

Looking back through old St Bees letters I found this one from five years ago...it made me smile and it's as relevant now as it was then.

Lent is traditionally a time to give something up or start something new. For the next six weeks many of us will be abstaining from chocolate or practising a new healthy habit. This year I'm going to try mindfulness, the art of paying attention to the present moment, and here's why.

Imagine the scene, it's Sunday afternoon and I'm about to go to St Michaels, Arlecdon, to take their Family Service. I discover that I need to buy ingredients for Josh's cookery lesson but it's OK I've got time, I'll stop off at the petrol station on the way, I need fuel anyway. With my eye on the clock I drive to Egremont, fill up the car with diesel, rush into the shop, then discover they don't have the ingredients I need. But all is well, the Co -op provides and I make it to Arlecdon with minutes to spare.

The next day I receive a call from the Diocesen Office. "Did I happen to go a petrol station yesterday?" asks my curious colleague. "It's just that a woman, wearing a dog collar, was caught on CCTV driving off without paying for fuel. We guessed it must be you".

It turns out that if you shop for cookery ingredients, do your job and try to buy fuel at the same time you risk not paying attention. Fortunately, the diocese and the petrol station saw the funny side, I was forgiven and "Vicar Steals Diesel" didn't appear as a headline in the Whitehaven News.

We are all absent minded from time to time, especially when he have a lot going on, ever gone upstairs and forgotten why you're there? Sometimes this is simple sign of old age*. Other times it's because we're attempting to do too many things at once and it's time to stop. So this Lent I will be stopping and paying attention, practising the art of mindfulness. And when I think about it, it's a highly appropriate habit to take up during these weeks, as Jesus is probably the most mindful person I've ever encountered. He spent 40 days in a desert being attentive to his circumstances, facing his demons, preparing his mind and body for what lay ahead. From that day on he was completely present for every person he met and situation he endured...pretty impressive.

My aims in life are not quite as lofty as those of Jesus or even the saints that followed him, right now I just want to get through life without getting sacked or arrested as a result of my absent mindedness. But as the weeks go by maybe you and I will engage in a Lenten practise that takes us to a higher state of being and makes us more present for friends and family. Or maybe we'll just remember what we went upstairs for. Either way, it's worth a try.

Parish Council News

Parking on Sea Mill Lane – there have been problems in recent weeks with bin lorries not being able to reach properties at the bottom of Sea Mill Lane because of parked vehicles. We would ask drivers to ensure that vehicles do not obstruct large vehicles, particularly on bin collection days.

Anti Social Behaviour – there have been incidents of graffiti at the main beach area and also at the station. If anyone witnesses any incidents or notices any graffiti or damage, please report it to the police as soon as possible. The police need to be aware of incidents, however minor, to build up a picture of the situation.

Parking near the Village School – there are continuing problems with vehicles being parked on double yellow lines around the Main Street/Seacroft Drive junction, particularly at the beginning and end of the school day. This poses a danger to pedestrians, including children going to/coming from school. Cumberland Council's Enforcement Team and the local PCSO have been asked to visit more regularly.

Footpaths- Cumberland Council's contractors have done some work to improve the coastal footpath at Sea Mill which has often been flooded. A temporary closure order has been made to allow improvement work to take place on the footpath from Scalebarrow to Rottington. We understand that some clearance work will take place on the coastal path between St Bees and Coulderton.

Coast to Coast Passport Project – a not- for-profit group based in Richmond, North Yorkshire, has set up a project to create a Coast to Coast passport which those undertaking the walk can buy and use to record their progress. Businesses and organisations along the route have agreed to take part, stamping passports as people arrive at the various locations. The organisation leading the project has support from local authorities along the route and is contacting businesses in our area to explain the project and enlist their support in publicising the passport, acting as a stamping station etc. If anyone is interested and would like more information, please contact the Clerk who can provide contact details for the organisers of the project.

Outrigg Play Area- The Parish Council is in discussion with Cumberland Council to secure a lease on the land on which the play equipment stands. The lack of a formal lease is preventing the Parish Council from applying for grant funding to renovate the area. Until the lease is finalised, the Parish Council will continue to repair the old equipment to keep the area in use.

Dog fouling & waste bags – Please help us to keep the village free of dog fouling. Remember to clean up after your dog and ensure that dog waste bags are disposed of in a bin and not left on verges or hedges. Any litter bin can be used for these bags.

Litter bin – The new wall mounted litter bin has been installed on the Post Office wall after the old bin was damaged by a vehicle.

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A Letter from Michelle Proctor

I have just returned from a two day trip to Solwezi, 112 miles away from Mukinge. The road is deteriorating and what used to take two hours now takes three and a half! Some of the road has been fixed but as fast as they fix it other parts get worse. In some places it's easier to drive on the dirt beside the road; some you just have stop and decide which pothole looks like it will cause least damage to your car.

There is not a lot between Mukinge and Solwezi, but the countryside is beautiful and there is an array of things you can buy from the roadside including mangos, watermelons, tomatoes, charcoal by the sack full, blackmarket petrol and raw honey in 2.5 litre containers. You always pass a lorry or two that has broken down, the drivers camp next to their vehicle while waiting for someone to come and fix it or a spare part to arrive, often they are there for days.

