

This year we decided to grow pumpkins in the Vicarage Community Walled Garden. I've been excited to see how they've progressed throughout September, shoots curling their way out of the confines of their beds across the grass, rapidly expanding squashes, carefully protected from the mud earth on sheets of slate, slowing turning orange. At the end of October we plan to harvest our cultivated treasures and leave them on the produce stall, waiting for families to give them a new home, transformed into lanterns, or even a pie! If I were fruit or veg I think I'd rather like to be a pumpkin, enjoying the quiet garden in the autumn sun, then at the end of my days, a symbol of light in the darkness and a joy to children with a wide toothy grin to ward off scary spirits!

When I welcome visitors to the Priory I often take them on a tour of the Walled Garden. I am proud of what our little team of gardeners has achieved in the last seven years. I love the moment when I open the gate to the hidden space within and my guests gasp at the site of health and life before them. It's beautiful in the autumn sunshine, strawberry plants spill out of their raised beds and the last of the sweet peas fill the air with their heady scent. Every year the garden transforms a little more, through hard work yes, but also somehow by itself, from it's old bramble forest to a walled box of delights! I can't help feeling that as we cultivate and feed the garden to health it heals itself, attracting pollinators and positivity.

I wonder if the Church is similar? When do local church congregations experience long term health and growth? Is it when they run large campaigns to encourage people back to church or when churches are healthy to start with? In the natural world, health leads to growth. Maybe church families are a bit like gardens? Ven Morris Rodham, an advisor for the Church of England, put this point across really convincingly in his work on "Healthy Growing Churches".

Morris identifies eight essential qualities for healthy growing churches and the first two are empowering leadership and gift-oriented Ministry. When these two qualities are present communities thrive because everyone contributes in a way that fits for them. We might call this our "S.H.A.P.E"...Spiritual Gifts, Heart's Desire, Abilities, Personality and Experience. In November several churches are grouping together to run the SHAPE course, an opportunity for each of us to reflect on God's call to serve him in all the various spheres of life – our workplace, our family, church, voluntary activities and leisure pursuits. Check out the centre pages of this magazine for more details.

At Harvest time we give thanks for all the delicious food on offer and we remember the people who grew our vegetables and raised livestock, milked cows and cared for the land. In church services we gather and turn our attention to God, creator, redeemer and sustainer, giving thanks and praise for the blessings we have received. Whether you feel you are a grinning pumpkin or a determined pineapple, may you know how special you are in God's walled garden this October.

Parish Council News

Donations to local groups – the Parish Council has a small budget to make donations to local groups. The donations will be agreed at the November Parish Council meeting. If your group wishes to apply for funds for a project/event or to purchase equipment, now is the time to let us know. All that is needed is a short email/letter explaining your request addressed to the Clerk (pc_clerk@stbees.org.uk) by 5 November.

Road Closures – this year has seen an exceptional number of road closures due to the ongoing work to install fibre optic cables as well as other utility and maintenance work. The Parish Council is aware of the inconvenience to residents and the frustration caused by confusing diversion signs and signs left behind after work is finished. The Parish Council is taking up with Highways the adequacy of diversion information on their website and is asking to be kept informed of road works outside our parish boundary which affect routes to Whitehaven, Egremont, Sellafield etc. If anyone is aware of signs left in place long after work is finished, please inform Highways via the hotline 0300 373 3736 or via the online reporting system on the Cumberland Council website. The Parish Council will continue to post information on our Facebook page and details of road works and road closures across the wider area can be found on the Cumberland Council website.

Rewilding of Beach Rd Verge – plug plants have been ordered to replant the verge with native wild flowers in the next few weeks after some of the original plants were damaged when fibre optic cables were laid. We are grateful for the support received from the Planting for Pollinators Project and Viberoptix.

Villages by the Sea- St Bees is to feature in an episode of Villages by the Sea with archaeologist Ben Robinson. Filming has just taken place around the village and the programme is expected to be shown on BBC2 in November.

Valley Link Cycle Track – the High Court has now quashed the planning approval for the proposed new mine. However, the Parish Council remains committed to the project to create a cycle route to link St Bees and Whitehaven and is continuing discussions with Cumberland Council and other partners to gain support for the project and identify a possible route.

Next meeting-. The next meeting will be on Monday 21 October at 6.30pm in the Village Hall. The Parish Council is always keen to hear the views of residents and there is a slot on every agenda for members of the public to raise items which they would like the Parish Council to consider.

St Bees RNLI Search for missing person

During our regular Tuesday night training exercise, whilst out at sea we were tasked by Belfast Coastguard to assist in the search for a missing person.

The crew joined a multi agency search of the St. Bees coast, carrying out extensive search patterns and liaising with police and coastguard teams.

The crew stood down after being informed that the person had been found safe and well. Remember, if you are in trouble or concerned about anything at sea, always dial 999 and ask for the Coastguard

RNLI Bicentenary Scroll Comes to St. Bees

The scroll, which began its journey at Westminster Abbey on the 4th March 2024, the RNLI's 200th birthday, is being passed through lifeboat stations, lifeguard units and fundraising branches around the UK and Ireland and being signed by representatives at each location on its route.

