War and Remembrance

October for some provoked thoughts of Harvest and abundance and so for many November ushers in reflections of remembrance, whether that be in the moving Feast of All Saints and All Souls, or the Nation's day of Remembrance on and after the 11th of November.

The impact of mortality affects us all, the Village Church Yard speaks of the mortality we all share and the two Village War Memorials of the cost of conflict in two World Wars and subsequent. Wars that have usually disproportionally taken the life of the young and innocent. Other things impact on us much more haphazardly, potholes if you are a cyclist, no buses if you are a visitor and you think the bus stops are a sign of a service, Outrigg flooding if you drive a small car, bicycle, or motorbike or if you are a visitor and you don't see the flood in time. So in some ways we can, as local residents avoid some of the impacts and imperfections of this world. So many of us must have been shocked and stunned by the news coverage of the latest War to impact us via the TV and Radio. Ukraine is forgotten and the Holy Land is now the new story of violence with which to attract both the local and the national populations to watch yet another unfolding horror.

Our own Archdeacon the Venerable Stewart Fyfe recently managed to escape from that conflict and is thankfully home with his family and has written a brilliant personal reflection on his experience of war, violence, and suffering. The things many Remember in St Bees in November he experienced personally under fire in Israel in October. Copies of his reflection are available on his Facebook page and from the back of the Priory. Christian Aid has produced some excellent material to enable outsiders to the Holy Land conflict to begin to understand some of the issues.

Remembrance Sunday was often criticised as a glorification of War. It was not felt as such by myself, having spent some 30 years as an RAF Chaplain or anyone who had been in a war. They did not glory in it rather they remembered with pride the service of those who did not return, asking themselves how they themselves survived and trying not to let the act of remembrance overwhelm them with such a sense of survivor's guilt that their own wellbeing was endangered. The Christian Eucharist – the Act of Remembrance isn't an act of glorified nostalgia of what did happen, rather it makes it all really present again – and as such gives everyone a choice about how we behave and act in response to such events as individuals or a nation.

So as we Remember conflicts of the past in our Village Memorials perhaps, we are reminded as community by the violence on out screens of why the Peace Makers are indeed Blessed. Stewart Fyfe sums up the Holy Land violence and Nurse Edith Cavell reminds us of hope for the future. Her words before being shot by firing squad (1915), "Patriotism is not enough. I must have no hatred or bitterness to anyone."

Parish Council News

Donations to local groups – The Parish Council sets aside a small pot of money each year to enable it to give donations to local groups. Requests should be received by 12 November to enable grants to be approved at the next Parish Council meeting.

Remembrance Sunday – There will be the usual parade and wreath laying ceremony on Sunday 12 November to mark Remembrance Sunday. The wreaths from the local organisations will be on display in the window of 22 Main Street in the days leading up to Remembrance Sunday. The parade on the Sunday morning will set off from Station car park and process to both war memorials before disbanding so those who wish can attend the service in the Priory.

Santa Parade- the Parish Council is hoping to organise a Santa Parade again this year with Santa's sleigh visiting as many areas of the village as possible before Santa switches on the lights on the Christmas tree on Cross Hill. Watch out for more details of dates/ times on Facebook and on the parish noticeboards.

Flooding- there continue to be problems with flooding on the Outrigg to Egremont Road and this is causing considerable inconvenience for residents. Cumberland Council tell us that they are working to find a long term solution to the problem but the Parish Council is pressing for some temporary solution to be found to keep the road open with better signage to warn drivers of the flooding.

Station car park- the Parish Council is continuing to work with Network Rail and Cumberland Council to progress plans to extend the station car park. A survey is currently being undertaken of the use of the car park to gather evidence of the need for more offstreet parking.

Electric scooters – there have been reports of electric scooters being ridden on public footpaths. Motorised vehicles such as scooters are not allowed on public footpaths, although mobility scooters are permitted.

Congratulations - to the Friends of Priory Paddock who have received an RHS 'It's Your Neighbourhood' award for their work in maintaining the Paddock as a wildlife area. Well deserved recognition of their hard work!

Next Parish Council Meeting – The next Parish Council meeting will be on Monday 20 November at 6.30pm in the Village Hall. Council meetings are open to the public and all are welcome to attend. Why not come along and see the PC in action? We still have vacancies for three parish councillors!

respected – especially so as his own son had died on that dreadful first day of the Somme battle. What Mr. Kenworthy wanted was a much more striking design, and a position for it overlooking the railway, which he reasoned had provided for many who would fall, their last glimpse of village and home.

So while the 'official' plan went ahead, so too did Mr. Kenworthy. His St. George would command the view near the railway, as he had wanted, the whole expense being his. Before long our quarry-master Tom McKay (only just released himself from Army service) would select a suitable block of St. Bees red sandstone from his Fleswick quarry, and it would be on its way to Liverpool for sculpting. Meanwhile the McKays dressed suitable stone for the platform which Saint and Dragon would share.

Is there anything significant about Mr. Kenworthy's choice of message for his monument? It bears the words ''To Awaken Remembrance''. With so much else in the village to keep memories fresh, he can hardly have thought the Dead at risk of being forgotten. Or as some wondered: was he perhaps implying the other memorial inadequate?

In the History Corner in the Priory there is a more detailed account of these matters, researched by Chris Robson several several years ago.

