

## September 2024

Have you ever had a really good teacher? Can you remember their name? What did they teach? I have been fortunate to have learnt from some amazing teachers in a variety of educational establishments. In addition to attending traditional Primary and Secondary School I spent fifteen years learning expressive arts at the Drusilla Duffill Theatre School. Drusilla, or Miss D as we called her, started the school in 1957 and over the decades inspired a love of theatre in thousands of young lives. She died aged 83 on the 30th June this year. Miss D was an excellent dance teacher; she cared passionately about good technique but never pushed students too hard, she inspired in me a love of expressive movement alongside an understanding of the importance of sound technique and a respect for our bodies. I am extremely grateful to have had such a good teacher throughout my childhood.

In the book of Proverbs we read "Train children in the right way, and when old, they will not stray." (22:6) Seemingly sound advice but I'm left wondering what is the "right" way? In dance training there may well be a right way, correct posture is essential to protect the body from injury, but is it so simple in other disciplines? Educators have different views on what is the "right" way...presently our education system seems to filter children into two groups through tests and sets, the academic and the not academic...to be a high achiever you must academic. This makes little sense to me. When I was learning to dance it became obvious early on that I would never be a ballet dancer, rather than berating me for what I was not Drusilla encouraged me to learn other disciplines and we celebrated those successes instead.

Good teachers guide their pupils to a deeper understanding of themselves and the world around them. Excellent teachers make that journey fun. In recent weeks we said goodbye to two teachers from St Bees village; Bob Jopling and Philip Barratt. Bob died age 94 on 2nd August and Philip died on the 3rd aged 89. Bob was a wonderful story teller, he wrote History articles for this magazine for many years, and he was also a Primary school teacher (supported by his wife, Thelma, also a teacher) Bob once told me that rather than the usual pet hamster he asked his class to care for a goat. The goat was included in the daily register and the children would take turns to shout "baa!" when the goat's name was called. I don't think they had to take the goat home at weekends! Philip Barratt taught Chemistry in Blackpool and at St Bees School. At his funeral we shared stories of Phil's passion for Science and his ability to make Chemistry classes memorable. Phil had a dry sense of humour and an innate sense of the absurd. His love of teaching never left him; in his retirement he, and his wife Maureen, continued to teach the Archimedes principle to his great niece and nephew through experiential learning at the kitchen sink.

Miss D, Mr Jopling and Mr Barratt, all excellent teachers in their own way. With a passion for their subject, humour and creativity they passed that passion on to their pupils. For surely the purpose of education is to foster a love of learning, that inspired by the words of the Proverb, continues long into old age. This September let us give thanks for our teachers.

#### Parish Council News

**Disruption to rail services -** Work is due to start on 7 September to improve the Eskmeals viaduct over the River Esk estuary. This will necessitate closure of parts of the line between Millom and Whitehaven with buses being provided where services are cancelled. The work is due to last until 22 September and seems to coincide with evening/night closures of the A595 from Calderbridge to New Mill so there are likely to be delays and disruptions. Revised timetables will be available closer to the time of the works taking place at **northernrailway.co.uk/engineering.** Timetables for the replacement bus services will be posted at stations along the route and passengers are being advised to check before setting off on their journey.

**Outrigg Flooding** -The work to improve the drainage on the Outrigg -Egremont road is now complete and should provide a long term solution to the flooding problems of the last couple of years.

**Traffic Issues** – the Parish Council is continuing to work with Highways officers on the concerns about traffic safety on the B5345 near the entrance to Abbey Vale. Traffic speeds up as it leaves the village and vehicles are often exceeding 30mph as they enter the village from the Whitehaven direction. The police are carrying out speed monitoring and the Parish Council will be discussing with Highways the possibility of a 20mph limit in the village.

**Rewilding of Beach Rd Verge** - it is hoped to begin replanting the verge with native wild flowers in the next few weeks after some of the original plants were damaged when fibre optic cables were laid. We are grateful for the support received from the Planting for Pollinators Project and Viberoptix.

Antisocial behaviour – just a reminder! It is important that any issues of damage to property or antisocial behaviour are reported to the police so they are aware of all incidents and can plan their response appropriately. If you witness any incidents, reports can be made on the police 101 number or online at www.cumbria.police.uk

Allotments- the Parish Council manages the allotments on Sea View. At present there are no vacant plots but we maintain a waiting list of those interested in taking on a plot when one becomes available. If you are interested in joining the waiting list, please contact the Clerk (pc\_clerk@stbees.org.uk)

Valley Link Cycle Track – the delays and uncertainties over the planning application for the new mine have slowed progress towards creating a cycle route to link St Bees and Whitehaven. However, the Parish Council remains committed to the project and has reopened discussions with Cumberland Council and other partners to gain support for the project and begin the initial planning stages so that it is ready to take forward, should funding become available.

