

### St Bees News

### November 2024

My favourite window in St Bees Priory is in the vestry, sadly rather hidden from public view. It depicts our patron saint, Bega, standing in a small boat, arms outstretched in blessing as she sails onto St Bees beach. There is a photo of the window on the Priory website and facebook page, if you are eight foot tall you can see it in person but if you're shorter please do get in touch for a closer look.

Another of my favourite windows is at the east end of St Mary and St Michaels, Egremont. It was given in 1992 by Robert Wilson, a long-standing member of the congregation, in memory of his mother and as a tribute to women in ministry. The design, "Blessing the Earth" by the renowned artist Christine Boyce, features a haloed Christ with his arms raised in blessing. Below are various images of women, reaching outward and upward from the centre of the rose.

It is a wonderful thing to be reminded at both churches of the validity of women's ministry. 2024 marks thirty years since the CofE began ordaining women to the priesthood. On the 24th November at 6pm we will be hosting a very special service celebrating this anniversary at the Priory. All are welcome to come along to the service and stay for refreshments afterwards. It is important to acknowledge that there is much more work to do if all women are to be truly free to serve God and flourish as human beings. There are many who are not in favour of women's ordination, both locally and abroad; differences of opinion over this and other matters, continue to lead to tension in the CofE.

These difficulties pale into comparison when laid alongside the challenges that women still face in places where oppression of women is the norm. "16 Days of Action Against Gender Based Violence" is an international campaign from Nov 25th (the United Nations Day for the Elimination of Violence Against Women) to Dec 10th (Human Rights Day) and encourages action and awareness against all forms of violence against women and girls. In honour of St Bega and in support of this campaign, we will be holding a candlelit vigil in the Priory on St Bega's Day, Thurs 7th Nov at 7pm. All are ages and genders are welcome to attend. In November we remember and give thanks for our servicemen and women and pray for peace. Our world continues to suffer due to war, and women are particularly vulnerable, "It has probably become more dangerous to be a woman than a soldier in an armed conflict." (Major General Patrick Cammaert, former UN Peacekeeping Commander) This is a sobering thought.

Bega and the women in the Egremont window, Catherine Booth, co-founder of the Salvation Army, Mother Theresa of Calcutta and Florence Nightingale, were women of and for their time. They weren't perfect but they did use their voice to challenge injustice. Let's do the same.

### Parish Council News

**Beach Toilets** – In 2013 the Parish Council took over the management of the beach toilets after Copeland Borough Council decided to close them for financial reasons. It proved difficult to find a company prepared to undertake the cleaning and routine maintenance and Tom Milburn came to the rescue, providing a 7 day a week service to clean and maintain the toilets for almost 12 years. Tom has now decided that the time has come to reduce his commitments and the Parish Council is looking at alternative arrangements to look after the toilets from January 2025. The Parish Council would like to take this opportunity to put on record its thanks to Tom for all his work – not only the cleaning, opening & closing of the building every day but also the many minor repairs carried out behind the scenes.

Remembrance Sunday- there will be the usual parade and wreath-laying ceremony on Remembrance Sunday (10 November) with the wreaths being on display in the window of 22 Main Street in the days leading up to Remembrance Sunday. The parade will assemble at 10.20am at the entrance to Station car park with the parade starting at 10.30am. Wreaths will be laid at the war memorial at the Station Rd junction and also at the memorial in the churchyard. The ceremony will finish in sufficient time for those who wish to continue to the Priory for the service.

**Donations to local groups** – the Parish Council has a small budget to make donations to local groups. The donations will be agreed at the November Parish Council meeting. If your group wishes to apply for funds for a project/event or to purchase equipment, the deadline is approaching. All that is needed is a short email/letter explaining your request addressed to the Clerk (pc\_clerk@stbees.org.uk) by 5 November.