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Remembering

A lovely Spring afternoon one hundred and two years ago saw the Dedication of our first War Memorial.

Villagers assembled at the Priory were enjoined to see that the Memorial 'be kept and cherished by the generations yet unborn'. In this I think we might claim to have succeeded. And still around Armistice Day, somewhere within the village, there is silence as the twenty-six engraved names are solemnly proclaimed.

Visitors to our village are sometimes puzzled that our war Dead have two Memorials: the 'official' one at the Priory lychgate, shown on this month's front cover, and St. George and the Dragon near the Station. Indeed there are more than these two, if the brasses in the Priory are included, and the stone tablet now beside what used to be the Memorial Window. Until the thirties this tablet stood in the window upon a silken Union Flag, with flowers provided by the families of the Lost. When I look at the tablet now, I cannot help feeling for William McNeal (our Verger, stone mason and occasional chimney-sweep) whose task it was to engrave the names of so many he would have known. And in time there would have been that of his own youngest son, William Scott, McNeal, killed in the War's final month.

is a list of all from Sandwith Council School who went to the War, and it tells what became of each of them. For many years it had a place of honour in the school,

The Priory preserves another reminder of those times. It and to Sandwith's credit it found a way into safe hands when the school finally closed.

In St. Bees a village Memorial was proposed soon after the Armistice. As earlier issues of this magazine have outlined, there was a lack of common ground over both its design and its siting. The design for the 'official' monument came from Mr. W.G. Collinswood of the Lakes Artists' Society, whose idea it was to echo the style of the ancient crossshaft which had stood in the Western part of the graveyard since near-Viking times. Some thought such a design unimpressive, and the site there lacking in prominence. When the families of the Dead were asked to choose between this and today's roadside site, the latter was preferred by a margin of just one. (I am not sure how many realised then that a new lychgate would shortly come and dominate the spot).

Alternative ideas came from our resident 'gentleman-artist', (his term) John Dalzell Kenworthy. As eminent in Arts circles as Mr. Collinswood, his opinion would be Continued on page 20.

Extract from letter from Michelle Proctor

The Nurses Training College is a big part of our hospital with over 600 students enrolled. As part of their education, they have a weekly Bible Study. Most of our students will be posted to other hospital when they graduate and our hope is that they go not just as excellent nurses but as believing nurses who will make a difference where ever they are posted

Patients come to us not only from the surrounding area but from other places across Zambia. Often, they come in need of treatment that they cannot afford to access where they are from. Although we do have some minimal charges here, we never turn anyone away due to lack of funds. Everyone no matter their means or station in life is able to access the same care at Mukinge.

Recently I have been spending more of my time in the hospital caring for the premature babies in our NICU (Neonatal Intensive Care Unit). It has been a welcome break and change of pace from the busy days, and often nights, doing anaesthesia. I love caring for these little ones and getting to know their mums. Some are newborn babies that were delivered on time but need some extra help from birth or soon after. Most of them



however are premature babies needing support to survive. They vary from being just a few weeks early and weighing around 1.5 kg to being 12 weeks early and weighing 800g. These very premature babies are fragile and without specialised care, such as ventilation, high tech monitoring and drugs to help the lungs mature, their chances of survival are poor. However, time and time again I am amazed by their will to live and how much can be done with what we have (keeping them warm, tube feeds, basic respiratory support, and antibiotics to fight any infections they get). It is a difficult time for them and walking through it with these mums is an opportunity for us to show the love and care of our God.

Innovation in Independent Education at St Bees School

The Northern nations, along with Japan have done most to cause climate change but the impact is most heavily borne by the likes of Tonga, Fiji, Samoa and Namibia. This is not only rising temperatures and rising sea levels causing whole communities to have to move but the economic impact is massive causing at least a 5% reduction in GDP. A punishment for a crime they did not commit.

Australia is one of the biggest per capita emitters and UK is 8th, with France not far behind. Namibia might feel aggrieved at the 96-0 scoreboard against France but perhaps more aggrieved that the tournament was supported by Total Energies who are contributing to the slow destruction of their country's opportunities.

I am sure Samoa and Fiji will have been buoyed by their wins against Chile and Australia but they have to return home to rising sea levels that ot only mean their families have often had to move but the salt water is contaminating water supplies and ruining agriculture. The fish are disappearing in the warmer seas. 70% of the Samoan population live in low lying areas. They have seen some of their neighbouring islands disappear completely.

Then there is the damage from the tropical storms. These have cost Fij 5% of its GDP (The same % as the UK's total spend on education). According to a World Bank study, the damage from storms and floods in Fiji, is expected to increase by much more than 50% if emissions do not fall rapidly.

You can make a difference! The UN suggests the following:

- 1: Spread the word that Climate change matters, by delaying our response we are causing harm and death now
- 2: Transform your transport
- 3: Rein in your own power use
- 4: Shop local and buy sustainable as much as possible
- 5: Try not to waste food: I have a great recipe for over ripe bananas, if you want it!
- 6: Dress (climate) smart: Fast fashion accounts for 8-10 per cent of global carbon emissions more than all international flights and maritime shipping combined.
- 7: Check what your investments are supporting, your security might be harming others Then we can back to A world in Union. Come on England/Ireland/Wales! (sorry Scotland you had a tough group!)