When he and Thelma arrived in St Bees in 1993 they quickly became valued members of the community, in particular at the Village School as volunteers using their many years of teaching experience in Cambridge. Bob's big appeal to pupils was his menagerie of animals, fish and insects that he used as teaching aids. Another memorable speciality was the Second World War, where his Home Guard and army service experiences helped him to bring these two subjects alive for a young audience.

Bob was also well known to an older audience for his research into local history, much of which appeared as regular articles in this magazine. Over the course of many years up to the present day he wrote nearly 200 articles ranging from the Shipwreck of the SS Olivari to the row over the village water supply. One of his proudest moments was when many of these articles were collated into his book - "Bob's Jottings". His larger research works are available in the village history display archive in the Priory.

Bob was a very keen gardener all his life and loved his own gardens, which have been admired for many years by passers-by. As soon as he moved to the village he volunteered to look after the memorial garden at the Priory, and the turning circle garden for Village in Bloom.

As someone who has made an impact in several areas of village life, he will be very much missed.

We were greatly saddened to hear of the death of Philip Barratt – a remarkable gentleman who was well-known and respected in the village, school and Priory for over 60 years.

He was head of the Chemistry Department at St Bees School for many years and known to generations of staff and pupils, particularly for his dry wit and incisive humour. He was a vast fount of scientific knowledge, with a fascination in the relationship of faith and science. As author of the Longman Practice Exam Papers in A-level Chemistry, his influence in education continues, with the slogan 'Practice makes Perfect'. Philip was always involved in the life and worship of the Priory, in his roles as PCC member, magazine editor and distributor, and the Friends. He was a founder member of the Friends and chairman from the 1990s until his recent retirement, investing much time and talent. He was also greatly appreciated as a Friends speaker on many scientific topics – such as the Chemical Elements, Onions, and 'Agatha Christie's Poisons', to name a few! At the annual Christmas Carol Concert, he and Maureen would compere their popular programme of carols and readings. He also published booklets and leaflets with historian Tom Rice, available for sale at the Priory, on behalf of the Friends.

## Happy 30th Birthday to the Fair Trade Foundation:

Come and Celebrate with us on Saturday 21 September 10.30-12.30 in New college Hall. Tea, coffee, games, cakes and fun & raise enough to sponsor a producer for a year! Did you know that the WI was a founder member of the Fair Trade Foundation, along with Traidcraft, Christian Aid, CAFOD, Oxfam and the World Development movement? A lot has been achieved in 30 years, you can now buy over 5,000 fairly traded products with 2m farmers or workers in Fair traded certified organisations, and £1.7billion paid in Fair trade premiums for co-operatives to spend as helps them most, bringing many communities out of poverty. Fair Trade is in all the supermarkets. BUT there is still a long way to go. Most of us are horrified by the fact that cocoa was grown by slaves in the 19<sup>th</sup> century as a colonial cash crop. But has much changed? Today, in West Africa where 60% of the world's coca is grown, a typical cocoa farmer earns less than £1/day while the chocolate industry is worth millions. The fair trade premium of £1.7billion paid over the 30 years of the foundation's life sounds a lot BUT nearly double that was paid to the shareholders of Mondelez (who own Cadbury's) in just one year.

So come and join us on Saturday & have fun and Transform Trade! If we can raise just over £200, St Bees can sponsor a producer group for a year and receive info on how they are doing. You can choose whether we sponsor a cashew farm in Tanzania, a tea association in Kenya or a textile producer in India. More information next month.

On Thursday, 1st August St Bees lifeboat crew & volunteers celebrated "One Moment, One Crew". The RNLI charity, founded in 1824, encouraged its volunteers nationwide to take a photo of themselves as close to 18:24 on 1.8.24 as possible to mark 200 years of saving lives at sea.



To celebrate the RNLI 200

anniversary the volunteers at St Bees came together for a short service in St Bees Priory. They remembered RNLI volunteers past and present. There was a poignant sermon from the Rural Dean Richard Lee who commended the crew on their bravery and commitment and also paid tribute to his Uncle Frederick who drowned while on service with the RNLI in the 1962 Seaham disaster. At 18:24 a minutes silence was held, followed by the ringing of the church bells. After the service the crew gathered at The Manor St Bees to test their knowledge in a St Bees & RNLI themed pub quiz!

#### Two events and a shout for St Bees RNLI volunteers.

Saturday 27 July was a busy day as St Bees RNLI bvolunteers helped set up for their open day alongside the Cumbria Wildlife Trust SeaFest at St Bees, and later at . Whitehaven Harbour for the Blue Light Day organised by Workington RNLI.

There were plenty of stalls on the grass bank as well as a sandcastle competition on the beach all organised by Cumbria Wildlife Trust. St Bees Guild were busy with their Tombola and handing out teas, coffee and cold drinks and the crew were on hand to show people the equipment used during lifeboat rescues and Stormy Stan made a guest appearance taking the opportunity to get involved in many of the activities. Which included the lifeboat being launched, giving the crowds a a display of the lifeboat in action, before it made its way to Whitehaven Harbour. During this time an unmanned inflatable boat had been reported floating south of St Bees so the lifeboat left the display and quickly located the small boat. After a search of the area along with Whitehaven Coastguard (who had also been part of the Blue Light Event) nothing further was found and the lifeboat crew were stood down.