**Rewilding of Beach Rd Verge** – the verge has now been sown with yellow rattle and several different varieties of wild flowers have been planted along the verge to replace the original plants which were damaged when fibre optic cables were laid. Thank you to the community volunteers and the pupils from St Bees School who helped with the planting and to Viberoptix who provided the funding and assisted with the planting.

Christmas is coming- the Parish Council is once again planning to provide a large Christmas tree for the village and an 18 foot Norway Spruce has been ordered. It is also hoped to organise the now traditional Santa Parade – more details will be available via the Parish Council's Facebook page and village noticeboards.

**Next meeting.** The next meeting will be on Monday 18 November at 6.30pm in the Village Hall. The Parish Council is always keen to hear the views of residents and there is a slot on every agenda for members of the public to raise items which they would like the Parish Council to consider.

So while the 'official' plan went ahead, so too did Mr. Kenworthy. His St. George would command the view near the railway, as he had wanted, the whole expense being his. Before long our quarry-master Tom McKay (only just released himself from Army service) would select a suitable block of St. Bees red sandstone from his Fleswick quarry, and it would be on its way to Liverpool for sculpting. Meanwhile the McKays dressed suitable stone for the platform which Saint and Dragon would share.

Is there anything significant about Mr. Kenworthy's choice of message for his monument? It bears the words ''To Awaken Remembrance''. With so much else in the village to keep memories fresh, he can hardly have thought the Dead at risk of being forgotten. Or as some wondered: was he perhaps implying the other memorial inadequate?

In the History Corner in the Priory there is a more detailed account of these matters, researched by Chris Robson several several years ago.

### St Bees Priory Christmas Tree Festival - December 2024

### Priory Paddock wins top RHS and Cumbria in Bloom prizes

The county horticultural society "Cumbria in Bloom" holds the annual assessment of local parks, gardens and other similar spaces, as part of the national scheme run by the Royal Horticultural Society (RHS). This year the Friends of Priory Paddock entered the "It's Your Neighbourhood" category and were awarded an "Outstanding" rating for their efforts, which is the top rating for the RHS.

Priory Paddock itself was entered in the "Woodland Copse" category and this year received the RHS "Gold" award for sites of this type. Priory Paddock was also awarded the prize for the best entry in the "Woodland Copse" category in Cumbria. As well as the certificates the trophy is a fine silver plate, displayed in the window of 22 Main Street.

To visit Priory Paddock walk along Dandy Walk below the church (between the playing field and the Glebe Field). The entrance is through the gate on the right. Take your mobile phone and scan the QR code on the gate to get an audiovisual commentary on the plants you'll see. It's updated regularly so it will tell you what you're looking at as you walk around.

### Remembering

(Reprinted from the late Bob Jopling's article in the November 2023 St Bees News)

A lovely Spring afternoon one hundred and two years ago saw the Dedication of our first War Memorial.

Villagers assembled at the Priory were enjoined to see that the Memorial 'be kept and cherished by the generations yet unborn'. In this I think we might claim to have succeeded. And still around Armistice Day, somewhere within the village, there is silence as the twenty-six engraved names are solemnly proclaimed.

Visitors to our village are sometimes puzzled that our war Dead have two Memorials: the 'official' one at the Priory lychgate, shown on this month's front cover, and St. George and the Dragon near the Station. Indeed there are more than these two, if the brasses in the

Priory are included, and the stone tablet now beside what used to be the Memorial Window. Until the

thirties this tablet stood in the window upon a silken Union Flag, with flowers provided by the families of the Lost. When I look at the tablet now, I cannot help feeling for William McNeal (our Verger, stone mason and occasional chimney-sweep) whose task it was to engrave the names of so many he would have known. And in time there would have been that of his own youngest son, William Scott, McNeal, killed in the War's final month.

The Priory preserves another reminder of those times. It is a list of all from Sandwith Council School who went to the War, and it tells what became of each of them. For many years it had a place of honour in the school, and to Sandwith's credit it found a way into safe hands when the school finally closed.

