of how the casualty had been airlifted to Blackpool and had stents put in before they even managed to get back to base.

They explained their use of Drones, which have also succeeded in the return of loved ones who had gone missing and sadly passed away to their families, and how improved phone signals are aiding emergency calls but in turn seeing the demands on the service increase year on year.

All in all we really enjoyed hearing their story. A donation of £100 was given to the team to aid their wonderful work.

St Bees RNLI

Launch to reports of person in the water off Whitehaven Harbour.

On Wednesday 1 May 2024 at 10.16 p.m. St Bees RNLI were requested to launch by HM Coastguard to locate and assist a person in the water in Whitehaven harbour.

Due to the nature of the shout the crew were summoned on immediate readiness with the lifeboat in the water by 10.30 p.m. With the lifeboat underway, the crew made contact with the Coastguard who briefed them that the first informant had spotted what they thought was torch light from the water and they were concerned that this was a person signalling for help.

Going off this information, the lifeboat crew were tasked to carry out an area search around North Pier at Whitehaven Harbour to quickly locate and assist anyone in need.

By 10.40 p.m. the lifeboat had arrived at Whitehaven, however they were then informed by the Coastguard that the Whitehaven Coastguard Rescue Team who were on scene, had found the source of the light to be a string of lights from fishermen. The lifeboat was then stood down and headed back to the station to be recovered and made ready for the next service by 11.07 p.m.

Dick Beddows, St Bees RNLI Operations Manager says: "A shout for a person in the water is something that is a top priority. Tonight demonstrated that although on this occasion we were not required, the importance of being ready to respond in a professional manner at a moment's notice to time critical incidents."

Callout in search for walker.

At 12.25 p.m. on Tuesday (7 May) volunteers at St Bees RNLI were requested by HM Coastguard to carry out a shoreline search for a possible missing person.

The volunteers at St Bees RNLI launched their inshore lifeboat Joy Morris OBE after a member of the public reported finding a rucksack at the top of St Bees Head near the lighthouse. The owner was unable to be located and it was thought that they may have fallen and injured themselves.

Whitehaven Coastguard Rescue Team asked if St Bees RNLI would carry out a search along the coastline. After an extensive search nothing was found, the volunteers returned to the station at 3.00 p.m. The lifeboat was then refuelled ready for the Tuesday evening training exercise at 6.00 p.m.

The owner was later found safe and well and pleased to be reunited with their rucksack.

Dick Beddows, St Bees RNLI Operations Manager comments: "The member of the public did exactly the right thing by dialling 999 and asking for the Coastguard. We would like to take this opportunity to remind people of the benefit in labelling equipment such as rucksacks, kayaks, paddleboards and inflatables with your name and phone number".

building and everyone was given an amazing meal on the Saturday night-even apple crumble. The group were taught how to chant and sang the music for a full Choral Evensong before heading




home. One member has already signed up for the week long summer camp! We plan to try and take a bigger group next year, so do ask about it.