The scroll, which bears the RNLI One Crew Pledge, is held in a bespoke case made with the same materials used to build our lifeboats and the spindle was made using a flagpole from Ramsey lifeboat station that dates back to the early 1890's.

Representatives from all aspects of our station were selected to sign on behalf of the whole crew.. Signing the scroll, we had:

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Harry Nankivell - The Final Chapter

Sadly, Bob Jopling died before he was able to complete the final chapter of his minibiography of Harry Nankivell. The story is finished by Doug Sim based on Bob's research notes....

Bob's last chapter saw Harry setting off for a new life in Australia, where he arrived sometime in 1911-12. He found work as a clerk in Broken Hill, the mining boomtown in South Australia. There he met and married in 1912 another Nankivell – a distant relative, Eva Mary, whom he had probably met through a church choir. They soon moved to Adelaide and had two children; a daughter Daisy, and a son, Garnet.

From the outbreak of World War 1, Australia strongly supported the war effort. Harry felt his seven years British Army experience would be useful and enlisted in 1915. He became a sergeant instructor, first in Australia and then posted to a training base in England in 1917, which meant leaving his family behind. However, by January 1918 his battalion had suffered serious losses on the Somme, so he was sent to France to rejoin them. This meant exposure to all the horrors of trench warfare. His unit had a break from the trenches in March, but due to a big German offensive Harry was quickly back in the thick of the fighting. He remained unhurt, but all but one of his section was killed.

By now his old malaria, probably contracted in Africa, came back to plague him, so he was sent to convalesce on the coast. But in August he was back in the trenches for the Battle of Amiens, when all five Australian infantry divisions attacked together for the first time. This was a major turning point in the war, and the Germans were on the run until the armistice of 11th November. However, Harry was badly wounded by shellfire on 3rd September, and died the following day; only 10 weeks before the end of hostilities. Sadly, his wife's brother, who had been fighting in the same area, went to visit him a week later: only to be told he had been killed. He visited and tended Harry's grave at Daours, which is now in a Commonwealth War Graves cemetery.

In his last letter to his wife Eva, Harry had said;

"I am looking forward to the time when we can all go down to the beach again...take every possible care of your dear self and our darling chicks till I return..."

But the story does not end there. It was a 2008 posting on the St Bees forum by Peter Nankivell, Garnet's son and Harry's grandson, that sparked the correspondence between Bob and Peter. Peter decided to make a pilgrimage in 2011, with two cousins. They stayed with Bob and Thelma to see Harry's haunts in St Bees, and travelled to Daours in France to see Harry's grave. Sadly, tragedy struck. Shortly after visiting the grave Peter suffered a massive heart attack, and despite the best efforts of the French Air Ambulance, he died. Whether the emotion of finally paying his respects to his grandfather played a part is impossible to tell. His body was repatriated to Australia, amidst great shock in the Nankivell and Jopling families.

As you know on a Friday I work from home and what I do varies from week to week. Sometimes I find myself doing things that are more unusual and not what I saw myself doing when I came to Zambia as a children's nurse.

This was the case when a few Fridays back, when nearly everyone else was at work, I found myself with the keys to several houses accompanying the local vet to vaccinate all our pets against rabies. Neither the vet nor the vet assistant was keen to hold the animals so that was my job. Several cats who had been kept inside so they could be found easily were less than happy at being locked in and even less amused to be then held down and given an injection. One dog and seven cats later the mission was accomplished and amazingly I was scratch and bite free!

It was a fun morning but the importance of it was reinforced when a week later a little girl was admitted to the hospital. Having been bitten by a dog a few days before, she had been taken to the local rural health centre where she was given wound care and a tetanus injection and advised to come to Mukinge for the post exposure anti-rabies vaccine. Sadly, due to distance and transport difficulties her family chose not to come to the hospital, and she developed full blown rabies which is always fatal.

This is the second time in my career that I have helped care for a child with rabies and I can honestly say it is one of the hardest things I have had to do. Not only is it a horrible way to die: there is also the knowledge that it is totally preventable. Despite being preventable there are an estimated 59,000 deaths globally every year from rabies and 150 in Zambia.

I continue to work on the children's ward, which has been extra busy recently. There are 27 physical beds on the ward but for the last few weeks we have regularly had over 30 children and sometimes over 40. This means mattresses are pulled out of the linen cupboard and squeezed between beds. The increased number of patients is due to the ever-growing population here in Kasempa.

Frequent goodbyes are a part of life here, but some are harder than others and that will be the case with Jessica, as it was saying goodbye to my friends, Jeff and Rose Shaffers, last month. I have known the Shaffers since 1994 when they first came to Zambia, watched their children grow up and had many adventures together. Before they left, we had one last trip together with other friends, to Kafue National Park. Getting there should have taken 6 hours but turned into a 13 hour adventure. First there was the long wait while they replaced a gasket in the engine on the pontoon to cross the river Lunga. Zambia continues to be effected by the poor rains of last rainy season and resulting drought. As the next rainy season gets closer we are praying that it will be a good one with plenty of rain to fill up the rivers and dams. Daily power outages, water shortages and very dry and dusty roads are the norm for now.