Solwezi itself is a busy, rapidly expanding mining town close to the border with the Democratic Republic of Congo. It is the provincial and administrative capital of North Western Province and the nearest place to us with a supermarket. The main street is chaotic with lots of vehicles including mining trucks, busses, cars, motorbikes, men pushing wheelbarrows and the occasional goat. Side roads are mostly dirt with water filled holes. My reason for going was to renew my car insurance, pay road tax for next year, and get my car's annual "fitness test". I spent a lot of the time in queues in offices, shops and to get money out of the ATM, experience has taught me to carry a book to read for those extra-long queues. As I shopped for food to last until I next go to a supermarket (February) the supermarket was full of people with full trolleys and I was struck by the huge gap between the haves and the have nots here in Zambia.

The recent drought has meant that many do not have enough to eat this year and because they had no maize to sell last season, they can't afford fertilizer to grow this year's maize. The malnutrition side of the children's ward is full to overflowing and we have had several children die from malnutrition recently. It is always hard to see a child die from something that is preventable and to have that sense of helplessness at not being able to prevent it or change the outcome. However, I have to remind myself that for every child that dies many more go home. One such child was admitted with severe malnutrition and anaemia needing three blood transfusions during his stay. There were several evenings when I went home not expecting to see him in the morning but with lots of care he recovered and went home. The good news is that this season's rains have started, and people have planted their crops which are growing. We pray that the rains will continue, and next year's harvest will be a good one.

Looking ahead, next year it is time for my Home Assignment again. I plan to be in the UK from April to September and am looking forward to seeing many of you and visiting supporting churches. Let me know if you want to get together.

Years 5 and 6 had a hair-raising experience at the St Bees School Science Fair. They participated in a range of scientific activities including static electricity and combining acid, metal and a flame to make loud popping noises. Thank you to St Bees School!

Another of the performance highlights was the traditional Chinese dance performance by senior students Charlotte, Amisha, and Amelia. The girls wore traditional costumes and their movements were graceful and beautiful, showcasing the elegance and cultural richness of Chinese dance.

Miss Chen and our Chinese students played a vital role in the celebration, leading various activity stations that allowed everyone to explore Chinese culture. One station offered a hands-on experience in creating blue and white ceramic plate designs. Another popular station was the paper lantern-making. Additionally, there was a paper-cutting station where students learned the art of creating intricate designs with paper. We had a spring roll-tasting station, where many students tried a spring roll. However, the real fun came with the chopstick challenge. This game tested participants' ability to use chopsticks to pick up small sweets and treats, and it quickly became a favourite.

Acting Head Mr Gribble was enthusiastic in teaching everyone how to say Happy New Year in Chinese with a giant explosion of confetti from various cannons! The phrase, Xīnnián kuàilè (新年快乐), was repeated throughout the day including when Year 10 student Lucy led everyone in a celebratory dance, getting everyone on their feet

and in high spirits. It was a joyous moment that united everyone in the celebration. At lunchtime, the school catering team, led by Julie, served a delicious Chinese spread in the dining room. Students and teachers enjoyed dishes like fried rice, noodles, crispy sweet and sour chicken, and beef in black bean sauce, providing a true taste of China.

In the evening, the celebration culminated with the third and final performances of the day. This time, the shows were for St Bees School students, their parents, and the local community. It was an opportunity to showcase the hard work of our students and bring together the school with the wider community. In addition to the performances, there was an added stall run by the Enterprise students, Lucy and Aosong. They cooked and sold traditional Tanghulu, a popular Chinese street food consisting of fruit dipped in

Sleeping Child Garden

The Garden was created in 2006 as a memorial to children lost in infancy and was the idea of the late Josefina de Vasconcellos, the noted Lakeland sculptor. In its early years, maintenance was carried out by a range of volunteers, but since Covid lockdowns, and other reasons, this has become difficult. As a result, particularly of lockdowns and unhelpful weather, it had become very overgrown and drastic treatment became necessary.

Due to this work, and the time of the year, it currently does not look very attractive but planned work and new plantings during March/April, as well as anticipated new (and controlled) growth will restore the Garden further.

We are grateful to a generous donation of £2,000 from the Friends of the Priory which has funded a new fence and will fund new plants to fill the gaps. The Priory funded other necessary work. The erection of the new fence by volunteers, mainly from the Holy Mowers rather than professionals has helped the finance. We must also express our thanks to John Alderson formerly of Lamberlea Garden Centre, for his generous help.

Looking to the future, we feel that we should try and employ a professional gardener * to carry out routine care during the growing season, and to undertake necessary pruning at the right time of the year. In the past we have relied on voluntary work, but for a number of well appreciated reasons, it is difficult for them to provide the regular care needed. We anticipate the cost of professional care will be about £1,000 a year. Donations towards this cost will always be greatly appreciated. There is a memorial book in the Lady Chapel alongside a collecting box. Donations can also be made directly to the Priory, earmarked for the Sleeping Child Garden.

* While it is our intention to employ a professional gardener, actually finding one is proving difficult. If you have any ideas in this respect please let us have your suggestions!

- To enable more connections with under-represented groups in our churches, and to plant new churches and worshipping communities.




