

September 2021

As I write this letter thousands of young people across the UK are receiving their GCSE results. By the time you read this sixteen-year-olds in St Bees parish and beyond will be starting a new phase in their lives and my prayers go with them. It's exactly thirty years since I was in their position, the class of '91 were some of the first teenagers to sit GCSEs. One of my enduring memories of that time is of the Biology exam. I remember being immensely frustrated that the paper was basically just a list of common-sense questions about "Being green". There were questions about CFCs, acid rain, recycling, and Polyethylene terephthalate (or PET for short). I may be mis-remembering but I'm pretty certain one of the questions was something like "In what ways do human beings contribute to climate change?"

Three decades later it is astounding to me that a report from the IPCC made the headlines with this quote from Prof Ed Hawkins, University of Reading, UK;

"It is a statement of fact, we cannot be any more certain; it is unequivocal and indisputable that humans are warming the planet." Duh?!

During my adult years I've tried to save the planet in many tiny ways. I've recycled, bought second hand, fixed stuff and made gifts. I've also saved the planet through sheer laziness. For example, our tumble dryer is housed in a detached, locked, alarmed garage. It's amazing how the need for fluffy bath towels diminishes when a visit to the tumble drier includes an expedition to the locked and alarmed great outdoors.

This year Carlisle Diocese relaunched the "God for All" vision. One of the four themes of this new strategy is entitled "Tread Gently". During the months of September-November St Bees Priory will be exploring how we can tread more gently on this planet. We will do this by exploring what the Bible says about caring for God's creation and responding to the Cop26 Climate Change Conference in Glasgow. We will do both these things because reflection without action is a waste of time. And after thirty years of arguing about whether we really are to blame for all this, we don't have time to waste.

My fellow clergy across the Mission Community share this passion for giving creation a chance to heal and thrive. In support of young people* walking from Cornwall to Glasgow to raise awareness of climate injustice we will be walking from and to every church in the Coast to Fells Mission Community from 5th-7th October. There will be a detailed route map in the October parish magazine. Anyone is welcome to join us for any part of our journey. Let's tread gently together.

Parish Council News

New bus service – a new Seascale to Whitehaven bus service is due to begin on 1 November which will call at Gosforth, Beckermet, Thornhill, Egremont and St Bees Station. There will be two return journeys each day Mon – Thurs. The service (HB1) will be provided by Hobans of Workington. A copy of the new timetable is available on the Cumbria County Council web-site (www.cumbria.gov.uk) and copies will be posted on the village noticeboards.

Co-option of new Parish Councillor – At its July meeting the Council co-opted Simon Ritson as a Parish Councillor to serve until the next 4 yearly elections in 2023.

Local Government Re-organisation – Following the recent consultation, the Government has announced its decision that Cumbria should be served by two unitary authorities – one in the west covering Copeland, Allerdale and Carlisle City Council areas and one in the east covering Eden Couth Lakes and Barrow. We understand that Cumbria County Council is beginning a legal challenge to the decision so a final decision is still awaited.

West Cumbria Mining- The inquiry which will determine the application by West Cumbria Mining for a new mine will commence on 7th September at 10am. It will be conducted as a virtual event and will be live streamed on the Planning Inspectorate's YouTube channel. Funds are available for young people under the age of 25 years, in Sandwith, Rottington and a portion of Abbey Vale for such things as their academic materials, educational experiences, and Christian instruction. The Trust does not provide awards to assist with the purchase of school uniform or to support the costs of transport to and from school.

The trustees encourage children and young people to take advantage of this resource, and submit applications. Trustees generally welcome one application per academic year and meet twice per academic year to consider the applications.

De-cluttering

A while ago our Village School set out on a Grand De-Cluttering. Not before time, most people thought, for indeed there lurked in dark corners much that was ancient or obsolete or beyond further usefulness. And so a large skip arrived and de-cluttering began.