If you have any type of small boat, kayak or canoe it is a good idea to mark it with your contact details. This makes it easier for the search and rescue teams to confirm the owner is safe.

Dick Beddows, St Bees RNLI Operations Manager, said: 'I would like to thank everyone who came along and supported both events: we all enjoyed our day meeting and chatting to everyone.'

## Results of environmental project questionnaire

Thank you to everyone who filled out our questionnaire for possible environmental projects in the parish.

We had 92 responses to the questionnaire and the main results were:

The top five responses to a list of possible projects and facilities to be developed were: 1 Bus route 2 Local produce events 3 Repair café 4 Community renewable energy scheme 5 Public electric vehicle charging points

When asked to prioritise the listed projects and facilities, the top 5 responses were: 1 Bus route 2 Public electric vehicle charging points 3 Community renewable energy scheme 4 Repair café 5 Local produce events

Other suggestions for possible projects included those related to public transport and active travel; roads and traffic; waste, recycling and litter; land use and planning.

Responses also provided further support for existing projects: the proposed off-road cycle track from St Bees to Mirehouse, tree planting and wildflower planting.

Residents who completed the questionnaire were generally supportive of the Parish Council taking action to address climate change: 58% felt it was very important to address climate change locally and for the Parish Council to take action and a further 20% felt it important to do so. Just 4% felt it was not important at all.

Cost, uncertainty about what actions to take and that other options are unavailable were the top three barriers given by residents for not making further changes to address climate change.

There was also significant interest to find out more about energy saving at home, wildlife friendly gardening, and reducing food waste and composting.

Sixteen people expressed interest in being contacted to help with future projects related to climate change and nature recovery.

While the Parish Council may not be able to take all the suggestions forward, our Climate Change Working Group will use the results of the questionnaire to guide the projects that they now explore.

#### **Background to the project**

Both the National Association of Local Councils and Cumbria Association of Local Councils encourage parish and town councils to take local action to tackle climate change and increase biodiversity. St Bees Parish Council formed a Climate Change Working Group in 2023. The Parish Council Climate Change Toolkit provides ideas for projects, but encourages parish councils to involve their residents in choosing projects for consideration.

## The Sandwith School Charity Trust

Founded in 1977 with funds generated by the sale of the Sandwith school, the Trust exists to:

Promote the education of persons under the age of 25 years who reside in the Parish of Sandwith and Rottington. and/ or

Promote Religious Instruction of such persons in accordance with the doctrines of the Church of England.

The Trust is administered by the following committee members:

Over the past 10 years the Trust has made awards of over £25,000 to applicants meeting the criteria. The Trustees encourage applications from the stipulated area of Sandwith and Rottington. These could be for books, studying materials, Information Technology and other learning devices in pursuance of education or Religious Instruction.

The Trust does not finance travel to and from the place of eduction, but will consider costs associated with provision of uniforms.

The Trust meets twice per year (usually March and October) in order to consider applications for awards. Application forms can be obtained from and returned to the St. Bees Vicarage via enquiries@stbeespriory.org.Uk.

## HyperfastGB is coming to St Bees.

We appreciate that there has been some disruption in recent months with road closures and traffic diversions. These were necessary to protect our workforce and members of the public as road users and pedestrians. Building the network is complex and involves a number of stages. The great news is that we are close to completion. Our partners Viberoptix are currently jointing cables and this is a very technical and precise role as they have to ensure perfect alignment of the fibre filaments in each cable. The next and final stage is to test the speeds and reliability of fibre optic broadband. We are aiming to complete this work later this year and from September customers can start to place orders.

HyperfastGB is being delivered by Fibrus Networks and the project is part of the UK government's Project Gigabit. Project Gigabit is the UK government's programme to enable hard-to-reach communities to access lightning-fast gigabit-capable broadband. Gap funding is provided to subsidise the additional cost of building to rural communities. We work with BDUK to monitor commercial plans and aim to reach properties not included in these. This is very much subject to network capacity as we must be assured that we can offer the correct speed and reliability before we can take customer orders.

In St Bees, we are aware from our survey work that there is existing infrastructure in a number of the local roads that was originally installed either as part of an earlier development or by other network providers. Where possible, we will reuse existing infrastructure such as underground chambers as well as overhead routes via poles to reduce the cost and disruption of the build and enable us to connect more homes and businesses. For this reason, we cannot be definitive about many premises we can connect but we will work with BDUK to include as many properties as possible in the network design.

A question we are often asked is what people can do to ensure they are considered for connection. Sometimes we have to make commercial decisions as to which premises and roads to connect if capacity is limited. If you want to be connected, then please visit Fibrus.com and register your interest. You will not be committed to anything but it will help us to assess demand for connecting premises that are over and above the original network plans for HyperfastGB.


