A later letter tells of dismissing a student who had absconded. The student's purpose made it worse, for he was heading for Gretna Green with his landlady's run-away daughter.

This page cannot do justice to RP's literary works. His published sermons amounted to hundreds; there was a quantity of verse ,and an aclaimed four-volume 'Life' based on a nearby, saintly clergyman. From RP's diaries we learn of much that was important to him – as, the start of the Penny Post, and his friend Wordsworth's death; and his planning with Lord Lonsdale for what was to become our Coach Road.

To finish, here is RP enjoying himself. "Up at half past 7 and off on horseback at half past 8 to join a party ascending Scawfell the view of mountains all tumbling in confusion was indescribably grand. A rough descent through Mickledore ... found that a basket of provisions we had laid in a hedge had been stolen .."



Canon Parkinson again

Last month's history page had our Vicar and College Principal, the Revd. Richard Parkinson (RP *in this article*), packed off to London for the 1851 Great Exhibition. It would be good to know what he thought of it, but nothing he said on the subject has come down through the years to us.

What has survived, however, is a cache of over a hundred letters between RP and his friends. Though many are very personal, it is not always clear for what purpose they were saved. But having stayed untouched and forgotten until a fortuitous attic-clearance a few years ago, they now they give us something of a glimpse of RP's life in mid-Victorian St. Bees.

From his early days here, RP seems to have had trouble with Church officials. His Churchwardens he soon found "rude and insolent". One dispute was over the number of cows allowed to graze the graveyard. RP wanted none at all, saying that if only one were permitted, some farmers (Foxes?) would soon have more cows grazing there than there were gravestones. How the matter ended is not clear.

On another occasion RP was to have his Clerk's help with an important funeral. He and the Clerk were to be at the Church gate at 4p.m. to meet the coffin. The Clerk was there in good time, but when the coffin arrived it had to be carried past him, because by then he was drunk and fast asleep, against a memorial stone.

From the pulpit, drunkenness was one of RP's favourite themes. He preached too about Sabbath Observance, and especially against farm work on Sundays. But he realised his words were wasted, for his verdict more than once was "listened to, but not acted on".

The Parkinsons lived here in comfortable style,. There were five live-in servants at the Vicarage. Of them we read "my wife has hired her own maid, for 11 guineas, and a housemaid for 6 guineas, finding her own tea and sugar". And then a year later "hired new manservant at 16 guineas with livery, or 11 without". On occasion RP acted generously, giving "a fat cow" to the village poor at at least one Christmas, and for his fiftieth birthday throwing a party for local children, with tea, cake and magic lantern. But a note from this period reminds us of the general situation "...walked to town today, the mob parading the streets asking for bread".

Despite RP's affluence, we find him sometimes complaining of the ills of the age. Some might be familiar to us, as when builders took twice as long as they had promised to do a job at the Vicarage, and then expected to charge twice as much. And there were the Law's delays: when JP became engaged to Catherine Hartley of Gillfoot, the couple planned to set up home in 'Khandella' in High House Road. But the formalities dragged on and on, thanks in RP's opinion, to the dilatory ways of one Wilkinson, solicitor.

Of course in addition to his duties as Vicar, RP was much occupied with the growing Theological College. At the beginning he found it "going on swimmingly", and in his time as Principal some four hundred students trained for the Church. But not all who sought a College place were accepted: RP writes of "refusing one young Glostershire Continued P16.