As a shameless Hoarder and Clutterer I quickly sensed there could be rich pickings. Admittedly much that went to the skip really was rubbish: - rulers that had never known centimetres, scissors too blunt to cut, dilapidated boxes labelled "puzzles, incomplete", card and ply-wood offcuts of no use to anyone. But there were also items which to me seemed worth hoarding. Amongst other things which came my way were bakelite trays from a collapsed locker, perfect now for growing seedlings; construction kits for a whole range of models, mostly with key parts like wheels and axles missing; dead magnets which careful treatment might revive, and sufficient PVA glue (not all of it congealed and mouldy) to see me through this life and the next.

There is one thing, though, that I much regret. I ought to have rescued an ancient, broken -down desk. It still had its lid, and on the lid's underside some artistic boy (at least I assume it was a boy) had cut a whole series of images. They were skilfully done, and he must have had a very good jackknife – knives being essential kit for most boys in my time. All his images were to do with World War Two, and would have been familiar to all children then. One such image was of Mr. Chad, with his famous "WOT NO?" message. (Mr. Chad would appear overnight, chalked on walls and shop doors, raising a smile at even the worst shortages). We were told after the war that he originated from a circuit diagram on a Professor Chadwick's blackboard, adapted by some bored airman to whom the professor had been lecturing. However that may be, Mr. Chad did spread quickly around the country, encouraged by the authorities as being good for morale.

Something else chalked up regularly was the Morse letter "V". This was, and is, three dots followed by a dash. To everyone it stood for the Victory which we steadfastly believed would come. Some people went to extremes: in my home village a Mr. Jackson dug up a fine crocus display, to replant the bulbs in his lawn in a three-dots-and-a-dash pattern. Our desk-lid artist was less enterprising - he just carved out the code, repeatedly.

Another well-executed image, and the largest on the desk-lid, was of "Squanderbug". He came, I think, from a Ministry of Information poster – an evil swastika-covered creature, whose purpose in life was to promote wasteful spending, ("Hitler's friend - he makes you spend", said the poster). My father used a version of Squanderbug for darts practice.

I wish now I had not let that old desk go. It should have been preserved somewhere as a memento of a wartime childhood. I wonder, though – is the boy who sat at it still with us? Might he possibly read this? If so it would be good to hear from him, or from any of his classmates who remember his desk-lid artistry.

Infrastructure improvement proposals

A cycle track along the valley bottom to Whitehaven has long been dreamt about by families and enthusiasts. It would give level access to Whitehaven and the cycle routes 71/72, avoiding long climbs out of the village on busy narrow roads. It would also be made suitable for walkers and disability scooters.

A study was undertaken by Cumbria CC/Copeland BC in 2000 and the concept proved feasible. Sadly, it was not implemented. The Parish Council has been lobbying since 2015 to get it back on the local planning and investment agenda. We have re-submitted this project, which we call "The Valley Link" in the recent cycling consultation for the Whitehaven coastal area. We have encouraged people to respond, and at the fete we had over 200 people sign up to support the link. Our aim is to get the project designated as a Priority Route in the Local Cycling and Walking Infrastructure Plan (LCWIP). This makes it eligible for future Government funding. £2bn is said to be earmarked for the current government term.

The station car park is at capacity by early evening. Then parking pressures ripple up Main Street and side roads. In response to public requests for parking solutions, in 2014 the Parish Council revisited a 1976 proposal to augment the station car park using land owned by Copeland BC. The concept is for 25-30 new parking spaces along with electric vehicle and e-bikes charging, and better cycle parking.

St Bees rail usage is rising; in 2019-20 there were nearly 80,000 passenger journeys; an increase of 26% over the previous year. Rail demand during the day, and village demand during the night, would both be helped by this improvement. There is also the possibility of increasing accessibility by a footpath from Seacroft Drive to the station, which would be subject to review by Copeland BC.