In St. Bees a village Memorial was proposed soon after the Armistice. As earlier issues of this magazine have outlined, there was a lack of common ground over both its design and its siting. The design for the 'official' monument came from Mr. W.G. Collingwood of the Lakes Artists' Society, whose idea it was to echo the style of the ancient cross-shaft which had stood in the Western part of the graveyard since near-Viking times. Some thought such a design unimpressive, and the site there lacking in prominence. When the families of the Dead were asked to choose between this and today's roadside site, the latter was preferred by a margin of just one. (I am not sure how many realised then that a new lychgate would shortly come and dominate the spot).

Alternative ideas came from our resident 'gentleman-artist', (his term) John Dalzell Kenworthy. As eminent in Arts circles as Mr. Collingwood, his opinion would be respected – especially so as his own son had died on that dreadful first day of the Somme battle. What Mr. Kenworthy wanted was a much more striking design, and a position for it overlooking the railway, which he reasoned had provided for many who would fall, their last glimpse of village and home. ### St Bees School News

#### A Lost Book Finds Its Way Home to St Bees School, Over a Century Later

St Bees School has recently been reunited with a significant piece of its history—a book entitled "Poetry of Byron" that belonged to one of its former students, Leonard Ewbank, who tragically lost his life during World War I. The book's journey back to the school has unearthed the story of Ewbank, a young man who made the ultimate sacrifice for his country.

The discovery was made in Carmarthenshire by a gentleman visiting his parents. While looking through their collection, he came across the book with an inscription that read "Leonard Ewbank, School House, St Bees, 25/9/11." Intrigued, he traced its origins and learned of Leonard's connection to St Bees School, where he studied before attending Queen's College, Oxford.

The book was formally returned to St Bees School where Headmaster Mr Andrew Keep expressed his gratitude, highlighting how Leonard Ewbank's story continues to inspire current students. He praised the return of the book as a tangible link to the school's past and a tribute to the character of a former student whose life was marked by courage and integrity.

Leonard Ewbank's journey was one of determination. Despite poor eyesight, he was commissioned into the 15th Border Regiment during the Great War but sadly lost his life in 1916 in Ypres. His name is commemorated at St Bees School on the Roll of Honour, remembered as "an Englishman, brave, honest and loyal."

The return of this century-old book is a touching reminder of the enduring bond between St Bees School, its students and their families. It brings Leonard Ewbank's story to life once more, preserving his legacy not just in history but in the physical form of this cherished volume that has finally come home.



### The Priory







World War I ended on the eleventh hour of the eleventh day of the eleventh month, in 1918. The first day of remembrance took place one year later, on November 11, 1919. It was called Armistice Day (an armistice is a peace agreement). After World War II it was renamed Remembrance Day to include everyone who had died in both world wars. Today, people remember those who died in all wars.

The Cenotaph in London is a stone monument that is the focus of the nation's Remembrance Day events. Its name means "empty tomb." It was built to commemorate the ending of World War I. It was unveiled in 1920. A simple inscription on the stone reads "The Glorious Dead." Many other cities, towns, and even villages now have cenotaphs to commemorate the local people who died in wars.


On November 7, 1919, King George V announced that a two-minute silence should be observed, "so that, in perfect stillness, the thoughts of everyone may be concentrated on reverent remembrance of the glorious dead." The two-minute silence is observed by the nation every year at 11 am on Remembrance Day.

Poppies are delicate red flowers with tissue-like petals that grow wild in fields and hedgerows. In 1915 a Canadian doctor named John McCrae wrote a poem called "In Flanders Fields," about the poppies that grew in battlefields where men had died. Today poppies have become a symbol for the loss of life and suffering during war. Paper poppies are made by disabled ex-servicemen and servicewomen. They are sold in the lead-up to Remembrance Day to raise money to help British people who served their nation.

People in Australia, Canada, France, and the United States also honour veterans on a day in November. Canada and Australia also call the day Remembrance Day. It is Armistice Day in France and Veterans Day in the United States.


### **Follow Daily**