Historically, for possible operational reasons, Network Rail has refused to facilitate long term vehicular access through the existing car park even though the project would benefit rail travellers. The Gov't now requires NR to actively engage in such community projects, so we can move further forward with our evaluation.

100% pass rate with exceptional results

Students at St Bees School are celebrating an extraordinary set of results – and deservedly so after such a disrupted and unusual year.

As we are still undergoing a period of growth and expansion, this is the first year since 2015 that national assessment results have been recorded. With a focus on small class sizes and a student centred approach to education, the results really do speak for themselves.

The dedication of staff and students has clearly paid off. Out of all the assessments sat by St Bees' students, 80% of the grades were A* or A, with the remaining grade B. Grades awarded this academic year resulted from the process of assessing student work internally following a very strict process laid down by the examination board, Cambridge International.

All of these School Assessed Grades for students were submitted and random samples of student work were sent to, and fully reviewed, by the examination board to ensure that their normal standards were maintained. We are delighted that all samples met the very high standards set by Cambridge International.

Year 13 student, Yuchang, gained a clean sweep of A Levels – straight A* grades in Maths, Biology and Art and as such, has secured a place to read Mathematics and Statistics at Russell Group University, the University of Edinburgh, in September.

Adding to the Sixth Form success, Year 12 students took their AS Level assessments, with over half the students achieving straight A grades – the highest grade you can obtain at AS.

Several international students, on a unique fast track IGCSE programme had also taken a set of IGCSE exams. Between them all, there were only 3 B grades with the rest A^* and A. Top student, Clara from Germany, achieved 3 A^* s and 2 As – a triumphant set of results given she only spent two out of three terms in the country – and sat these two-year exams after only one year of study.

Deputy Head and Head of Sixth Form, Mr Keep, is delighted with the results. "We knew we had a system that worked here at St Bees. We knew we had exceptional students who were focused on their studies. We knew that our staff could draw out the best in each and every individual. But these results are a true testament to the hard work that all have put in to the assessment process, especially during such restricted times and various lockdowns. I am very proud of them all."

RNLI News

7 August 2021 - A Mayday call and beach rescue for St Bees RNLI

At 6.37 p.m. St Bees RNLI volunteers were paged by Belfast Coastguard, who had received a Mayday call from two vessels. One was a yacht with four people onboard that had engine failure and the other a rigid inflatable with two people onboard that was taking on water. Both were just north of Whitehaven. In strong winds and rough seas the volunteer crew quickly launched their ILB (Inshore lifeboat).

The yacht originally had six people on board but had put two into the inflatable to try to tow the yacht into Whitehaven Harbour. In the deteriorating conditions the skipper of the yacht did the right thing in putting out a Mayday call.

Workington's ALB (All weather lifeboat) had also been launched and despite the difficult conditions both RNLI crews soon made their way to the stricken vessels.

As both lifeboats were making their way to the casualties a service boat for the Robin Rigg wind farm, Mareel Sepia, who had initially responded to the Mayday call, was stood down.

As soon as the lifeboats arrived on scene they both transferred a crew member onto the yacht to assist with attaching a tow line and to check on the welfare of all on board. One person was treated for minor injuries. With a tow line safely attached both vessels were successfully taken to the safety of Whitehaven Marina where they were met by members of the Whitehaven Coastguard Rescue Team.

While the St Bees RNLI lifeboat crew were busy at sea the shore crew were approached by a young man who asked if they could help his mother, who had fallen on the rocks about 200 metres from the lifeboat station. The shore crew made their way to the woman who had injured her ankle and was unable to walk and in a lot of pain. The volunteers, using their RNLI Casualty Care training, diagnosed a possible broken or dislocated ankle and securing her to their stretcher carefully made their way back over the rocks to the shelter of the lifeboat station where she was then made as comfortable as possible until they were able to hand her over to North West Ambulance Service.

Dick Beddows St Bees Lifeboat Operations Manager said 'It was a busy night for our volunteers both boat and shore crew but their training meant they were well prepared'
